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

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, The laws of the United States have been for some time past, and now are, opposed, and the execution thereof obstructd, in the States of South Carolina. Georgia. Alabama, Florida, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Texas, by combinations too powerful to be suppressed by the ordinary course of judicial proceedings, or by the powers vested in the Marshals by law;
