A bill was introduced more effectually to repress the rebellion by prohibiting the holding in servitude of any persons in the country, except on contract; also, to establish a Bareau of Emancipation.

Mr. Lovejoy introduced a bill providing that all persons held to slavery in the States and Territories shall be declared free : all persons so de clared free shall be protected the same as white men now are by the Constitution: any one seizing such freed persons to reduce them to slavery shall be declared guilty of a high misdemeanor, and, on convic tion, punished. Also, a bill to protect freedmen and to provide for punishing those who attempt to enslave them.


