

"And there is salvation in no one else; for there is no other name under heaven that has been given among men, by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).





I find it astounding to think of the time when the Father will show us all the mysteries that we here on earth have been wondering about, fighting about, and killing each other over for so many years.

"In the same way, we can see and understand only a little about God now, as if we were peering at His reflection in a poor mirror; but someday we are going to see Him in His completeness, face to face. 

BOB HARRINGTON CRUSADE

HOW TO PRAY FOR MISSIONARIES



"Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth laborers into his harvest."

Matthew 9:38

Here is a list of suggestions, compiled by a missionary on the field, telling how he would like his friends to pray for him:

- 1. Pray for the essential things. Good health is important but not necessarily essential. Ask God to give me the measure of health that will best glorify Him. Perhaps some sickness would demonstrate to those around us that I have a God who can keep me in perfect peace, even in the midst of pain or trial.
- 2. Pray for daily grace. I do not ask for an easy path on the mission field, but rather for grace sufficient to be an overcomer in the way.
- 3. Pray that I shall not be too busy to pray. Does that shock you? Don't you know that it is just as easy for me, a missionary, to be too busy to pray, as it is for you to be too busy to pray for me?
- 4. Pray for gentle determination. I am not so anxious that you ask God to remove obstacles, but that He might give me that quiet, gentle determination to be unconquerable in the tasks He gives me.
- 5. Pray for the Lord's censorship of my activities. I know that I shall have His divine blessing, when I engage in activities directed by Him. But it is so easy for a missionary's time and energy to be spent on secondary things.
- 6. Pray for enabling to resist temptation. Remember, I am not on a higher level than you live; I am subject to temptations and Satan is determined to hinder my testimony, to rob my life of power or

to make my witness futile. I need your prayer for grace and strength to resist temptation.

7. Pray for my attitudes to people and circumstances. Remember that a missionary can become lonely; I can become discouraged; I can become irritable, sharp, harsh, and impatient with the people, even among those whom I serve as well as with other missionaries. It is so easy for me to be taken up with 'the work' or 'the problems' and to gradually allow these things to quench the passion for the lost and the love for Christ which should characterize my life.

When you pray for me remember: I have all your weaknesses but my circumstances expose them more openly.

Perspectives on Amnesty

A 16mm color film presenting in beautiful photography and clear dialogue a number of significant perspectives on amnesty with warm humanity is now available from the United Ministries in Higher Education in Milwaukee, Wis. For Seventh Day Baptists and their friends who wish to discuss this complicated matter — this film seems to be a very helpful resource.

What is service to one's country? What is the range of amnesty in terms of those to be granted such amnesty? What qualifications are to be considered in granting amnesty? What is the history of amnesty? What kind of an ethical and human world do we live in?

These questions are dealt with by a wide range of representatives from the life of America — both members and leaders of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, POW's, draft resisters, management leaders, professors in Law, Sociology and History are interviewed in "Perspectives on Amnesty."

Have you thought of the differences between amnesty, forgiveness, pardon? These are much easier to discuss after seeing this film. Are you in good perspective on "civil disobedience" in the American scene? Are you aware of some of the deep feelings and broad intellectual concerns of those who face the American morality in light of "service to country"?

After previewing this film with two ministerial groups, one of them a campus ministry group, we feel very definitely that this film can help any searching group to appropriate the moral, religious, personal and national problems involved in "Amnesty Post-Vietnam."

One could enjoy this film just from the skill with which the photography music and dialogue and flow of development of present issues. The viewer enters into the experience of families, veterans groups, draft resisters, exile groups, as well as hearing the personal opinions of

those in the intellectual community, the commercial world, and the "man on the street." Photographic development makes participation in these various experiences by pleasant shifts. At one point the viewer is given a quick survey of American history in civil disobedience that adds a dimension to all the considerations of amnesty.

Because the film leaves one with a challenge to better perceive what one's respectability is to his country, and to understand the ethical nature of our world, the film is an excellent learning resource.

SATAN, THE HINDERER AND THE PRAYER CLOSET

Who is he who would rob the Christian of all his delight in prayer, and oft-times whisper: "You do not feel like praying, therefore, do not pray!" It is Satan, the arch deceiver and hinderer! Yes, this is indeed one of the enemies hindering approaches to the soul. The gifted poet, Richard Chenevix Trench, recognized the need of challenging the soul to the place of prayer. He wrote:

"When prayer delights thee least,
Then learn to say,
Soul, now is greatest need
That thou should'st pray!"

The Devil desires to impede our prayer life for he knows that the Christian who is constant and fervent in prayer is indeed a great threat to his pernicious cause. Satan is indeed the hinderer according to the Word of God (1 Thess. 2:18; Gal. 5:17; Zech. 3:1, 2). In his diabolical effort to hinder us, he stealthily and carefully works in his uncanny way to drain our lives of both the desire to wait upon God, and all delight in prayer. Yet, it is when we feel least like praying that we should stir ourselves up (Isa. 64:5) to stand against the enemy and resort to the place of prayer. Yes, it is in the very moment when we find ourselves most hindered by the enemy and void of any spirit of prayer or joy in praying that we should challenge our innermost being saying:

> "Soul, now is greatest need That thou shouldest pray."

It was the godly Andrew Bonar who affirmed that he never entered into a season of pure prayer without a fierce battle at the threshold. It is true that

at the portal of the prayer closet Satan stations his strongest forces to hinder the one who prays. It is evident that the famous poet, William Cowper, knew something of the power of Satan to hinder one's approach to the mercy seat, for he wrote:

"What various hindrances we meet
In coming to a mercy seat!
Yet, who that knows the worth of prayer
But wishes to be often there!"

Christian, never underestimate the power of your hindering enemy! See him lurking on every hand. What various hindrances he employs to cripple or utterly defeat your prayer life. What are some of the methods he uses? Let us examine some of them.

One very common method employed by Satan in keeping the believer from the closet of prayer is that of casting over him a spirit of slothfulness. Yes, many Christians seldom, if ever, wait upon their God in fervent prayer simply because they have become victims of Sataninduced laziness. Indeed, it is time that we recognize sloth as sin and repent of it, in a spirit of contrition and brokenness. Only as we find forgiveness for the sin of laziness will we be willing to pay the price of genuine prayer. Prayer costs something in time and energy but the one who has found victory over Satan induced sloth will enter into a new experience of delightful communion with his Lord. Could it be, dear friend, that sloth has kept you from your prayer closet? If so, then recognize this as sin

and repent! Yours can be a joyous experience of prayer as you overcome the hinderer at the foot of the cross!

Yet, another method Satan uses to hinder our prayer life is that of causing, to come over us a spirit of unwarranted tiredness and lethargy. Are you ofttimes too tired to pray? Could it be that the enemy is using unwarranted tiredness to hinder your prayer life? Examine your spirit of tiredness. Is it justified? Are you overworked? Then rest! Physical rest is vital to your spiritual rest and continual blessing. However, if you have no reason to be tired then stand against the enemy. Claim the victory of Calvary and find rest in Christ. Thereupon, give yourself to fervent prayer.

Still another means employed by Satan to hinder our prayer life is that of imposing upon us a spirit of inattention. In times of prayer he causes our minds to be easily diverted from being occupied with God and our communion with Him. Our minds wander and we are too often distracted and are given to thinking about other things. In view of the fact that this has been a common experience among Christians let us pause for a moment and consider the means by which we can overcome the enemy at this point.

It was George Muller, the man of faith, who knew what it was to suffer from wandering thoughts in times of prayer. But he found after many years the secret of victory. He relates his own experience: "I often spent a quarter of an hour, or half an hour, or even an hour on my knees before being conscious of having derived comfort, encouragement, humbling of soul, etc. And often, after having suffered much from wandering of mind for the first ten minutes, or quarter of an hour, or even half an hour I only, then, began to pray." Then, this great man of prayer, triumphantly adds: "I scarcely ever suffer now in this way!" What happened? Where was the victory found? It was simple. He indicates that meditation in the Word of God coupled with prayer spelled victory over inattention for him. For many years he had given much of his time to prayer with little meditation in the Word, now he found victory in a happy combination of

meditation and prayer. Is your mind given to wandering during times of waiting upon God? Try this combination. Spend time in the Word letting God talk to you, then as you talk to Him you will enjoy victory. Meditate and pray! If it werked for George Muller it will work for you!

It is important that we consider briefly yet, another approach of our hindering foe. O how cleverly and subtly he works to cause us to be satisfied with a form of godliness and to deny the power thereof (2 Tim. 3:5). He deadens our sensitivity to heavenly things by causing us to be taken up with the things that are earthly. We, therefore, fail to set our affections in things that are above but rather we fix them on things on the earth (Col. 3:2). We are not taken up with that which is sensual so much as we are given over to the things which are secular. In this place of "worldly-mindedness" we are led by the hinderer to keep up our form of godliness and to deny its sanctifying power in our lives. In this place we continue to "say" our prayer — we utter mere words — but when it is said and done we have not "prayed." Indeed, we have merely gone through the form of prayer. Yes, we have said our prayers out of a sense of duty but we have not prayed. And once again the hinderer has scored another victory. He has defeated us in our spiritual life. Oh, that we might be absolutely abandoned to the Victor with our affections set on Him! Thereupon, His power could be released in our lives making it possible to overcome the enemy that in turn we might no longer deny the power of godliness but enjoy its power and pray in the Spirit.

We must consider the fact that Satan hinders our prayer experience by putting us under undue pressure. We become exceeding occupied and preoccupied with trifles. The hinderer will cause us to feel that we must be constantly expending our energy upon things which seem at the moment to be important but actually are "much ado about nothing." Ah, so many among us are too busy to wait upon God. Is this true of you; are you too busy?

Though we have been back yard neighbors for several years my first real acquaintance with Mrs. Oakley came through the Hillside Terrace Neighborhood Association, an organization set up to preserve and foster the benefits of an integrated community. In the earlier days of that organization, which has now accomplished much of its purpose and lost its drive Mrs. Oakley was the energetic membership chairman and therefore prominent at the monthly meetings held in the auditorium of the neighborhood school whose students were predominantly of the black race. She has to relinquish that activity because of serious illness, an infection in both her kidneys, that threatened her life.

Six years ago our neighbor gave up her employment and went to Mt. Sinai Hospital in New York to receive a kidney transplant from her sister. Since that time she has become something of an expert on medical and surgical terminology, for she has had much experience in a battle for health that seemed to be a losing battle. There was danger that her system would reject the transplanted kidney. The doctors prescribed a medicine to combat rejection. It was successful, but it caused her face and body to become extremely puffy. Along

with it went deterioration of bones and loss of the use of her legs through separation of the hip joints. She could get around the house only in a wheel chair and her husband had to do all of the cooking and housework before and after his day's work for the city street department.

Mrs. Oakley never lost faith that she would get well though the odds seemed to be against it for several years. Her husband remarked that if he had that much wrong with him he would give up and die. Not Mrs. Oakley; she continued to make painful trips to the hospital and stuck to the prescribed medicine and diet.

The time came when the body swelling went down to some extent and the kidney functioned almost normally. She went back for a complete hip replacement with artificial ball and socket joint. When I saw her walking around the back yard recently, she was proud to show how that one hip could bear her weight. The other leg was an inch and a half short because there was no hip joint. She told me she was driving her car and was going back to New York soon to get another hip. It was not without some danger. The adrenal gland on the borrowed kidney has never functioned and she might die at the end of any day of exertion without warning if she did not take Adrenalin by mouth.

Furthermore, she told me that during the operation there would have to be nine pints of blood with the white corpuscles and other properties removed on a standby basis. The doctors had said, "You are getting along quite well now, don't you think that is good enough?" Her reply was that she was determined to walk perfectly, not with a bad limp

and discomfort. So within a month this black woman with indomitable spirit hopes to greet her neighbors cheerily as she walks and works is a normal way.

I cannot say for sure that my neighbor has been an active church member, but she has faith. It has taken her through more difficulties than most of us can even imagine. Do we think we have troubles? How do we react to our lesser problems? Jesus once said about a woman who was of another ethnic group, "O woman, great is thy faith: be it unto thee even as thou wilt" (Matt. 15:28). He said also of an officer in the Roman army who came to Him with another acute health problem, "I have not found so great a faith, no not in Israel" (Luke 7:9).

Danish Baptists Contact Burundi Christians

Two nurses from Denmark and a teacher from Finland have returned to Burundi to take up work again in the Baptist mission there.

The president of the Danish Baptist Union and another pastor went earlier this year to Burundi. Both were formerly missionaries in the country. They spent several weeks reestablishing contact with local Baptist churches.

They reported that even with many tragic losses during the incidents of 1972, the mission work over the last forty-five years had not been in vain. The local churches have assumed growing responsibility, even holding an annual assembly at which an executive committee of fifteen national members was elected.

In addition to spiritual help for the church work, the two pastors cited the need for medical personnel.

Their reports preceded news of a worsening of the situation recently in Burundi.

Marshall. He quoted him as follows: "Early in the war I instructed every officer assigned to the general staff to get away from Washington for a day or two each week. How much wiser are the children of this world than the children of light! Why are we so slow to grasp the secrets that business magnates and generals seem to see? It is because Satan has hindered us from seeing the importance of de-

tached contemplation and rest. It is imperative that we have regular moments of undisturbed communion where we shut out all other distractions and see Jesus afresh! Yes, in this hectic age of distraction all of us need to pause every now and then . . . "to wait upon our God." Certainly we must make time to be in His presence. Certainly our secret for power with God and man is prayer and to the extent we allow Satan, the hinderer, to rob us of our extended times of waiting upon God to that extent we miserably fail!




But to many people it is simply religious gobbledygook!
