LAYING ON OF HANDS. To the Editor of the Sabbath Recorder :-

I am led to reject the practice of laying on of hands on "newly ban tized persons," as a gospel ordinance, for various reasons ; the first of which is. that it is nowhere enjoined. not even in an implied form. • The matter might be left here, for the friends of the practice to produce the "chapter and verse." But to meet the argument of those who seem to think

that an injunction is not necessary to form obligation for the observance of a positive institution. I say, in the second place, example does not form law. Let those who dissent from this view, reply to my articles in the RE CORDER a few months since. The example for First-day keeping is a good as that for laying on of hands as above stated. 
