Your will may be simple, but it must be zation proper. It must comply with the laws of your exist). particular state.

Without such a will, your property—all the possessions you leave behind at death—will be distributed according to the laws of the state where you lived at the time of your death.

Without a will a considerable amount of your estate may go unnecessarily for federal and state taxes. But a properly prepared will can died). reduce such taxation tremendously.

Without a will valuable real estate and other property may have to be sold at a sacrifice to pay creditors and tax collectors. But a properly prepared will can anticipate such a problem.

Without a will the court will appoint an administrator to settle the affairs of your estate according to rules and regulations that are completely impersonal. The various needs of your loved ones will not be considered. A properly prepared will allows you to choose a personal representative (plus an alternate if the personal representative is unable to serve) on whom you can depend to dispose of your estate according to your wishes.

Without a will no gifts of cash or real property can go from your estate to those not related to you. But a properly prepared will can include just such a disposition.

Don't forget to review your will periodically! An outdated will might be as bad as having no will at all. Attorneys recommend that they should be reviewed at least once every five What constitutes a need for a review and possible revision of your will?



# HEADQUARTERS LOCATION RESEARCH COMMITTEE

The Seventh Day Baptist Headquarters Research Committee has been analyzing desirable features for denominational headquarters facilities and location.

A "points to ponder" opinion survey among church members nation-wide has been completed, according to committee chairman, Dr. E. Keith Davis.

About 4 percent of the questionnaires were returned, some of them reflecting the thinking of churches as groups. Chairman Davis indicates that probably no conclusive trends can be determined on the basis of the returns so far. However, a good sampling of opinions is now available.

The results are currently being reviewed by committee members, and a preliminary report will soon be forwarded to Commission.

It is anticipated that Commission will release a report to the denomination at large at General Conference time.

# AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

### GOOD NEWS FOR EVERYONE EVERYWHERE

The one hundred sixty-second annual meeting of the American Bible Society was held May 11, 1978 at the Pierre Hotel in New York City. Seventh Day Baptists were represented by editor John D. Bevis who is the denominational representative to the society serving on the advisory council. The society reported "Good News for Everyone - Everywhere" as Scripture distribution multiplied greatly over the past year. During 1977 a lot of emphasis was placed on increasing the circulation of the Good News Bible. It is reported that the great majority of Americans who received the new translation greeted it with enthusiasm. President Carter received the symbolic five millionth copy, specially bound and inscribed for the occasion, at a White House ceremony in September. We are happy to note that many Seventh Day Baptist churches have helped to promote distribution of the Good News Bible. Especially commendable is the work of the Boulder, CO, church under the direction of its pastor, Rev. Elmo Fitz Randolph.

# **VOLUNTEERS AID WORK**



# GIFTS FROM THE CHURCHES

More than 80 denominations, churches, and agencies contributed a total of \$1,545,634.41 to the American Bible Society in 1977. We are extremely happy to note that Seventh Day Baptists more than doubled their reported giving over the previous year. Our reported contributions amounted to \$1,179.07 which is an average of .227 per member. This places us in the top seven of denominational giving on a per member basis. The highest per member giving was by the 9,500 member Apostolic Christian Churches of America with 1.428 per member. We should seek to raise at least \$1,500 this year to assist in the wonderful work of sharing God's message of love and peace with the world.


# **HIGHLIGHTS OF 1977**

# THE VITAL QUESTION

The more I see of the world and learn of its history, the more I am impressed with the universality of the spiritual laws of God. One can no more break the law of love with immunity than he can break the law of gravity. And the more I study the Old Testament the more I see in it a progressive preparation for the New Testament. Slowly, step by step, God reveals Himself to mankind through human experience.

The Israelites slew, pillaged, and burned as they invaded Canaan. A stern and jealous God demanded it, so they thought. In First Kings 18:40 we find Elijah, the prophet of the old order, finishing off the priests of Baal in a bloody lynching party. But it didn't stamp out Baalism. In Second Kings 9 we see that Elisha appointed Jehu, the hard-fighting, hard-driving charioteer, as king, and Jezebel, the promoter of Baalism was murdered in cold blood. Then to make a complete end of the work, Jehu cleverly lured all the worshippers of Baal in the land into the temple and massacred them there (2 Kings 10:18-28). Could that be where Hitler got his idea? Well, this was all a bloody surgery to cure Israel of Baalism and idolatry. What was the result? Baalism lived on! The wild zeal of "the sons of the prophets" with brute force and bloodshed failed. A new kind of prophet was needed.

Then Amos, Hosea and Isaiah came upon the scene preaching, teaching, and writing. Blood gives way to brains; force must yield to persuasion; fighting must cease in the face of love. "So you, by the help of your God, return, hold fast to love and justice, and wait continually for your God," pleaded Hosea (12:6). "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God," cried Micah (6:8). What hate and ruthlessness can never accomplish, love and mercy can. So the prophets began to sow the seeds which came to fruition in Jesus of Nazareth. The sowing must go on in our time till it bears fruit in every human life.

The principle of love which was sown as a tiny seed by the prophets became the very heart of the message of Jesus. He condensed His whole message in the two great commandments: love God, and love your fellowmen. At the close of His

earthly ministry, after a breakfast with His disciples on the shore of Galilee, Jesus asked Peter the one all important question, "Peter, do you love me?" Three times the question was put to Peter, and three times he replied, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Peter had denied his Lord three times; now he must declare his love three times.

Jesus might have asked other questions of Peter, such as, Do you believe in me? Many people think that if they believe thus and so, they can be sure of a front seat in heaven. He might have asked, Do you accept me as Son of God and Savior? or Will you serve me? Will you fight for me, suffer and die for me? But all these are included and implied in the one all-embracing, vital question, "Do you love me?" Jesus knew that if He had Peter's love He had Peter.

We must face the same question today. Its answer is the first step in the proper solution of every human problem. If God has our love He has us, and our dedicated service to Him. The world shies away from that vital question and is paying the consequences. It is trying to solve its problems on some other basis and it doesn't work.

Jesus expects certain things to follow if we really love Him: repentance, acceptance of Him as Savior, growth in Christian grace and service. These expectations are declared in His preaching. "Repent for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." 'Unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." "You must be born again." "Unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." "He who loses his life for my sake will find it." This is all the fruit of love. Jesus expects us to bear the fruit of love.

Three children went to their mother one morning and said, "Mother, I love you." The mother gave each one a task to do. The first refused and went away. The second promised to do his task and then promptly forgot. The third promised and then went and did as he was asked. Which of these children loved their mother most? Jesus told a similar story of a father and two sons. "Not every one who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he

who does the will of my Father who is in heaven" (Matt. 7:21)

A young man complained to his pastor about the temptations and sin and suffering in the world, and he condemned God who made it so. "Why, I could make a better world myself," he said. "Good," said the pastor, "Go to it, that is just what God put you in this world to do." That is what we all are here for.

Our answer to the question, "Do you love me?" comes not only in words but in living. A new convert was asked, "Under whose preaching were you converted?" He answered, "It wasn't under anybody's preaching. It was Aunt Hannah's practicing." Noble, consecrated living will turn others to Christ; careless, selfish living will turn them away. The test of our love for God is the kind of fruit we bear. "By their fruits you shall know them," said Jesus. Are our lives bearing good and beautiful fruit, or is it sour and gnarly?

Jesus described in detail some of the fruits of love in what we call the Beatitudes: "Blessed are the poor in spirit...Blessed are those who mourn...Blessed are the meek.... Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness...Blessed are the merciful...Blessed are the pure in heart...Blessed are the peace makers...blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness sake..." Perhaps we all suffer persecution at times, but can we take it like Christians? Paul said in First Corinthians 13: "Love is patient and kind; love is not jealous or boastful; it is not arrogant or rude. Love does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrong, but rejoices in the right." A real Christian shows all these acts and qualities in his life. He is quite different from most other people.

Perhaps the most precious and sweetest fruit of the love of God is forgiveness. The world today is full of bitterness, injury, revenge and counter-revenge. A tremendous amount of love and forgiveness is needed to check the tide and save the world from destruction by hate.

The practice of love calls out love in others, even as Jesus' love did. "We love because he first loved us" (1 John 4:19). Love can make over a life. Many people who had lived

wretchedly wicked lives have been converted by the love of a mother, or wife or a friend.

Love bears fruit in character and also in service. We are responsible for ourselves and for others. After the replies of Peter to Jesus' question, "Do you love me?" Jesus commanded, "Feed my sheep," or "Tend my sheep." There are always sheep to be turned back from danger and guided in the right direction by our example and our words of persuasion. And there are always sheep to be fed the nourishment of the gospel. The church needs teachers, leaders, and workers.

But we are so inclined to be more concerned that others carry their full share of the work and the burdens than that all the sheep be properly fed and led. Even as Peter pointed to John and said, "Lord what about this man?" so we point to our neighbor and say, "Is he doing his share? Why should I do more than he? How much does he give to the church?" etc. Jesus' reply to all who think and talk that way is, "What is that to you? Follow me." Let us remember that we receive far more than we can ever repay.


Were the whole realm

To all of us comes the question, "Do you love me?" And we must answer it. We can say no, but the

penalty for that is high. We can say, later I will; but the penalty and risk again is great. Or we can say, "Yes, Lord, with all my heart, soul, mind, and strength I love you." When we can say that and mean it, the kingdom with all its blessings is ours. And it will show in our character and in our service as we tend God's other sheep with love.

When we have dedicated ourselves to love and follow Christ, we must go out to the sheep that need tending. We must let our love flow out to them in the most appropriate and helpful ways. There are many challenging problems in our society. All of them can be solved with love and in no other way. But the world is today attacking its problems by means of violence. The repressed seek to gain freedom by violence; minority groups seek to gain their civil rights by violence; reformers seek to change the establishment by violence; and those given authority and charged with responsibility for maintaining order and justice, all too often resort to violence. Violence is self-destructive. We need no further proof that "Those who take the sword shall perish by the sword."


We Christians must lead the world to freedom, understanding and peace by seeking with love, and with zeal and determination, for the wise and just solutions of our problems. And we need to be on the action front putting the right solutions into practice. This is our answer to that vital question that Jesus puts to each of us, "Do you love me?"

# PRISON MINISTRY FOCUSES TOWARD INMATES' FAMILIES

AVON PARK, Fla. — The couple had been crying when they came into the chapel at Avon Park Correctional Institute.

He looked older than his 55: she than her 53. He was wearing the drab uniform of an inmate: she was dressed in an outfit that had seen better days.

"They had a look of horror on their faces," said Flo Wall. "Their eyes were red...you could tell they had been weeping. They had that look that said, 'This is not real... this can't be happening...' "

The man had been a successful investment broker, active in politics and social life. They had a big, nice home and plenty of money. Then, their empire crumbled. He was convicted of stock fraud and sent to prison. They lost home, car, money, friends and way of life. "She couldn't even get welfare," Mrs. Wall said. "She was living across town...in a housing project, impoverished."

At that moment — when the couple walked into the chapel — Flo Wall's current ministry began, a ministry to the wives and children of inmates at Avon Park Correctional Institute, a minimum security prison in the lakes region of central Florida.

Life is very hard for the families of inmates. Many have severe economic problems, coupled with disruption and disgrace. Often they have nowhere to turn, not even to the church and Christians. "It has been very difficult," says the wife of a former policeman serving time in APCI. "People acted like I had done the things he was sent to prison for... children made comments about my husband to my children." In many cases, the wives of prisoners are ostracized.

Rommie Loudd, a former All-America football player serving time in the prison, said: "Mrs. Wall's ministry is very important. When a man comes to prison he is going to be taken care of. He'll get three

meals a day...clean clothes and a place to sleep. But the family... the women and children. They're the ones hurt the most. Lots of them are thrown out of churches because the man is in prison. People disassociate themselves with them."

Mrs. Wall's husband, Warren, is senior chaplain at APCI, approved by the Chaplain's Commission of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board. He notes: "Many times our churches are not very compassionate toward the prison ministry. We have been wanting to get our own people involved, but they seem to have the attitude, 'We don't want to do too much for these people. They asked for it. They are coddled too much as it is.' Often the families are touched by the same stigma."

On that Sunday morning three years ago, Flo Wall's ministry to families of prisoners began. She had been a minister's wife for more than 30 years, but on that day, her heart went out to the distraught woman.

In the past three years, her ministry has spread to touch the lives of many women and children, people whose lives have been shattered. The ministry is built around "fellowship, worship, Bible study, personal counseling, providing a place to stay" and reaching out in love.

"We are trying to help people understand that if they will commit themselves to God, and give Him a chance in their lives, everything will be okay," she says. "God knows they are here...what has happened. He could have prevented what happened, but He allowed it and is still in control. We want to help those who are not saved to receive Jesus Christ as their personal Savior and Lord, and after that to learn to receive love from Him, and strength, and to trust Him to make sense out of this awful mess."

Avon Park Correctional Institute, on an Air Force bombing range, is unusual in that families of inmates are allowed to worship in the chapel twice each Sunday. Families may visit each weekend, on Saturday or Sunday.

Until recently, families could visit on both Saturday and Sunday, but that policy has changed. When the Walls' ministry began, they opened their home to feed and house the families over the weekend. The home. a converted barracks building, is small, but on one recent Saturday night 25 persons slept wherever there was space. Wall set up a tent camper to help house some of the overflow.

With the changing of the policy, the space crunch eased, but many of the families still come on Saturday afternoon — driving long distances to get there — so they can visit Sunday morning. Sunday now is a time of fellowship and food, Bible study, prayer time and ministering.

Recently, the Walls obtained a large home near the prison which has two cottages and "lots of space." They are currently remodeling and refurbishing the "villa" to make it both their home and central place for their ministry. "The ministry has just grown from putting another chicken in the pot to the Spanish Villa on Lake Letta," Mrs. Wall says. "It has been so beautiful...the Lord has added and provided. It has been the simplest thing; just taking one step at a time with the Lord."

The effect of the ministry is shown in the lives of the wives:

— "It is beautiful," says one. "I find peace and love here. When Mrs. Wall talks about Jesus, she really ministers to us. Sometimes we hate to go home.'

— "This has been the greatest year and a half of my life. I have never had such peace and joy."

One of the inmates says he feels he is "in seminary" and another comments he believes he is "sitting at Jesus' feet, learning." Still a third, whose family disclaims him, says he is "part of the biggest and best, God's family."

An important Scripture reference to the ministry is Second Corinthians 4:8-10: "We are hedged in on every side — troubled and oppressed in

every way; but not cramped or crushed: we suffer embarrassments and are perplexed and unable to find a way out, but not driven to despair; we are pursued, but not deserted to stand alone; we are struck down to the ground, but never struck out and destroyed; always carrying about in the body the liability and exposure to the same putting to death that the Lord Jesus suffered, so that the resurection life of Jesus also may be shown forth by and in our bodies" (Amplified version).

"We read that all the time," Mrs. Wall said. "This is not the defeat of their lives. We have to be reduced to the simple belief that he (Jesus) loves us, that He is in charge and has grace for everything in our lives."□

# REACHING OUT





- You cannot say "Thy will be done" if you are unwilling or resentful of having it change your life.


# NATIONAL AMERICAN BAPTIST WOMEN'S UNION CONVENTION

- You cannot say "Thine is the kingdom..." if you fear what neighbors and friends might say.
- You cannot say "Thine is the power..." if you do not open your heart to receive the power of God in Jesus Christ and use that power through loving others.
- You cannot say "Thine is the glory..." if you are seeking your own glory first.
- You cannot say "Forever..." if you are anxious about each day's affairs.
- You cannot say "Amen" unless you can honestly say "Cost what it may this prayer, as taught by Jesus, is a conscious act of opening up myself to the power of His Spirit.

The newly-elected president of N.A.B.W.U. (or Nayboo, as we learned to call it) is a pastor's wife of a large church in Kansas City, and the first black woman to hold this office. 


# Could this really have happened?

# ADVENTURE IN GROWTH

Exciting! Rewarding! Spiritually invigorating!

These and many other adjectives are being used to describe an encouraging new "adventure in growth" among Seventh Day Baptists.

Within the past months, there have been —

- more fellowships formed,
- more churches established,
- more students studying the ministry,
- more pastors ordained

than at any other comparable period of time since the turn of the century.

There is evidence, through the growth studies in our churches, that more and more people are actively engaged in searching the Scriptures; are earnestly seeking to discover and utilize their God-given "gifts"; and are experiencing spiritual renewal. Underlying such developments is certain to be — and must continue to be — strong pastoral leadership and devoted lay participation.

Skepticism regarding our denomination's ability to grow is slowly, but surely, being dispelled. How do we now capture the spirit of bold new adventure and really capitalize on our growth potentials? By reviewing the experiences of other groups, some revealing hints can be discovered.

Dr. O. D. Emery, general secretary of Church Education in the Wesleyan Church, recently conducted a survey of the 50 fastest growing churches in that denomination and reported his findings in the March/April issue of CHURCH GROWTH: AMERICA.

Three basic areas of strength, he indicated, appear consistently in churches experiencing growth. These are attitudes, leadership, and outreach.

In these categories, he emphasizes the following points: ATTITUDE STRENGTHS:

"A good congregational climate is much more important than eloquent preaching or an attractive building...A growing congregation understands that God expects their church to reach the lost with the gospel....We desperately need a growth conscience." LEADERSHIP STRENGTHS:

"Growing churches have purposeful, goal-directed, achievement-oriented leadership. Some of this leadership must necessarily be found in the pastor. However, all growing churches have strong lay leadership, as well....As the leadership nucleus seeks to know what God intends for their church, they find themselves extended in vision, humbled by

grace, and committed to serve as stimuli for the entire congregational body in their efforts to be effective stewards of Christ's Great Commission." OUTREACH STRENGTHS:

"In a growing church the method is never considered as important as the task. Under God, a healthy church possesses a growth conscience which prompts it to 'Outreach at all costs,' and then find the methods that will be most successful....A growing church does not content itself to sing 'Rescue the perishing, care for the dying...' as a prayer to God, but rather as instruction and challenge to itself with God's guidance, concerning its own sacred duty."

With reference to the **fastest growing churches**, Dr. Emery highlighted the discovery "that they vary greatly in size, location, facilities, and approaches.... It means that churches are growing in size in rural areas as well as large cities, in the South and in the North, in the West and the East. Growing churches are comprised of business executive as well as farmers, high income as well as low income laity. There are white churches, as well as minority churches experiencing growth."

"We also discovered," he concluded, "that doctrine does not, in and of itself, either contribute to or hinder growth at the local church level. Growth seems to be more related to the broader issue of evangelism and the application of principles of growth by the local church constituents."

All of this should be encouraging to Seventh Day Baptists and helps to validate the growth principles we have been learning and putting into practice.

Equally confirming are "common denominators for both church and individual growth" as revealed in an extensive study made by Seventh-day Adventists among 3,217 members in 28 of their churches. Six rapidly growing churches in the study all had "a deeply consecrated and committed laity."

The writer of the report, Dr. Gottfried Oosterwal, professor of Mission and of Comparative Religion at Andrews University, in the June 1978 issue of MINISTRY indicates that "contrary to the general belief that these lay members should be involved in the 'official' program of the church in order to make the church grow, the findings show that the success of the laity as a factor in soul winning comes through spontaneous witnessing—believers giving an account of their faith in their daily lives and contacts with people at work and in society.

"One of the most urgent tasks of the church, therefore, is to stimulate and to prepare the church membership for this roll of spontaneous witnessing, according to their particular spiritual gifts, interests, and special talents. Lay training should be built on the diversity of the gifts that characterize each local church."

"All the growing churches," Dr. Oosterwal concludes, were, indeed, churches with a very warm fellowship, stimulated by both the minister and the believers."

Of course, not all churches in any denomination — nor all individuals within those churches — are growing. But most Seventh Day Baptists, along with many other Christians, I believe, really "have a deep desire to serve God and to use their many spiritual gifts, their talents, and their funds to accomplish the task for which God has called them."

So, it behooves us to continue to organize workshops in church growth; to establish growth forces in our churches; to utilize our trained and experienced growth force leaders; to set realistic growth goals; and to pray and work for growth.

If we devote proper attention to it, utilizing our talents, our energies, and our resources effectively, our adventure in growth will surely continue. We will set new records and be inspired to shout out, even more joyfully, our praises to the Lord.

Jesus Christ.



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New registration forms are being used this year which can be used either by individuals or by families. It is no longer necessary for each person in a family to fill out a registration form, but one family can use just one form. In the case of family registrations, the number of people taking advantage of a particular package (room and board) arrangement should be written in the appropriate box.

There is real advantage to PRE-REGISTERING and PRE-PAYING before getting to Conference. This will greatly speed up the registration process for you, shortening what could be an hour plus of waiting in line to a short process of having your pre-registration confirmed and receiving a packet already prepared for you. This packet will contain your room assignment, meal ticket, and other materials you will be needing for Conference. BE SURE TO PRE-REGISTER EARLY.

There are a limited number of camping spots available on the Houghton campus. These are offered on a first-come first-served basis. As of this writing, three of these spots have already been requested. Additional camping off the campus is also available, but arrangements there must be made by the camper directly with the desired camping · facility.

No confirmation of pre-registration will be done unless specifically requested. If you wish a confirmation, please include a self-addressed, stamped envelope. Confirmation will only be made prior to July 15.

When you pre-register, pay special attention to these points:

1) The registration fee is NOT included in the package deal. Be sure to add it in.

2) Registration and package deal costs for youth 11-16 are less and for children under 10 are considerably less. There will be nursery services available the major portion of each day. Don't be afraid to bring your family and enjoy Conference.

3) You don't have to worry about whether you managed to get one of the air-conditioned rooms or not. All rooms are comfortable and none are air-conditioned.

4) Conference registration costs for those attending Pre-Con are less.

5) Be sure to include your check made out to "SDB GENERAL CONFERENCE HOST COMMIT-TEE."

6) Be sure to add correctly and send the correct amount. This is a common



Logo used for many years. The torch is symbolic of light — the Good News of Jesus Christ, and of the Biblical seventh-day Sabbath. The shield stands for faith knowledge and use of the Word in passing the light to other people, generations and nations transcending barriers of education, nationality, language and race.

The open Bible expresses SDBs' reliance on Scripture as the infallible source of all truth and wisdom. Undergirding the whole structure is the Cross of Christ. From that foundation, the enterprise expands ever upward and outward in witness for Christ. The rising sun indicates the beginning of growth; the arching rays represent the outreach of evangelistic influence into society at large. The sun is also reminiscent of Creation, reminding us of the God-ordained, recurring Sabbatical cycle of rest and recreation which links Seventh Day Baptists with the Biblical base for Sabbath observance.





The empty cross stands for Christianity and the central place of Jesus Christ in the Christian faith. The dove symbolized the peace that the cross will bring by the gift of the Holy Spirit. The sunrise represents the new dawn for Seventh Day Baptists and is reminiscent of Creation and the recurring Sabbatical cycle taught in the Scriptures. The circle represents God's love — without beginning or end, and is large enough to include all who respond in life-giving faith in Jesus Christ.

The circle represents universal harmony in Jesus Christ. The seven-sided polygon symbolizes the seven days of the week with the "Creator's Sabbath" as the base, as well as of the Christian shield of faith. The leaning cross represents Christ (His life, death, resurrection and coming again with power and glory), and the forward action of evangelism and missionary growth, and personal development.



# CHURCH ORGANIZED — PASTOR CAMENGA ORDAINED

"Double-Feature Sabbath" was the exciting experience of Seventh Day Baptists who gathered in the area of Portland, Oregon, on June 3, to formally organize a new church and to call to ordination its pastor, C. Justin Camenga.

Justin and Sue Camenga and their two children came from Wisconsin to Portland, Oregon, in the fall of 1970. After a career in Army intelligence and public school teaching in special education, Justin enrolled in graduate studies in theological seminary in Portland, that year. At first, the Camengas made a round-trip of over 300 miles nearly every Sabbath to worship with the Seattle Area SDB Church, but after a couple of years decided to have family worship in their home, and to pray that God would lead others to unite with them. Through about six years, several friends have come and gone to the little "mission fellowship," but in 1975 the group found more stability and organized as a Branch Church of Seattle. Now four families meet regularly each Sabbath Day at the Camenga home in Portland, Oregon. They came to the decision this Spring that God was leading them to more formal organization and to call their leader to ordination as a Seventh Day Baptist minister.

Sabbath Day, June 3, dawned a beautiful, clear day in the Pacific Northwest. The "City of Roses" displayed its well-chosen nickname and the snow-capped volcano peaks and forests on the horizon helped the Seventh Day Baptists gathered there to proclaim the glory of God! The special all-day services were held at the Salvation Army Hall of Vancouver, Washington, across the Columbia River from Portland proper. Eighteen Seventh Day Baptists from the Seattle Area church joined the ten regular Portland Area people, along with representatives Alton Wheeler from Riverside, John Peil from Los Angeles, and Herbert Saunders from the Council on Ministry, Plainfield, N.J. Also present was Delfin Trujillo from the Bay Area of California.

After a fellowship hour, Justin Camenga led in a devotional worship service, and the formal organization of the Portland Area Seventh Day Baptist Church took place. Richard Steele, formerly a deacon of the Denver church, spoke, with a history of the formation of the group and its development to this decision to form a church and ordain a pastor. Larry Sanford, president of the Seattle Area church, told of the endorsement of this decision from the "mother church" and Pastor Alton Wheeler and others reported the support of the Pacific Coast Association and the greetings from denominational leaders. The church has prepared its statement of beliefs and covenant, and plans to leave its Charter Membership list open for several weeks to see if others would like to unite with the new church. The following eight people signed the Covenant on June 3: Claud Burson, Letha Burson, C. Justin Camenga, Eric Camenga, Steve Garritano, Susan Garritano, Richard Steele and Virginia Steele. (Justin and the Steeles will be joining by letter from the Seattle Area church; the rest have not been members of other SDB churches.)

Pastor Duane L. Davis of Seattle, who has assisted the church in a small way on behalf of the Pacific Coast Association evangelism-outreach, gave the Dedication Prayer.

Following the church's organization, a council to consider the ordination of C. Justin Camenga was formed, including the members of the new church and representatives from other Seventh Day Baptist churches present. Richard Steele was chosen chairman and Letha Burson, clerk, for the day. Mr. Camenga gave a statement of his Christian conversion and experience and the factors in his life leading up to this time. After a bountiful fellowship dinner provided by the Portland Area church, the council resumed to hear the candidate's

The Service of Ordination was conducted by Dean Herbert E. Saunders, who gave a Charge to the Candidate. A Charge to the Church was presented by Dr. Alton L. Wheeler, and the prayer with laying on of hands was led by Rev. John M. Peil. Pastor Duane L. Davis then gave a Welcome to the Ministry, after which the Rev. C. Justin Camenga pronounced the benediction prayer.

Portland, Oregon, is one of the five major cities of the United States West Coast, and with its suburbs has over three-quarters-of a million people. The members of the new church are enthusiastic about their opportunities for outreach and growth, and believe God has given them a fertile field for the gospel of Christ as understood and practiced by Seventh Day Baptists. The four families now regularly represented live in an area covering about thirty miles in Oregon and Washington State, and they visualize that God may be leading to several potential areas for new churches in the days ahead. Their immediate goals include finding a public place for worship, further advertising and follow-up, incorporation in the state of Oregon, and becoming a member of the Seventh Day Baptist General Conference, as they seek for new ways to witness and serve the Lord in their region. □

Rev. Francis D. Saunders Berea, W. Va.

- Be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God. (Romans 12:2)
- Through the years this verse has come to mean more and more to me; perhaps because I am aware of our natural tendency to mold the image of our Christian experience into that of the world in which we live. We are prone to pattern our witness to the standards set by the world. Our voices join the jargon of its language! We bounce to the beat of its rhythm! # HISTORICAL SOCIETY TRUSTEES SUPPORT RESTRUCTURING

The June 4 meeting of the Historical Society trustees endorsed proposed revisions of the General Conference bylaws which will create a Conference Council to replace the Commission and Planning Committee. The Rev. Albert N. Rogers, president, of Alfred Station, N.Y., said the proposals recognize the Historical Society as one of several agencies related to General Conference.

Thomas L. Merchant, historian, compared the new plan to the federal government in which there are allocations of responsibility and wide representation. Checks and balances protect essential principles, he pointed out, as well as our basic loyalties. Concern was expressed for mutual respect across the denomination and flexibility in future structure changes which may be necessary.

Frederik J. Bakker was recognized for his twenty-five years of service as a trustee of the Society. He and Mrs. Bakker also celebrated with a special cake at the buffet luncheon at Mr. and Mrs. Merchant's home for members of the Society following the meeting.

The annual Historical Society meeting, postponed from its usual date in May, reelected the Rev. C. Harmon Dickinson, Richburg, N.Y., as a trustee for five years. He also was reelected treasurer. Mr. Rogers continues as president and other officers are Atty. Frederik J. Bakker, Plainfield, N.J., secretary, and the Rev. Everett T. Harris, Westerly, R.I., and the Rev. Victor W. Skaggs, North Loup, NE, vice-presidents.

Commendation was voted for Miss Diane Thorngate, Monterey, CA, for her inventory of historical materials in the Milton, WI, Seventh Day Baptist Church. Miss Thorngate also assisted the historian as a dedicated worker in the Society vaults for several weeks last Fall.

Publishing the Register of the Cohansey (Shiloh) Seventh Day Baptist Church as edited by Ernest K. Bee, Jr., Upper Marlboro, MD, was noted. Sale of this publication has begun in South Jersey as a Sabbath School project, Merchant said, and will be opened to the public

shortly as a valuable eighteenth century research tool.

Accessions to the library were listed in the annual statement to General Conference approved by the Society.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. North were introduced as Life Members and a number of new, active members were noted.



### SATURDAY SCHOOL BRINGS RESULTS

BALTIMORE, MD. — A black Baptist minister here has found that switching "Sunday school" to Saturday has resulted in a new surge of activity and participation, especially among youth.

Dr. Harold H. Carter, pastor of New Shiloh Baptist Church here, said the congregation was faced with declining Sunday school attendance partly due to the lack of time available after Sunday worship for an adequate study program. "About 800 people showed up for worship service, but we were lucky if 100 would show up for Sunday school," he said.

He said he decided in 1973 to transfer the Sunday school concept, with its emphasis on Bible study, to Saturday morning. The idea proved successful.

There are now some 450 persons, ranging in age from 8 to 75, including 50 teen-agers, who regularly attend the Saturday church school. Age groups meet for Bible study from 10 to 11:30 a.m. and then break into groups for other activities. Dr. Carter said that "the most significant thing about the program's success is that it has brought the young adults into the church. That's been the biggest problem facing all churches -- failure to get the teenagers."

# FEDERAL WORKERS PROTECTED BY NEW SABBATH LEGISLATION

WASHINGTON (BP) — Federal employees whose religious obligations require them occasionally to miss work would be allowed to work overtime under a provision of the Federal Employees Flexible and Compressed Work Schedule Act of 1978, which has passed the House of Representatives.

Present policy does not allow such compensatory time because the time-and-a-half pay rate for overtime is too expensive. Under the new law the overtime pay for work to make up time lost for religious obligations would be at the normal pay rate.

Rep. Stephen J. Solarz (D.-N.Y.), who has introduced the amendment, noted that "members of minority faiths must either choose between reduced incomes or diminished annual leaves if they are to abstain from work during certain periods of time, as they are required to do by their religion."

The Solarz amendment would allow employers to provide overtime work at a normal pay rate on days when an employee has no religious obligations — but would not require that such overtime be provided.

Rep. Robert F. Drinan (D. -Mass.), a Roman Catholic priest, introduced a bill last year which would have provided much more sweeping protection of minority groups' religious rights. That measure would have required an employer to respect religious beliefs, practices, and observances of employees unless such an accommodation would cause "severe pecuniary or other material loss" to the employer.

Drinan's bill has not been acted on by the House. In the meantime, Solarz' more limited measure will go next to the Senate.

LOS ANGELES, CALIF. — The launching of a mercy ship to assist hundreds of Vietnamese boat refugees was announced today by Dr. Stan Mooneyham, president of World Vision International.

Called "Operation Seasweep," the relief effort will be carried out by a 345-ton, 188-foot-long, LST-type landing ship. Its mission will be to cruise the South China Sea and the Gulf of Thailand and give aid to the boat refugees.

"Our relief help is certainly not a cure-all," Mooneyham said. "It is just a first step to keep these people alive until the various governments involved can resolve the resettlement issue and allow them to find a permanent home."

He explained that the mercy ship will provide the refugees with packages of food, water, medicines, clothing and personal hygiene items. In addition to the normal crew, a medical doctor, two nurses and two mechanics will be on board. The mechanics will handle engine and boat repairs when needed and a limited number of spare boats will be available to replace those badly damaged.

According to reliable estimates, about 1,500 people are leaving Vietnam each month via small fishing boats. As many as 5,000 boat refugees are on the high seas at any given time. The boats are overcrowded, they have little food, water or fuel, and they are often attacked by pirates who rob, rape and sometimes murder the refugees. It has been reported that some Southeast Asia countries are not permitting the boat people to land; where landing is permitted, "freedom" is restricted to crowded refugee camps until Western nations agree on a resettlement program.

Mooneyham estimated the cost of the relief ship operation to be about \$50,000 per month. Additional funds are also being sought by World Vision to help assist 101,000 other Indo-China war refugees in several holding camps in Thailand.

World Vision is a Christian humanitarian agency whose ministries include childcare, disaster relief and development, evangelism and strengthening of Christian leadership throughout the world. □

### **SWORDS INTO PLOUGHSHARES**

In recent weeks the United Nations General Assembly has convened a historic special session to consider world disarmament. It is the largest disarmament conference in history — and the first since 1932 that has brought virtually all the nations of the world together.

Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim said: "Unless an end is put to the arms race and unless a vigorous process of disarmament is initiated, there can be no guarantee that relations among states would be based on the principles of national independence and sovereignty."

Elsewhere in this issue we have shared with you the Baptist World Alliance (BWA) resolution regarding disarmament. The BWA desk at the UN is maintained very capably by Mrs. Eleanore Schnurr. Your editor appreciates his recent conference with Mrs. Schnurr and tour of the UN Church Center. Mrs. Schnurr supplies information to all Baptist publications regarding developments in all areas at the UN.

The idea for a study on world disarmament has taken seventeen years to bring to life. The session will not actually conduct any negotiations. It is, in effect, an international town meeting that can only mobilize government and world public opinion. As Winston Churchill once said: "It's better to jaw, jaw; than to war, war."

Christians should show an interest in efforts to bring about better living conditions in the world, peace and the lessening of hostilities everywhere. We observed with keen interest the results of this special session and pray that God's will may be accomplished.

# Statement of the BAPTIST WORLD ALLIANCE

The Baptist World Alliance calls upon the statesmen and stateswomen of the world to intensify their efforts to reduce the level of standing armies, navies, offensive weapons, and defensive weapons, and to permit a larger proportion of goods and services produced by the peoples of the world to be used toward increasing the quality of life in all nations and dependencies.

The Baptist World Alliance is an association of 109 Baptist conventions/unions (free "national churches" as they are called by other religious forces) around the world. The largest number of our affiliates are in the countries often called "Non-Aligned," but we also have affiliates in many of the countries of the NATO group and of the Warsaw Pact group.

There follow excerpts from some recent statements on disarmament:

From a 1970 Resolution on World Peace and Reconciliation

We reaffirm the deep devotion of Baptists to peace and reconciliation for all humanity on this earth under God;...

We call upon the statesmen of the world to intensify their efforts and to take initiatives for peaceful and just solutions of international disputes and differences, and toward that end, to

- strengthen and improve the United Nations,...
- seek agreements for the limitations of both offensive and defensive strategic weapons,
- seek immediate agreements to suspend the further deployment of all offensive and defensive nuclear strategic weapon systems, subject to national verification or such other measures of observation and inspection as may be appropriate,
- encourage all efforts for peace by way of international conferences,
- strive for justice and fullness of life for all people of all races,
- contribute toward the progress of all peoples in overcoming hunger and disease and poverty.

### From a 1975 Resolution on World Peace

We are encouraged by some contemporary improvements in international relations including conferences on arms limitation, control of nuclear weapons, arbitration efforts, and the current detente; yet we deplore the violence and armed conflict persisting in many parts of the world....

In the face of world hunger and massive human need on every hand, we call upon governments to abandon the evil acceleration of the fantastically costly armaments race, to turn away from national greed in the sale of armaments, and to cooperate in the removal of economic and political incentives to war.

### From a 1977 Resolution on World Peace

We commend all national leaders who are striving for a just and peaceful solution to the problems in all troubled areas.

We commit ourselves anew to pray and to work with all others who cherish the achievement of this goal.

We pledge ourselves to work with a sense of urgency for all things that make for peace, remembering the words of Christ, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God."


