# The changing face of missions

During the last 150 years, the great force for world evangelization has come from Europe and North America, with tens of thousands of missionaries being sent to almost every country in the world. The pace was accelerated following World War II, and in the 40 years since, new records have been set.

But with the "coming of age" of mission work in many lands, the national church has their own trained leaders, pastoral training schools, and some are sending missionaries of their own. For most agencies, the goal was to develop a selfpropagating, self-governing, selfsupporting national church. Thus there came the "Three Self Movement," even though the first two seemed easier than the third.

In the last 35 years, the SDB Missionary Society has sought to train and encourage national leadership on the fields where missionaries were sent. This has resulted in having independent national church conferences led by trained and experienced church leaders. It has been several years since missionaries were last sent to Guyana, South America or Jamaica, West Indies. After their second and shortened—term in the Philippines, Rod and Camille Henry were able to be the first, and last, missionary couple to the Seventh Day Baptist Philippine Convention.

The only field with Seventh Day Baptist missionaries now is Malawi in Africa. David and Bettie Pearson, who first went to then Nyasaland in 1954, continue a vital ministry with the Central Africa Conference of Seventh Day Baptists. David is dean for the students studying for pastoral service at Likabulu Bible School in Blantyre and leads in Christian Education and outreach ministries. Bettie

has, for the last few years, acted as medical administrator for the four clinics, hospital and mobile clinics which are run by the conference in cooperation with the Private Hospital Association of Malawi. New Malawian leadership is being trained and receiving experience to carry on this administration.

One of the new "calls" for mission support is coming from new nondenominational agencies that have been established to give support to national pastors in many lands. These agencies point out the tremendous difference in such support compared to the cost of missionaries coming from another land. The appeal is great, but there are difficulties in determining who to hire, how much to pay, and how their ministries are accountable. Too often jealousy is bred and the work of the Lord hindered. Such an arrangement may be

more suitable to church groups having centralized control, too. But those having congregational polity find that such practice can be damaging when local churches are not responsible for their leadership support. The foreign-paid pastor may have difficulty with his role and relationships. Effective stewardship that would allow a local congregation to support their pastor is not taught and may not be possible.

The SDB Missionary Society continues to relate, with limited regular financial support, to national conferences in six countries—Burma, India, Guyana, Jamaica, Malawi, and the Philippines. Some is designated for specific projects or ministries. In return, regular financial reports and other reports are shared with the Board. Through the years, the amount of non-designated funds sent has been reduced so that each of the national conferences is more independent and self-supporting.

When missionary leadership is continued, then the call for a second, or following term, is made by both the national conference and the Missionary Society. Guidelines for their service, a job description and the awareness that their ministry is something that cannot be done by a national pastor is always sought. Thus the missionary works with, and under, the national leadership.

Sister conferences have also sought to reach out into other areas and neighboring countries. Several years ago, we worked with the Central Africa Conference when they sent one of their pastors to serve in Kenya for nine months. They have churches in Mozambique and former correspondence with leaders in Zimbabwe. The church in Brazil has some congregations in Argentina and missionary outreach in Paraguay.

As the local church becomes alive and obedient to God's Word, they will reach out in their own area and be led to also

# Leaders in T.I.M.E. Training In Ministry and Extension

T.I.M.E. is expanding around the country to reach Seventh Day Baptist church leaders with quality theological training. We have started a new group of trainees with seminars to be held in our Boulder/Denver (Colorado) churches. The first training module with home study and seminar as been completed by these 10 new trainees. At the same time, seven trainees have finished three training modules with two seminars held in our

Seventh Day Baptists have always had full-time pastors who have served our churches without the benefit of the Los Angeles Seventh Day Baptist theological education.

> eastern training center in Salemville, Pennsylvania.

This exciting new project is designed to take theological training to those who have been called of God for ministry but are not able to go for formal theological education at a theological seminary. We are training only those who are already actively involved in ministry. The T.I.M.E. trainees are evenly divided between fulltime pastors, bi-vocational pastors, and church planters.

Full-time pastors

Seventh Day Baptists have always had full-time pastors who have served our

churches without the benefit of theological education. Now we are able to bring training to these church leaders while they serve our churches in full-time ministry.

Ronald Elston serves our newest church as an extension pastor in Neelyville, Missouri. Eugene Smith is pastoring the Adams Center Seventh Day Baptist Church in New York. Bill Bowyer, a retired school guidance counselor, now serves our church in Schenectady, New York. Charles and Faye Thomas are serving the Hebron, Pennsylvania, and Little Genesee, New York, Seventh Day Baptist churches. Bobby Wright ministers in the Blountville Seventh Day Baptist Church in Tennessee. Oscar Godoy is working with Filipinos as an evangelist of

Each of these persons serves the church full-time while getting their theological training through Training In Ministry and Extension.

**Bi-vocational pastors** 

Many of our churches are not yet large enough to support a pastor to minister with them on a full-time basis. Some churches solve this problem by calling pastors to serve the local church on a part-time basis while working outside of the church to provide the additional support needed. These pastors must be specially gifted and called to minister bivocationally to the local church. T.I.M.E. is training several of these bi-vocational pastors.

Keith Mogle, a telecommunications specialist for Weyerhauser, is also the new pastor of the Centralia Seventh Day Baptist Church, Washington. Mary Esther Jones is pastoring our Seventh Day Baptist Church in Fouke, Arkansas, while nursing part-time. Robert Coffman of St.

Petersburg, Florida, and William Sharon of Wichita Falls, Texas, are both bivocational pastors. Herlitz Condison, an electrical engineer, is church leader in Toronto, Canada.

Church planting, bi-vocationally

Starting new churches is one of the best ways for Seventh Day Baptists to grow. However, church planting requires church planters. Because of Training In Ministry and Extension, Seventh Day Baptists are now able to respond to those asking for help in starting new Seventh Day Baptist churches in their community. We can—and are—taking theological training to those whom God has called to church planting. All of the church planters in the T.I.M.E. program are bi-vocational.

Leslie Patrow is working with Terry Patrow and Paul Robles in a church planting situation in Colorado Springs, Colorado, (a branch of the Denver church). Dale Smalley is working with the

New Auburn, Wisconsin, church in starting a new church in Imalone, Wisconsin. Andy Samuels is working with an outreach in Brooklyn, New York. Richard Evans is starting a new church in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, and Jim and Cindy Gardiner are starting a new branch church in Rapid City, South Dakota, (a branch of the Denver church).

Dr. Jim Gardiner, a psychologist and church planter in Rapid City, is excited about his involvement in Training In Ministry and Extension:

"It is making a major impact on my life and ministry. I felt the materials were pertinent, brief, and very interesting. The seminar was interesting and uplifting with a good balance between the structure (getting through the material) and flexibility (discussing problems). This program is also providing me with a support system of other pastors and leaders that I feel strong emotional ties with and can encourage along the way." SR

## New Burma church dedicated

The new Tuingo SDB church building was dedicated on Thursday evening, October 23, 1986, at 6 p.m., followed by worship services. Village council members delight of all the SDBs. I contributed and church leaders of other denominations were invited.

Actually, the building was not fully completed. Timber walls for both sides were not yet fixed as funds kept by the treasurer in Tahan, in K100. bank notes, were demonitized. This paralyzed the process and delayed the project, but the work is continuing.

Two families joined the local congregation in Tuingo. Some more families are likely to join soon. Nine persons, including six teen-age girls, were baptized on Sabbath afternoon, October

donated his fat bull-calf for the joyful inauguration and communal feeding on Sunday, October 26—a great feast for the K500. for this special occasion.

We rented a loudspeaker for three days and three nights, so the whole village of about 700 households heard our messages. We were blessed by the Holy Spirit, and the meeting was a grand success.

The work in Rangoon is progressing. Givings are increasing.

# An idea whose T.I.M.E. has come

"There is one thing stronger than all the armies in the world, and that is an idea whose time has come." I have a warm and fond memory of Rev. Elmo Fitz-Randolph (Randy), my pastor while I was a member of the Boulder Seventh Day Baptist Church, using this quote from Victor Hugo as he encouraged me in the work and programs of the church.

The idea of "Double in a Decade" arose out of Commitment to Growth in the mid 1970's and emerged as a full-grown goal of Seventh Day Baptists by Conference action in 1979. Dr. K. D. Hurley, then Executive Secretary, wrote in the November 1979 issue of The Sabbath Recorder, "Seventh Day Baptists - with faith, determination, and enthusiasm - have launched a Decade of Discipleship with a goal for the 1980's to 'double in a decade' ... To accomplish this goal, General Conference approved a schedule for the 1980's in which the first year would be an introductory year and the next nine years were to emphasize three-year cycles - nurture, extension, and ministry."

Nature & Purpose **Ministry** Cycle

While I was aware of these plans and goals I was not involved with the task of accomplishing them in a meaningful way until I entered the pastorate in 1983, serving the Upper East Tennessee Seventh Day Baptist Church in Blountville, Tennessee. After a couple of years in the pastorate, I realized that while faith, determination, and enthusiasm are good and necessary qualities to possess when approaching such a goal as this, there was something else needed. There seemed to me to be a great gap between possessing these qualities and actually accomplishing the goal. I felt a deep need for some sort of structure to bridge this gap. Enter, T.I.M.E.

I entered the Training In Ministry and Extension (T.I.M.E.) program in March, 1986. T.I.M.E. is a three-year course of study presently being administered throughout our denomination through the combined efforts of the Missionary Society and the Center on Ministry. It is for those persons presently engaged in ministry and extension work of the church. It is designed to assist those who have not completed or had the benefit of formal training.

I needed a way to translate ideas into goals, and goals into tasks that when completed would reflect the nature and purpose of the church. It was during the first course of study, Introduction to Church Leadership, that I found my key for bridging this gap. A more extensive treatment of this may be found in The Emerging Seventh Day Baptist Church, written by Rod Henry for the T.I.M.E. project (available through the Seventh Day Baptist Center in Janesville, Wisconsin). I would like to share with you our experience in the Upper East Tennessee Church of working one idea through the Ministry Cycle found in this book.

Nature and Purpose – Based on our understanding of Scripture we believe that the local church is a community of Christ's followers, organized for fellowship and service, practicing and proclaiming common convictions.

As we began to study the nature and purpose of the church as presented in our Statement of Belief, we discovered that most of our energy was going into worship and fellowship but very little into service, practice, or proclamation. In other words, we did not have a balance in our purpose.

**Teaching and Goals** – Teaching is the means by which the goals will emerge by clarifying to all the nature and purpose of the church. Goals are the translation of the church's nature and purpose into action.

As we began to address these neglected areas, we realized that while we were listed in the phone book and the local papers, we were not visible to our community in a personal way. In short, we did not know the needs and desires of our community; and our community did not know the nature and purpose of our church.


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Structure/Organization and Tasks -Structure is the bridge between what we want to do (goals) and the actual doing (tasks).

This led us to the next step of conducting a community survey. We procured maps of our area to plan where to go and keep track of where we had been. We went into our community, beginning with the immediate area surrounding the church. This also necessitated producing a brochure of our local church (something we had intended to do for years) to be given out along with the denominational tract, "A Baptist Church That's a Little Different." A survey form was prepared to record responses of those we visited as to their perceived needs of the community and what they looked for in a church.

**Evaluation** – The process of comparing what we are in fact and practice with what we claim to be in nature and purpose.

After compiling the responses to our questionnaire, we were then able to see the needs in our community and what the church should be doing - as perceived by the community. When we compared this



# Shiloh to celebrate 250th anniversary

The year 1987 will mark an important milestone in Shiloh-the 250th anniversary of the founding of the Seventh Day Baptist Church.

The church's standing Historical Committee, headed by Florence Bowden, has been expanded to plan special events for this year of celebration. The committee felt that not many churches can trace their roots 250 years in a country that is only 210 years old. (The Delcaration of Independence was signed in 1776.) The committee has held numerous meetings during the past two years for this purpose.

In addition, a professionally printed and bound hard-covered book entitled History of the Shiloh Church is in the final stages of preparation. Tim Bond has given innumerable hours to the writing of the past 50 years of church history which will be added to the history written in 1937 by John Bonham, Rev. Leon Maltby (including a portion written by T.L. Gardiner in 1890), and Anabel Bowden.

Additional sections are also underway for the new history: the Ladies Benevolent Society section is being written by Elsa Scull, the Sabbath School section by Phil Bond, the Female Mite Society section by Beulah Davis, the sections on the impact of the Jonathan Davis family and the history of Union Academy by Florence Bowden, the history

of the Session Room by Mildred Harris, a list of the men who served in the Armed Forces by Owen Probasco, and a membership list compiled by Mary Ayars.

Visual appeal will be provided by 40 pages of photographs-current pictures taken by Charles Ellzey of Bridgeton, New Jersey, as well as pictures from the past. (Watch future issues of The Sabbath Recorder for information concerning the purchase of this volume.)

Meanwhile, Pastor Emeritus Charles Bond and his wife, Margaret, have been collecting portraits of former pastors to be mounted on a plaque for permanent display. Lora Harris has been working on a time line, marking important events in the history of the church, also for permanent display. The Benevolent Society is geared up for celebration also, having chosen monthly programs centered on historical themes.

Finally, potential family heirlooms will be available for purchase throughout the year in the form of commemorative keepsakes depicting the 250th anniversary. (Further details on these items will also be available in future Sabbath Recorder pages.

Total commitment of our congregation's talents and spiritual gifts will be utilized throughout the coming year, just as total commitment to Christ has kept our church alive these 250 years. We will be calling on everyone-our writers, artists, seamstresses, organizers, musicians, builders, mechanics, A-V specialists, photographers, carftsmen, cooks, actors, preachers, planners, salesmen, playwrights, babysitters, displayarrangers, hospitality arrangers and providers, narrators, financial benefactors, researchers, and even our little children-in the carrying out of five unique "episodes" celebrating the various aspects of our church life.

Episode one will begin our year of celebration on March 27 and 28, the actual anniversary weekend of the signing of the covenant in 1737. The Friday evening service will feature the advent of the Cont. on page 13

# Kumar visits Seventh Day Baptists in India

For several years, regular monthly reports—in the form of a daily diary have been shared by Rev. B. John V. Rao. Last year, his son, B. Kishor Kumar, was appointed by the executive of the SDB Conference of India to aid his father in such duties. Using the motor bike purchased some years ago by the Missionary Society to facilitate such visits to the local churches, Kumar spent most of last September in the field.

> in turn, are grouped into Field Associations or Parishes. The statistical report in 1982 noted 62 of these, with 32 receiving some conference help.

Kumar's first day in the field is reported as follows: "Instructed by Rev. Rao, left for Gudur SDB Field by motor bike in the morning, reaching the place at 9 a.m. At Gudur SDB Church, met the field officials and elders. Held talks with them, familiarizing with the church matters. At 10 a.m. preached at the church to the assembled congregation. In the afternoon,

visited home of the members, comforting the sick. Evening prayer meeting was held at the church."

Many of the following days were similiar as he visited Chapalapalle, Venkatagiri, Kalahasti, Naidupet, Tirupati and other places.

Sometimes officials from a field met Kumar at another place to travel with him to their field. Some comments in the visit to the Chittoor Field were: "Here also evangelists are doing good work. Informed of the interest shown by some people to come into our fold. Visited some of the SDB churches, getting acquainted with the people and places. These humble and sincere people need much more than what they have now materially. The field itself belongs to a backward area, and people in majority struggle for their livelihood. They believe and steadily attend the church. Our gospel teams comfort them as to their material problems and help them in any way they

There are two fields near Madras. In the North, "New SDB centres are being planned as more and more people are turning to us." The St. Thomas Mount Church is in the South where "Evangelism and church work by the pastors are good. All the churches are working satisfactorily, and I think much can be done through intensified evangelism since more people are educated and interested. I am new to some of the churches here, and not only the members, but also others had come to see me preach. The experience was exhilarating and praise be unto our Lord for his grace."

There are several fields near the main center of Nellore. "Church work and evangelism is carried out to the best of their ability, and our gospel teams are discharging very fine work, particularly in the Somasila and Rapur SDB fields," Kumar reported.

# Pray without ceasing

Rejoice evermore. Pray without ceasing. In everything give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you. (I Thessalonians 5:15-18)

The above passage comes at the end of the first letter to the church at Thessalonica. Written by Paul the apostle, this letter was to a church that Paul, Timothy and Silvanus had helped establish. It contains encouragement, concern and some rules for practical Christian living. As Paul always does, he includes an admonition to pray, at the end of this letter. In the King James version above we are told to pray without ceasing. The New International version says "pray continually." But the main emphasis here is that prayer is something that Christians should do.

#### Prayer is not an option.

During the last several months, as I have prepared and participated in a seminary course on Spirituality and Ministry, I have learned that prayer is a very important aspect of the life of the Christian. Although prayer is one of several spiritual disciplines, I can

personally affirm—along with my professor, Dr. Roberta Hestenes—that it is not an option for the Christian. All people who would relate to God must have a significant prayer life.

#### Old Testament Prayer.

As I have spent time in Scripture studying prayer, I have become fascinated with the fact that prayer was natural between Old Testament personalities and God. It was just as though that person and God were carrying on a regular conversation.

Here are Moses and God talking: The Lord said, "I have indeed seen the misery of my people in Egypt..."

Moses says in response, "Who am i, that I should go to Pharoah and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?"

God said, "I will be with you." The same kind of natural conversation goes on between God and Abraham or Noah or Joshua or David. It is the same as a conversation that you and I might have.

Another interesting Old Testament prayer experience is the way the prophets not only talk with God, but how they in turn take what God has said and give the people instructions about their everyday lives. In any of the prophets, major or minor, you find the phrase, "Thus says the Lord" with the specific instruction following.

My major point here is that not only was prayer a natural conversation-like experience, but it was every day and people ordered their lives by this dialogue between them and God.

#### Jesus and Prayer.

Early in the lives of Jesus and his followers it is recorded: "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed" (Mark

1:35). It was obvious to the disciples that this time that Jesus spent with God had important significance for his ministry. No matter where he was or how late he had been up the day before, Jesus always spent time early the next day in prayer with his Father God.

"One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, 'Lord, teach us to pray'..." (Luke 11:1). In the verses following are recorded "The Lord's Prayer" as we have also been taught. Jesus' prayers, as recorded especially in the Gospel of John, are very natural although we do not have the same sense of dialogue as we do in the Old Testament.

# Prayer and the First Century Church

Throughout the Book of Acts and the letters of the New Testament, it was obvious that prayer was a significant part of the lives of the apostles and the churches. It is recorded in Acts 1:14 that, while the disciples were waiting for the gift of the Holy Spirit, "They all joined together constantly in prayer, along with the women." After Pentecost the fellowship of the church was recorded: "They devoted themselves to the apostles teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer (Acts 2:42).

#### Prayer as dialogue.

Yes, prayer is not an option. However, it does not have to be so difficult. Jesus did teach his disciples how to pray, both by his personal example and with a model in the "Lord's Prayer." But, as I have read through the Scriptures again, focusing on prayer, it seems much more natural now for me to enter into a dialogue with God. One significant thing I learned was that I must not only take time to talk to God but I

must take time to listen as well. There cannot be a dialogue if I am doing all the talking.

# My prayer for Seventh Day Baptists in 1987.

I do not know about you, but until this last year my prayer life was generally based on my weakness. After I had done everything I knew to do, then I would turn to God and say: "Alright, Lord, I have done everything I can. It is up to you. See what you can do with this mess." He almost always straightened things out.

But, since I have spent a great deal of time in Ephesians, my prayer begins from a different point. In Ephesians 4:16, Paul, the apostle, prays, "I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his spirit in your inner being."

My prayer for Seventh Day Baptists is that we will begin our days in prayer-talking with God, coming to him not out of a position of our weakness, but realizing that we can approach our lives based upon the "glorious riches" of God.

God has provided us with so much and promises us even more. The riches of his spiritual gifts and fruits are limitless and available to all of us. Have a rich and spirit-filled year.

#### Press on to know Christ

There is always an excitement about a new year. A certain anticipation awaits us as we forget the things we can no longer do anything about and look forward to all the possibilities that are before us.

In Philippians 3:10, we catch some of Paul's excitement as he shares with us his heart's desire to know Christ in all his fulness. For him to know Christ, and to become like him, was Paul's life goal. It is no wonder he was continually motivated, for the more he knew him, the more he discovered there was to know.

Over and over in Paul's letters we find him bursting into praise and thanksgiving that he could not contain. His joy was so great that he also wanted all who might read his letters to discover that same joy. We find Paul continually praying that we, too, might discover Christ and his boundless love and goodness. In doing so, he knew that our lives might become more exciting and worth living—as his was.

Think what could happen to us as God's people if our burning desire was to know Christ more deeply and intimately. What would happen to us individually if we began to recognize and understand the wonders of his person more clearly? Surely there would be a growing commitment to become more like him in our own lives. It undoubtedly would cause us to stop saying "What a good boy am I" and make us start saying "How great thou art."

As we begin this new year, let us press on to know Christ and the power of his resurrection. Then our lives will have true meaning. We will discover that our purpose as Christians is not to please and satisfy ourselves. How often we think that doing it my way brings happiness, only to find, when all is said and done, that doing it my way ends up hollow and empty.

Jesus knew that doing his Father's will brought ultimate freedom and happiness, and he longed for us to know this so that our joy might be full. Paul also discovered this truth and could urge others who were not imprisoned to "rejoice in the Lord" while he himself was under house arrest. As we begin to know and trust

Christ, and take him at his word, we will become stronger in our faith, more able to take each new step that leads us to a deeper relationship with him.

To know someone takes effort. It means spending time with them, talking with them, watching them, working with them. It means getting to know their attributes and character traits, and discovering what their values are. This is the same way we get to know Jesus.

Will you commit youself to knowing him more deeply and intimately this new year? It is possible this might be the last

opportunity you and I will have to do this. Living to please him necessitates discarding our own agenda.

You know, we do this in varying degrees with those we love and respect. A husband and wife find there are things they need to do—or stop doing—and things they must give up for the good of their marriage. Most of the time, they find that the results of giving unselfishly brings more happiness than what they might have given up. For example, a full night's rest might have to be sacrificed with the coming of an infant into a home, but the trust and love in those little eyes more than make up for a lack of sleep.

To become a mature Christian requires sacrifice and effort, not just occasionally but continually. We can no longer live, think and act as the world does. Practicing godly living is not for the uncommitted and immature. Paul has said that once you begin this new life in Christ, everything else is pale by comparison. I am finding this to be true. I am committed to know Christ and become like him.

Will you press on with me in this effort?


Lushai books sent to Illinois

They were sent following a providential meeting with Leon R. Lawton on a flight from Denver, Colorado, to Chicago, Illinois, recently.

In late October Cooler wrote, "I have discussed these publications with our two linguists who specialize in Southeast Asian languages, and they are delighted at the prospect of having written materials in Lushai as a part of our Southeast Asia Collection."

Three of the books are translations of Billy Graham's Peace with God, The Holy Spirit, and Angels. The other four are written or edited by Thanga.

Cooler also wrote, "Since so little is published in Lushai, and since so little of that reaches the West, and since there are English translations of three of these works, your donation is a true bonanza of teaching materials for students wishing to learn Lushai. Linguists will be equally enthusiastic about having access to these unusual materials."

Passing the sign on her way home, she said, "Thank you, God, for giving me a job. Thanks for the sign."



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

# Vatican hits "myth" of

The Vatican has released financial statements to "dispel the myth" that a wealthy treasury is available to the operations of the Roman Catholic Church. Predicting a record \$56 million budget deficit, the Vatican has started a world-wide appeal for contributions to reduce the deficit projection.

The official statement reported that \$28 million was received through the socalled "Peter's Pence", forcing the use of special reserves to close the gap. While the Vatican holds enormous value in art and artifacts, the statement made clear that the treasures are not sources of available funds. They are "a treasure for all humanity", the announcement said.

Pope John Paul II has encouraged a stepped-up effort to increase contributions from Catholics world-wide. The Vatican's budget pays for central administration, Vatican Radio and the newspaper, L'Øsservatore Romano.

#### Parents win textbook fight

U.S. District Judge Thomas Hull ruled that a group of fundamentalist parents may protect their children from textbooks which they disapprove.

Stating that he found nothing offensive in the books, Judge Hull upheld the right of the parents to keep their children from a required reading curriculum. The alternative allowed is that the children may read other books at home or in the library.

Opponents of the ruling insisted that such alternatives would destroy the purpose of the curriculum, and would open the door to rejection of thousands of standard texts currently used in schools. Anthony P. Podesta, president of People for the American Way, said that the decision "invites every sect in the country to pick and choose which books it will accept."

The protesting parents had cited many standard texts for teaching secular humanism, sexual role reversals, witchcraft, and sorcery.

#### Baptists clear seminary professor

Professor G. T. Sparkman was cleared of heresy charges in proceedings held by Southern Baptist Convention seminary leaders. Sparkman denied charges that he violated the Articles of Faith of the Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City. Observers said that the proceedings arose from a continuing rift between fundamentalists and moderates of the denomination, following a controversial election by the Convention last summer.

Sparkman is the author of several books on theological themes, and has for ten years been regarded as a controversial teacher. The review board approved his continued service by a vote of 21 to 11.

#### Lutheran numbers down

Lutherans, in the three main bodies, were down slightly in 1985, and total Lutheran membership fell by more than 20,000. The statistics were issued by the Lutheran Council in the United States.

The three denominations holding the majority of Lutherans are the Lutheran Church in America, the American Lutheran Church, and the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

#### Egypitans jail Christian teachers

Amnesty International has cited the cases of ten Christians being held in Egypian prisons for actively viewed as hostile to Islam. Six of the ten jailed were identified as converts to Christianity, while four are North Africans who were attending Campus Crusade training sessions in Egypt.

Egypitan law provides for up to five years in jail for "defaming" Islam, Christianity, and Judaism. Since Islam is the state religion, the law has often worked against missionary activity. Twenty-nine members of Congress have signed a letter protesting the arrests.



# SDB booth wins blue ribbon

The deep blue of an Alaskan river winding among beautiful evergreens and over huge boulders, with majestic mountains in the background, could well have inspired the theme "How Great Thou Art" in the Allegheny Association Seventh Day Baptist booth at the Allegany County (New York) Fair. 
Under God," in red, white and blue.

The booth also contained an attractive and colorful assortment of 12 tracts aimed at reaching ever age level and current problems. Other features were: four specific Sabbath related tracts; a free guide to Bible Understanding Course; and free county maps with an SDB church ad. A moving message, "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy" (Exodus 20:8-10), hung from the ceiling at eye-level.



Nothing. As the load lightens, I pray you too will find the road clearer, the heart steadier and can say with deep felt meaning. "What a great new year."

Try my method of keeping up with the World Wide Bible Reading program of the American Bible Society? This is not instead of daily reading, but in addition to. See if you, too, benefit from the extra exposure. They are grouped in subject matter, thus lending to a cluster reading program, and Christians all over the world are pondering these same words.

Speaking of the New Year, right now is a good time for all you society secretaries to begin to keep track of what you want to put in your yearly report of activities for your report to the Women's Committee of Conference next August. If you jot down things as they happen, the report is a breeze to write up. That is the voice of experience speaking.

From the Women's Department of the Baptist World Alliance comes a newsletter giving many fascinating details of a trip to Bangladesh where a young doctor is doing great things in his ministry of evangelism and healing.

Perhaps I can share part of that with you another time. Also mentioned was the fact that they had resolved to give \$2,000 to the Evangelism and Education Division for Mini-libraries, a collection of ten or so books on Christian ethics, doctrine, how-to for teaching and so on. On her return from the World Federation, our president, Mrs. Shettel, told me that ten of these mini-libraries were provided to persons attending this meeting by the Baptist World Federation. A great reason for supporting this group if your society can do so.

Seventh Day Baptists seem to be in the food business, again, if they ever were not. Several societies have been serving community suppers. Albion mentioned a pancake breakfast and a chicken and biscuit dinner. Nortonville spoke of their fall bazaar. I cannot imagine one of those without some kind of food in that area. Both Alfred and Salem spoke of serving dinners for service organizations and local groups, a good source of income but a lot of hard work for all. I believe Milton also goes in that group. At any rate, we must have a lot of good "cookers" as my nephew used to say.

In Salem, West Virginia's annual report they noted that they had changed their day of meeting to the fourth Sunday of each month, "so that more members could attend." That is an idea that some of the rest of you who have memberships made up of working women might find helpful. North Loup, Nebraska also had a Sunday morning Bible Study, for a time. Whatever you can find to help all members to feel a part of your society is important.

Two messages from the Board: one was brought to mind by a notice from one Society whose Key-worker had reminded the society to be thinking about the Robe of Achievement recipient for 1987. When you send you nomination, please make the nomination as near a biography or resume as possible. The committee cannot write back asking for more information without giving away the fact the person has been nominated. Besides their work in the local church, what have they done Denominationally, in their Community, Ecumenically, etc? This will help a great deal in the consideration. As I have stated before these nominations are kept and reconsidered. If you have perhaps

submitted one which was not chosen and you feel you have further information along these lines that would be helpful, send another letter. The committee will happily correlate the information.

Number two is a message from the S.C.S.C. committee. They are really anxious to get an early start on the projects this year. If your church is going to desire workers, then please be prayerfully considering your projects and get them defined clearly and contact the committee before the deadline with this. Costs have risen so alarmingly that a great deal of effort has to be put into raising the funds to cover this program. We need to start as soon as possible.

Oops, I am still not seeing too clearly. There is a third message from the Nighties for Newborns chairlady, Joy Ross. Conversations and correspondence from Bettie Pearson have led us to believe that more numerous, smaller packages sent with the little nighties are more readily received than the big packages. Also, it is not advisable to mark the packages as "used clothing" unless they are truly that, not just laundered new ones. This is hurting our witness there with the postal authorities, and it seems to make little difference on whether duty must be paid or not. Most important is not to stop now, as the Committee to consider Women's Work mandated a continuation of the project. Diapers and pins can be purchased there so money sent for this aspect of the project will be well received.

From Philippians 1:9-11 (Living New Testament): "My prayer for you is that you will overflow more and more with love for others, and at the same time keep on growing in spiritual knowledge and insight, for I want you always to see clearly the difference between right and wrong, and to be inwardly clean, no one being able to criticize you from now until our Lord returns. May you always be doing those good, kind things which show that you are a child of God, for this will bring much praise and glory to the Lord.

# "Finding" Seventh Day Baptist churches

"Look there. Isn't that strange?

Local churches should have identification signs on the highways, as well as their property, to help people understand we exist. Many have sought us for months and years before "finding" a SDB church. We wonder how many have sought such information and never found us?

The Naylor church pastor "found" us in the listing of the church in Little Rock, Arkansas. The branch church group in St. Petersburg, Florida, did not go that far but knew that the first SDB churches were in Rhode Island. One Sabbath morning, they called the Rhode Island

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information operator, were given the number of the Westerly church and made their first contact. Now this group is a branch of the Daytona Beach, Florida, church.

The new branch church (of Los Angeles, California) in Santa Barbara, California, obtained a church phone as one of its first actions. Within a day or two, even before the number could be published, a lady called information to obtain the phone number of a Seventh Day Baptist church. Today, another new branch group in Thousand Oaks, California, can be identified with this method of contact.

Through the study of God's word, more and more people are understanding the Bible Sabbath. They then seek fellowship with local groups. Those with a Baptist background find it more difficult to relate to other types of Sabbath-keeping groups and need to know there is another option for such fellowship—the Seventh Day Baptist church.

Let us be sure our local church is adequately identified.

Let us have our church phone listed in an easily seen way in the Yellow Pages.

Let us use church listings in local newspapers; but even more vital, let us be sure that regular news items of church happenings are sent in for publication, making sure the editor knows we are Seventh Day Baptists.

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
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


