

" Christians ought not to Judaize and rest upon the Sabbath, but ought to work upon that day, preferring shall share with their poor white the Dominical day, if they are able, neighbors in the subdivisions of the and to rest as Christians. But if any be found Judaizing, let him be anathametized from Christ."

This needs dissecting : 1. To Judaize was to observe the Sabbath as a day of rest, as sacred. 2. To rest a Christians was to rest when circumstances required, and not upon set times, and on holy days, (see quotations from the Fathers, in a former article.) 3. The expression, "if they are able." (eige dunainto.) makes the honoring of the Lord's day a doubtful matter, and depend ent upon their circumstances and convenience, (see Liddell and Scott's Greek Lexicon on the word "eige.") 4. The mass of Christians did not then rest upon the Sunday more than upon many other days, and upon none as boly time, unless they still held to the Sabbath.
