In the fourth commandment it says, "In six days God made heaven and earth," &c. See also Ex. 31 : 17. In order to give definiteness and conciseness to my remarks, I will bring them to bear directly upon the objections urged by our opponents against the binding force of God's Word with reference to what he here sanctified.

Objection 1st. "Though the Sab bath was instituted at the creation, the obligation was not laid upon man to observe it till after the exodus of Israel out of Egypt, as proved by the silence of the book of Genesis upon the subject."

Answer. If the book of Genesis is silent on this subject, then it neither proves nor disproves anything about it : and therefore, if the act of blessing and sanctifying the day, as recorded in the second chapter, imposes any obligation upon man, then its binding force remains unimpaired. Webster says that to "sanctify" means, 1st, "To cleanse, purify, or make holy." 2d, "To separate, set apart, or appoint, to a holy, sacred, or religious use." With this definition, all theologians agree. But this act of sanctifying the day was after God had rested on it, which shows that he did not make it a Sabbath for his own benefit. For whose benefit, then, was it sanctified ? Christ, (who, John says, made all things, and without whom not any thing was made that was made,) declares (Mark 2: 27) that "the Sabbath was made for man ;" i. e., it was made holy, and set apart for a sacred and religious use, for man's benefit. But the Bible gives no hint that it was ever made but once, and that was in

the act of sanctifying the seventh day of the creation week. Who did Christ mean by the word

man here? There is nothing in his language to show that he intended any limited or special application of the word, and hence he must have used it generically as applying to the whole race of mankind. But if, by that term, he simply meant Jew, which must be the case if the theory of our opponents be correct, then the terms Jew and man are convertible terms, and mean the same thing.

But as soon as man existed. then all the reason that was ever as signed for its institution was in full force. And to delay an act after the reason exists why it should be performed, is as unreasonable as to perform it before the reason existed. And to withhold it from man 2,500 years after it was made for him. and all the reasons were in full force that have ever existed why he should have it. is as unreasonable as any of the But truth is never unreasonarest. Therefore. the objector must ble. show that no such sanctifying act is recorded in Genesis, before his objection can have any force or reason in it.




