In chapter 18, we are told that Paul went to Corinth, and wrought at tent-making, and reasoned in the synagogue every Sabbath, and persuaded the Jews and the Gentiles, and he continued there a year and six months. That was the time he organized the Corinthian church, to whom, five years after. he wrote, exhorting each one of them to lay by himself in store, as God had prospered him, for the poor saints at Jerusalem. There he worked during the week and worshiped on the Sabbath, and thus taught them to do likewise.

In the 19th chapter, we are tol that he preached and taught in Ephesus, in synagogues and private houses, two years and three months so that all the dwellers in Asia heard the word of the Lord, both Jews and Greeks.


