NATURE'S GOD AND HIS MEMORIAL SERMON THIRD-FIFTH PART

In conclusion, allow me to throw out a few thoughts, as a summing up.

If the day of the Sabbath is abolished, so is the institution, and so the weekly cycle; for the day is the institution, the only thing about it that was set apart, blessed, sanctified, or commanded to be regarded, and the only thing to which the reason assigned for the institution can apply. But if it was a ceremonial institution, why did God honor it above all other ceremonial laws, and put it on a par with every precept of the Decalogue, by embodying it in that code, thus conferring the same honor upon it as upon either of the other nine precepts? Did he exaggerate its importance, and thus misrepresent its character? He certainly did, if it was merely a ceremonial ordinance.

If the Sabbath was abolished a the death of Christ, why did the Apostles, ever after, continue to cal it "the Sabbath," the same as before, and that too under Divine inspiration, and when they knew they were writing for all future ages of the world? And why did neither believing nor unbelieving Jews ever complain of their showing disrespect to its holy character, in word or deed, since the latter were ever watching them with the most jealous scrutiny, to detect some fault by which they might substantiate a charge against them?

Again, if God abolished the Sabbath, he thus revealed his will, that man should not keep any day: because he has expressed no will respecting the observance of any other day of the week except the seventh. HOW FELT HATS ARE MADE. A reporter of the Philadelphia Press, having paid a visit to one of the hat manufactories of that city. gives the following description of how felt hate are made:

The for generally used is that of the French Cony, the Scotch Cony, the Russian Hare, and the South American Nutris, but that of the Beaver, Otter. Muskrat. and Ameri can Rabbit, is also used. The French fur is worth about \$2 50 a pound in gold, the Russian from \$2 50 to \$4 50; the Scotch \$3 75; the Nutria from \$5 50 to \$15, and Beaver from \$8 to \$10 in currency. The foreign fur is brought to this country neatly done up in white paper, or in brown paper bags, and by the adoption of the necessary preventives, there is rarely any injury detected upon examination by the purchasers in this country.

When required by the workmen, a sufficient quantity of the fur is emptied from the paper packages into a large box, from whence it is removed and placed in a small machine, through well shaken and mixed during its
