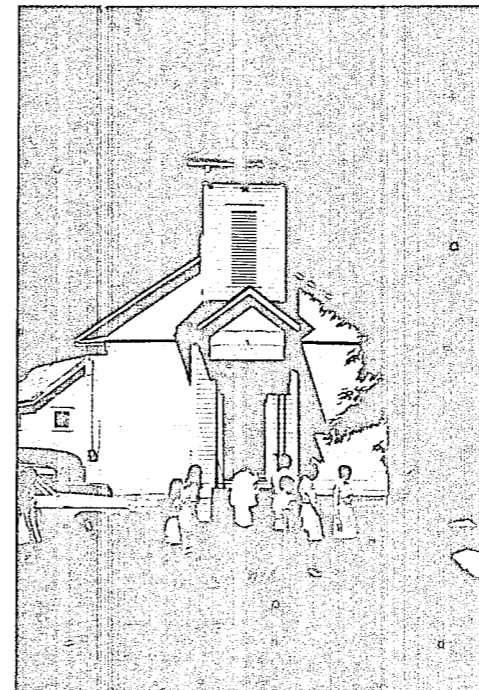

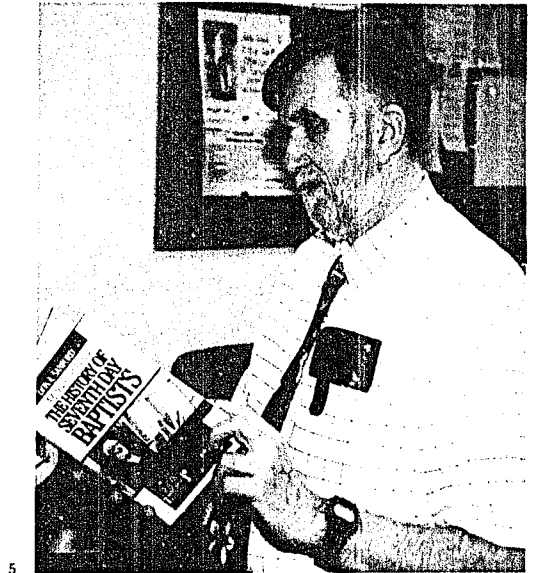
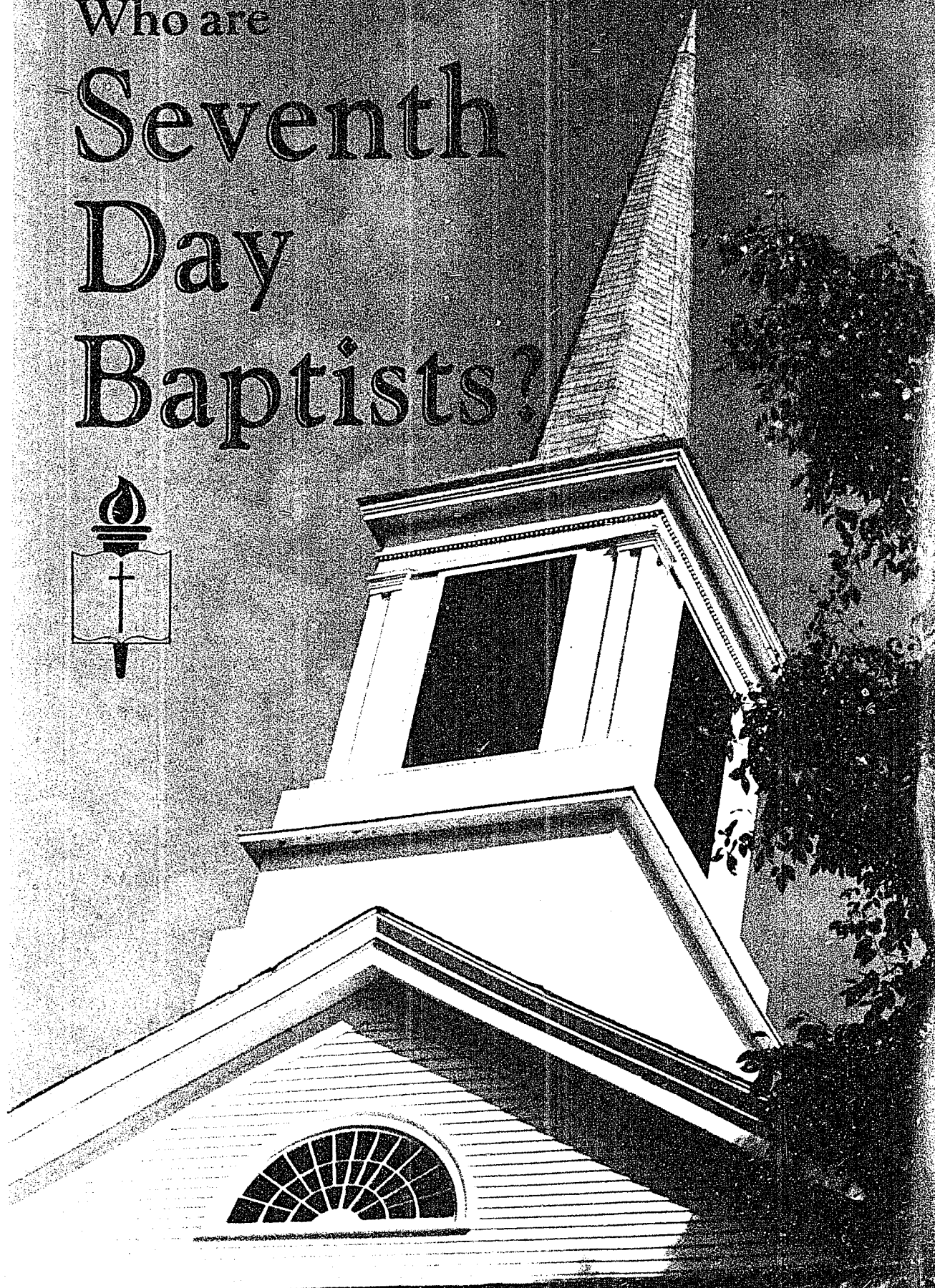


Seventh Day Baptists?

Seventh Day Baptists?



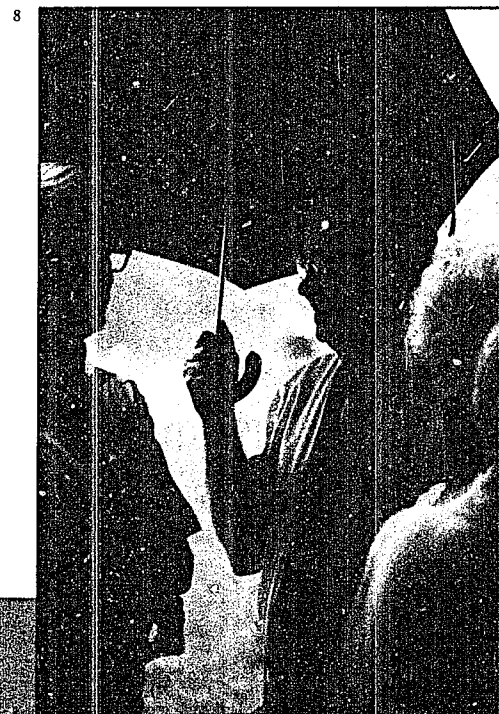

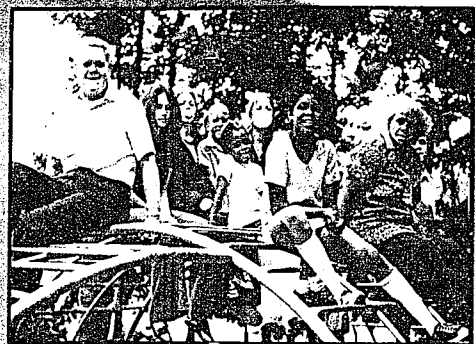

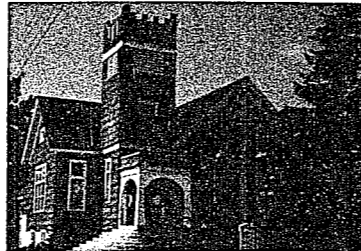


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What do Seventh Day Baptists Believe?

Seventh Day Baptist churches are historically, like other Baptists, congregational in polity. The denomination desires that its churches and members continue to enjoy freedom of conscience in all matters of religion. Therefore, there is no binding creed to which members must subscribe. They do hold, however, that certain beliefs and practices, having the support of Scripture and adhered to by followers of Christ throughout the centuries, are binding upon all Christians.

The Statement of Belief

Introduction

Seventh Day Baptists consider liberty of thought under the guidance of the Holy Spirit to be essential to Christian belief and practice. Therefore we encourage the unhindered study and open discussion of Scripture. We uphold the individual's freedom of conscience in seeking to determine and obey the will of God.

The following statement is not intended to be exhaustive, but is an expression of our common belief, which is derived from our understanding of Scripture.

2 Corinthians 3:17-18; 2 Timothy 2:15; Romans 12:2; Ephesians 4:3-6, 15; Romans 10:17; 2 Timothy 3:16-17.

God

We believe in one God, infinite and perfect, the Creator and Sustainer of the universe who exists eternally in three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—and desires to share His love in a personal relationship with everyone.

—The Father

We believe in God the Father, who is sovereign over all, and is loving and just as He forgives the repentant and condemns the unrepentant.

—The Son

We believe in God the Son, who became incarnate in Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. He gave Himself on the cross as the complete and final sacrifice for sin. As our Risen Lord, He is the mediator between God the Father and mankind.

—The Holy Spirit

We believe in God the Holy Spirit, the Comforter, who gives spiritual birth to believers, lives within them, and empowers them for witnessing and service. We believe the Holy Spirit inspired the Scriptures, convicts of sin and instructs in righteousness.

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We believe that sin is disobedience to God and failure to live according to His will. Because of sin all people have separated themselves from God. We believe that because we are sinners, we are in need of a Savior.

We believe that salvation from sin and death is the gift of God by redeeming love accomplished by Christ's death and resurrection, and is received only by repentance and faith in Him. We believe that all who repent of their sin and receive Christ as Savior will not be punished at the final judgment but enjoy eternal life.

The Church

We believe that the church of God is all believers gathered by the Holy Spirit and joined into one body, of which Christ is the Head. We believe that the local church is a community of believers organized in covenant relationship for worship, fellowship and service, practicing and proclaiming common convictions, while growing in grace and

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We believe that the Sabbath of the Bible, the seventh day of the week, is sacred time, a gift of God to all people, instituted at creation, affirmed in the Ten Commandments and reaffirmed in the teaching and example of Jesus and the apostles.

We believe that Jesus Christ commissions us to proclaim the Gospel, to make disciples, to baptize and to teach observance of all that He has commanded. We are called to be witnesses for Christ throughout the world and in all human relationships.

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The Bible

We believe that the Bible is the inspired Word of God and is our final authority in matters of faith and practice. We believe that Jesus Christ, in His life and teachings as recorded in the Bible, is the supreme interpreter of God's will for mankind.

Mankind

We believe that mankind was created in the image of God and is therefore the noblest work of creation. We believe that human beings have moral responsibility and are created to enjoy both divine and human fellowship as children of God.

Baptism

We believe that baptism of believers in obedience to Christ's command is a witness to the acceptance of Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. We believe in baptism by immersion as a symbol of death to sin, a pledge to a new life in Him.

The Lord's Supper

We believe that the Lord's Supper commemorates the suffering and death of our Redeemer until He comes, and is a symbol of union in Christ and a pledge of renewed allegiance to our risen Lord.

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We believe that in obedience to God and in loving response to His grace in Christ, the Sabbath should be faithfully observed as a day of rest, worship, and celebration.

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We believe that Jesus Christ commissions us to proclaim the Gospel, to make disciples, to baptize and to teach observance of all that He has commanded. We are called to be witnesses for Christ throughout the world and in all human relationships.

People with tradition.

Seventh Day Baptists emerged as a part of the English Reformation, organizing their first church in London in the mid-1600s. At least a dozen other Sabbatarian congregations were established at about the same time, including Bell Lane and Pinner's Hall. The oldest of them all, the Mill Yard Seventh Day Baptist Church, has continued for well over 300 years.

The first Seventh Day Baptist in America, Stephen Mumford, was a member of the Bell Lane church. He emigrated in 1664 and joined Dr. John Clarke's First Baptist Church in Newport, Rhode Island, the second Baptist church in America. While there, Mumford convinced several other members to accept the Sabbath.

Although the Sabbathkeepers intended to remain in fellowship with the first-day church, antagonisms developed. In 1671, seven members of the First Baptist Church withdrew to form the Newport Seventh Day Baptist Church. Soon, the center of Seventh Day Baptist growth in New England shifted to the "Westerly" part of Rhode Island. Other early churches were established in New Jersey and Pennsylvania, and it was from these three centers that the denomination grew.

Desiring to expand the joyful fellowship found at their Yearly Meetings, and to organize for missionary efforts, the churches founded the Seventh Day Baptist General Conference in 1802.

work blossomed in the mid-1800s with the initiation of the first foreign mission, the beginning of publication efforts, and an especially strong interest in education.

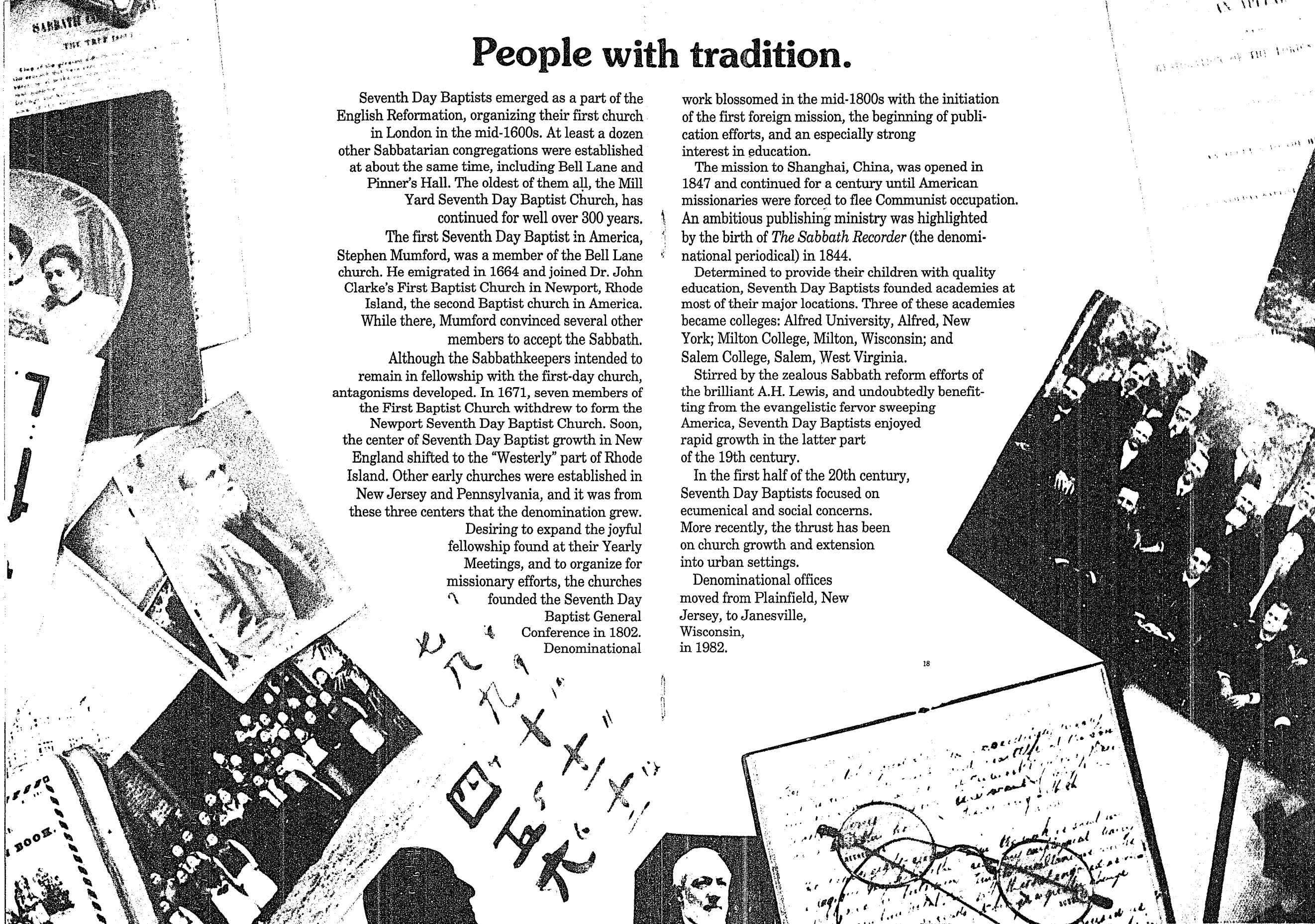
The mission to Shanghai, China, was opened in 1847 and continued for a century until American missionaries were forced to flee Communist occupation. An ambitious publishing ministry was highlighted by the birth of *The Sabbath Recorder* (the denominational periodical) in 1844.

Determined to provide their children with quality education, Seventh Day Baptists founded academies at most of their major locations. Three of these academies became colleges: Alfred University, Alfred, New York; Milton College, Milton, Wisconsin; and Salem College, Salem, West Virginia.

Stirred by the zealous Sabbath reform efforts of the brilliant A.H. Lewis, and undoubtedly benefiting from the evangelistic fervor sweeping America, Seventh Day Baptists enjoyed rapid growth in the latter part of the 19th century.

In the first half of the 20th century, Seventh Day Baptists focused on ecumenical and social concerns. More recently, the thrust has been on church growth and extension into urban settings.

Denominational offices moved from Plainfield, New Jersey, to Janesville, Wisconsin, in 1982.



Who are Seventh Day Baptists?

Worship is an important part of Christian life. Seventh Day Baptists come together on the Sabbath, and at other times, to join in praise to God. Music, preaching, prayer, and the reading of God's Word are the basic elements of any service. Worship, whether in a large church or in an open meadow, is a joyous time of celebration.

Music has been an important part of Seventh Day Baptist worship for hundreds of years. In the late 1600s, the Newport and First Hopkinton (Rhode Island) Seventh Day Baptist churches were among the first churches in America to use choral music in praise to God.

Where do they live?



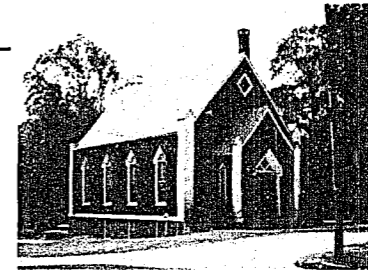
Seventh Day Baptists came to America in the later part of the 17th century. From New England, they traveled with the earliest pioneer migrations through New York, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia. Later, Seventh Day Baptist pioneers pushed farther west onto the Great Plains, over the Rocky Mountains, and on to the Pacific Ocean.

Today, Seventh Day Baptist churches and groups are found in rural areas, small towns, and large cities. A listing of churches, fellowships, and groups can be found on the last page of this publication.



The Pawcatuck church in Westerly, Rhode Island, typifies both the New England heritage and the missionary zeal of Seventh Day Baptists. Through the years, many of its members have served on the denominational board which supports both national and international mission outreach.

Since 1811, the "little red church by the side of the road" has carried on a faithful witness in the rural East Coast community of Marlboro, New Jersey.

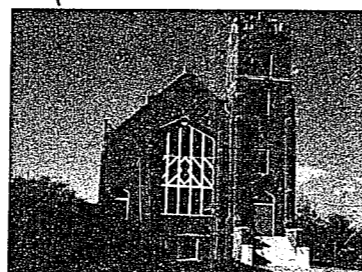
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At the edge of the Rocky Mountains, the church in the mile-high city of Denver, Colorado, was founded in 1928. Recent growth has led to an addition to its modern building.

Founded over a century ago by pioneers on the Great Plains, the church in North Loup, Nebraska, continues its ministry to a vigorous community of farm families.

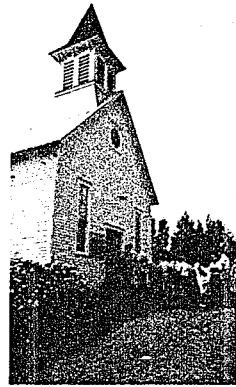
