



# SDBs invade Lindsborg, Kansas for third time in seven years

#### **Business summary**

In its first three days of business, General Conference granted accreditation to two ministers: Rev. Michael Burns of Hebron, Pa., and Rev. Herlitz Condison of Toronto, Ontario.

The 1995 Denominational Budget was adopted as proposed by General Council, a two percent increase in current giving.

Conference accepted the first reading of a bylaw change establishing standard procedures to deal with proposed changes to the Statement of Belief. Delegates also initiated a study of the impact of earlier Conference session dates.

Most other major action had to do with commendations or promoting programs which were highlighted in various agency reports.

#### Who was there?

The Credentials Coordinator re-

ported that as of Wednesday morning, 448 people were registered for Conference, 272 of them delegates representing 58 churches. Our two fraternal visitors were Dr. James Dunn from the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs, Washington, D.C., and Dorotha Shettel brought greetings from the Australasian Conference. Junior Conference registration was 78. Youth Pre-Con had 49, Young Adult, 28.

#### Ministerial Interests

In addition to accreditation of Burns and Condison, the report from the Ministerial Interests Committee highlighted the effectiveness of education programs in increasing the pastoral leadership pool: only two churches are now actively seeking pastors. Currently, there are five T.I.M.E. (Training in Ministry by Extension) students and four seminary students. The report also

noted a 12 percent increase in benefits for retired pastors and widows under the "old retirement plan."

#### Communications

Ongoing high quality of content and printing of *The Sabbath Recorder* was noted with pride in its 150 years longevity and the contributions of many. Churches are reminded the monthly *Lead-Line* is available upon request, in individual or bulk mailings. Don Sanford's recently published Newport Church history and his new book on SDB polity, *Greater Than Its Parts*, are commended for a variety of uses.

#### Missions

Conference encouraged the Missionary Society to develop guidelines for short-term youth missionary service. Delegates also urged




#### Program memories

that the Society seek funding for additional national workers. Churches are encouraged to look for community outreach opportunities to help counsel families through marriage, parenting, and children's programs.

Note was made of the current service of Val Bennet (Hope, Pa., church) in Guyana, and of the summer work of Grace Camenga (Daytona Beach, Fla., church), and the Natural Evangelism Training (NET) team in Jamaica.

#### **Budget and Finance**

Conference urged raising the price of *The Helping Hand* in the United States to be more in line with actual printing costs.

The 1995 budget of \$795,214 calls for \$346,882 to come from current giving, a two percent increase over 1994.

#### Youth Interests

The Youth Committee report (along with several others), commended the new summer music group ministry, "Stained Glass," and recommended its continuance.

Conference accepted the recommendation that the Board of Christian Education reevaluate the policy on dancing at Conference youth activities. The Board was asked to prepare a youth Bible study on the issue to be included in next year's Conference program. The committee also requested a list of relevant youth activities policies by January preceding each Conference.

#### **Christian Education**

Recommendations from the Christian Education Interests Committee emphasized promoting the commendable materials already developed (Nurture Series, Sabbath Visitor, Helping Hand, Pre-Con Retreats, etc.) and ongoing support of "Stained Glass."

#### Women's Interests

All Women's Board projects were recommended for continuation. President Donna Bond was commended for her involvement with North American Baptist Women's Union, and her anticipated attendance at the 1995 Baptist World Alliance Congress in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

#### Final session

Conference completed its business 10 minutes early during the last session on Friday morning. Reports from the Christian Social Action, Young Adult, Reference and Counsel, and Nominating Committees were quickly accepted with no discussion.

Rev. John Peil is the new General Conference President-Elect to

serve as President of the 1996 sessions. He was re-elected to a second three-year term on the General Council. Peil, of Rialto, Calif., is pastor of the San Gabriel Valley, Calif., SDB Church of Faith.

Rev. Herlitz Condison, pastor of the Toronto, Ontario, SDB Church, was elected to a three-year term on the General Council, replacing outgoing member and past-president James Skaggs of Madison, Wis.

Myrna Cox of Denver, Colo., thus becomes President of Conference for the 1994-95 year. She will preside over next summer's sessions at West Virginia Wesleyan College in Buckhannon, W.Va. New second vice president Stanley Allen will serve as Host Committee Chairman.

Leland Pike of the San Gabriel church and Leah Martin of Salemville, Pa., replace Vivian McNeme and Lana Van Horn on the Christian Social Action Committee.

Incumbents were re-elected to all other major offices, council and committee positions: Luan Ellis and William Shobe to the Council on Ministry; Kenneth Burdick and Dale Rood to the Faith and Order Committee; Jim Goodrich to the Committee on Support and Retirement; Cheri Appel and Joel Osborn to the Tract and Communication Council; Myron McPherson, Stephen Pierce, and Richard Shepard to the Memorial Fund Trustees: Camille Henry and Janet Butler, recording secretaries; and Calvin Babcock, Denominational Treasurer.

## Proposed bylaw change: accepted as first reading

Article II. Beliefs.

Proposed amendments to the Statement of Belief may be presented on the floor of General Conference by action of any member church, by the Standing Committee on Faith and Order, or by the General Council. All such proposed amendments shall be referred to the Standing Committee on Faith and Order who shall prepare a report and recommendation for presentation to the next General Conference. If General Conference recommends adoption of any amendment to the Statement, the proposed changes shall be sent to the churches and a "vote by churches" (see Article IV) may be conducted the following year. The proposed changes in the Statement of Belief shall not be adopted unless they are passed by a twothirds majority of the votes cast by the churches.

#### New Young Adult Committee created

In accepting the first report of the Young Adult Interest Committee, created a year ago, General Conference approved creation of a new Young Adult Committee of the Board of Christian Education. Officers are Suzannah Peil. chairman: Lara Bates, secretary: Leeann Rogers, activities coordinator: Myron Samuels and Kory Geske, members-at-large; and Pastor Dave and Margaret Taylor, advisors. Job descriptions were developed to help achieve the ultimate goal of having young adults involved in our churches, and in positions of leadership.

## Rights of the child and sanctity of life

The Christian Social Action Interest Committee report emphasized two specific issues. Regarding the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, intended to be ratified this fall as a protection for children worldwide, churches

are urged to obtain copies and commentaries on both sides of the issue for study and appropriate action.

From the same report came a request for the Conference President-Elect to plan a forum or seminar led by Christian physicians and/or theologians on the sanctity of human life, with reference to issues of doctor-assisted suicide, mercy killing, and euthanasia.

#### New church membership guidelines

Conference revised the 1991 guidelines for accepting new churches into the General Conference.

Text of Revision to New Church Membership Guidelines:

- 1. Send to Faith and Order those portions of the application dealing with faith and practice for evaluation and preparation of a written report.
- 2. Review the written report from Faith and Order Committee with their recommendations prior to the final required visit to the

church.

- Review a written report from the Executive Secretary giving information regarding the required visits.
- 4. Recommend to General Conference whether or not to accept the applicant church as a candidate for membership.

## Letter to Baptists about the Sabbath

In response to a petition from the Southeastern Association, Conference voted to write a letter to other Baptists calling their attention to the biblical principles on the Sabbath and the need for Sabbath in our world. The letter, to be written in the spirit of the 1843 letter Seventh Day Baptists addressed to other Baptists, would be prepared by the Acting Executive Secretary. in consultation with the Historian and the Dean of the School of Ministry. It will be made available for churches and individuals to share with other Baptists in their local areas.  $S_{R}$

# Conference President anticipates a good week

(This interview with President Leon R. Lawton appeared in Monday's Conference Crier.)

## Crier: What did you like most about being Conference president?

Lawton: The way the Lord answered prayer and provided those who are taking responsibility during the week. When I asked people to help out, some said, "Sorry, can't do it." But then the Lord just provided others who were able to. In one case, right after one person had told me they would not be able to be at Conference to help with what I had asked them. I walked out of the room and in the very next room there was a person with the background, experience. and ability that was needed. I asked him if he could help. "Sure, I'd be glad to."

## Where all did you visit during the past year?

I was able to get to every Association except one, the Mid-Continent. I also represented Seventh Day Baptists at the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs, and the North American Baptist Fellowship.

## Did anything unusual happen to you in your travels?

Once while flying from Atlanta to Dallas, my seatmate on the plane told me that he was actually supposed to be on the flight the day before, but he had read his ticket wrong. We soon found out that we were both Christians, so that was exciting. And then we discovered that we were both Baptists. He was returning from the Southern Baptist Convention in Orlando, Fla.

Next, I found out that he had just been named president of the SBC foreign missions board! He shared with me that he was seeking to fill some positions, and had to make a couple more phone call contacts. Using the telephone set in the seat, he placed a call. "Hello," he began, "this is Leon..."!!

## What is God's will?—Some considerations

The Conference theme—"His Will, His Way"—raises the question: What is God's will?


For many Christians, finding the answer is a game of "hide and seek." God has a plan for their lives, but it is not immediately obvious, and they must discover it if they are to reach their full potential for Him. There are, indeed, occasions when God may have a particular task for us to accomplish, but most often His will is that we heed what He has already revealed to His people.

In the broadest sense, God's purpose in history is to manifest His glory. As He says to Moses (Num. 14:21),

"As surely as I live, the whole earth will be filled with the glory of the Lord."

Like a good Chief Executive Officer (CEO), God does not micromanage, vet neither does He leave people in the dark as to His expectations. That is, He gives us general guidelines (commands), which He expects us to follow as we take part in fulfilling His plan. He then works behind the scenes (providence), offering advice or coordinating logistics to help keep the plan on track. He allows people latitude to make wrong choices (e.g., prodigal son) or to waste resources (e.g., single talent), even to oppose the plan to some degree (e.g., vineyard tenders). He steps in, however, exercising His authority (sovereignty) as CEO when there is an actual threat to the plan.

The history of Israel offers a good example of this process. After the initial success of the Davidic monarchy, God's plan did not seem to make smooth progress. He sent consultants and quality control experts (prophets), yet often His toplevel managers (kings) thought they



knew better. He allowed them the freedom to make those decisions until they threatened the plan, at which point He shut down that part of the operation (exile).

Through Isaiah, God explains to the people the reason for His action (Isa. 48:10-11),

"See, I have refined you, though not as silver; I have tested you in the furnace of affliction. For my own sake, I do this. How can I let myself be defamed? I will not yield my glory to another."

The question for Israel was not "What is God's will?" but, "Do we obey God's will?" So it is for us. The question we should be asking most frequently is: Are we following the instruction God has already given? If we can answer "Yes," then we can be confident that when He has some special direction for us, He will make it clear along the way.

Following God's will as He has already revealed it does not mean that the way will always be clear. Returning to the business analogy,

the company policy manual (Scripture) does not cover every possible situation, even those that seem crucial to us. "Should I take this job? Which school should I attend? Is this a good investment? Whom should I marry?" What makes such decisions especially difficult is when-after eliminating the obviously wrong answers—we are left with more than one potentially right answer. At that point, we should be careful not to assume that there is only one way of accomplishing a particular task or shortrange aspect of God's great plan.

When we have to decide between several options on which the CEO or His instructions are silent. His will per se may not be a factor. In other words, any of the options would make the same contribution toward advancing the plan, and He leaves it to our discretion (perhaps even to our preference) which one to choose. In that case, we will simply frustrate ourselves by insisting that God show us which option is His will. There may also be times when He is silent because we already have sufficient information, and He expects us to use good judgment, something we will never develop if He always tells us what to

The point is that we should not view God's will or His way as a puzzle we have to solve. God has revealed both to us so that we can concentrate on the more demanding and rewarding tasks of fulfilling His will by following His way. Sp.

## Youth come up short against pastors

## **Grace grows in Jamaica**

How would you like to spend a month in the beautiful country of Jamaica, meeting people, serving God, and praising His name? It sounded like an awesome way to spend the summer to me! So, when Pastor Joe and Joyce Samuels asked me a similar question last year at Conference, I jumped at the opportunity.

For the next 10 months, I worked each Sunday at a local restaurant to save for this dedicated service project. Through the financial and prayerful support of my home and extended church family—and after many months of planning—this summer dream became a reality.

About a week after I applied for a scholarship from the SDB Memorial Board, I received the news that my application had been accepted.

I spent the first two and a half weeks in the Conference office in Kingston, typing Conference reports and letters, and doing anything else that made me useful. Arriving at the office by 10:00 each morning, most of my hours were spent at the computer until 8:30 p.m.

Each Sabbath service.

we attended church in Kingston. Services began with Sabbath School at 9:30. The Helping Hand is used by the adult classes, and I was told several times how much they appreciate

In addition, I was to attend the Summer Christian Service Corps (SCSC) training held in June, one week before leaving for Jamaica.

This in itself was a true blessing! The week of training was much more than seminars and Bible studies. God gave me a support team that kept me in constant prayer as I worked.

Finally, I boarded the plane that was to take me to Kingston. After hearing countless horror stories about customs, I was beyond nervous when we finally reached "the desk." Surprisingly, none of our bags were opened. After a few questions, we were sent off into that famous Jamaican sunshine.

it. Although it plays a significant part in Sabbath School, very few can afford to buy it.

After Sabbath School, divine worship began at noon and was usually finished by 2:30. I gave children's messages and special music often, but usually with no more than a half hour's preparation time.

Afternoons were spent in groups. There are several groups that meet. I had the opportunity to attend Christian Endeavor, Young People's Meeting, Teen Time, and Bible Study while I was there.


The week of their Conference was the greatest experience of the summer. I spent most of my time teaching 4 to 10-year-olds in Vacation Bible School. It was encouraging to see the children hunger for the Bible stories and praise songs, and grow more excited about them as we talked.

The Jamaican Conference and the Conference of USA and Canada have many similarities and differences. Among the differences are the length and style of the worship services. The Jamaican Conference operates on the principle that schedules are less important than providing enough time for each event as it comes.

Both Conferences share the same sense of family and oneness within the denomination as a whole. It was wonderful to be loved and accepted as a part of the family, just like Conferences here in the states.

This was definitely a summer that I will never forget. The Lord has used it to benefit others as well as myself. The Lord used this summer to stretch me and make me grow.

Before that change, the president had little time to reflect on a theme. Sometimes he might not be nominated until Thursday or Friday of Conference week, then had to consult with his family, his church, and make a prayerful decision so that by Sunday night he could set forth a theme. (General Conference sessions began on Tuesday morning and ended Sunday.)

The men and women who have served as president over the past 45 years have provided a variety of Conference themes focusing on glorification and praise to God, commitment to service and evangelistic outreach. 
In earlier years, she worked with Training in Ministry and Extension (T.I.M.E.) plan, which she now sup-

A photo of the first well drilled by Seventh Day Baptists in Zambia, Africa, illustrates the determination of the people to get the job done. They rented the drilling rig and did the work themselves. The young lady standing beside the well reflects the widespread pride felt for the well. We praise God for those who donated funds to accomplish the task. Many more wells are needed in Zambia and Malawi.

Many people were elated to receive used clothing and blankets from the Zambia SDB Conference. Thanks go out to all who are willing to invest in our sister Conferences.

The Missionary Society also re-

ceived photographs of the brickmaking process, farms and vegetables, bicycle, and Bibles it has funded. These pictures encourage us to continue to send aid.

The photograph of the Kubu natives in Indonesia illustrates that work is being done with that group of unreached people. (Brother Sitompah is pictured serving some children a late evening meal.) Young preachers often pray over the sick and down-trodden.

The biggest problem of the Kubu outreach is coming up with the funds to travel the long distances from one island to another. The Kubu are located on Sumatra Island, not far from the town of Jambi.

Pastor Al Paypa reported on the mission work in The Philippines. He continues to attend school and work with the churches. We need to continue to lift him up in prayer. It can be stressful to combine schooling with family and church responsibilities, yet Rev. Paypa continues to have a good attitude. He is very

determined to complete his education program.

A group of churches has been organized on Davao del Norte, the northern island of The Philippines. They are working through Pastor Eli Paypa, Conference coordinator. We pray for a good working relationship between these two groups and ask that God bless them.

Pastor Lawrence Uchegbuonu of the Nigeria Conference has voiced his appreciation to those who have sent Bibles, used clothing, and money. The Conference is operating a "motherless home" housing 340 youth. They really need help in this area. As in every group home, funds are hard to come by. They continue to build churches but are finding that the cost of building materials is continually increasing. A bag of cement cost \$25, and there is not much available.

The Nigeria Conference requests prayers because the government shows some instability in tolerating the Christian faith. Thankfully, they were able to hold their General Conference meetings in May. Seven churches participated, each represented by two delegates.


SDBs in Malawi, Africa, con-

## 50 ways to love your pastor

(Focus on the Family and several pastoral care organizations have joined hands to promote October as "Clergy Appreciation Month." One brochure is reprinted below. Join with thousands of churches to say to those in ministry, "You are a national treasure.")

Your pastor and staff and their families are the key to your church's future, whether it be growth, discipleship, evangelism, or social concerns. How much better could they perform and lead if they knew, beyond a shadow of a doubt, that they and their families were loved, supported, and lifted up by their congregation.

Below, you'll find 50 suggestions to get you started. Some are for individuals, others for the church board. We're sure you'll come up with more, tailored specifically to the pastor and staff God has placed in your church. Try one or try them all; the key is to look for, and then do, creative things to show your pastor and staff and their families how much you love them. We all gain considerable benefit by keeping our mind, eyes, and ears open for opportunities to encourage and show love to our pastors and staff.

- 1. Write him a note telling him how good the sermon was.
- 2. Write his wife and/or children a note telling them what you like about their husband/dad.
- 3. Drop him a note or funny card just to brighten his day.
- 4. Offer to watch the children to free your pastor and spouse up for an old fashioned date.
- 5. Take him fishing, golfing, sailing, or whatever else he likes. *Don't* talk about church during this time.
- 6. Don't say negative things about him in front of your children or others. Model appropriate behav-

ior, talk directly to him when you have a concern.

- 7. Take the family to lunch after church—your treat!
- Keep a tight rein on your personal expectations of the pastoral family and the church staff.
- 9. Be sure the pastor and staff members have at least one day off per week—then ensure they take it.
- 10. Pray with and for (daily) your pastor and his family. Go by the church office, stop by early enough on Sunday/Sabbath morning to pray before services; form a prayer group for the pastor and his needs; make arrangements to come by the house and pray for the entire family.
- 11. Congratulate, show appreciation and love. We all need pats and strokes!
- 12. If the pastor is not a mechanic or gardener, take care of car repairs or mow your pastor's yard—but only if wanted.
- 13. If there is a parsonage and a committee, make sure they see to needed repairs regularly, but never assume ownership of the home and enter when uninvited.
- 14. Good spiritual, emotional, and mental health should be reinforced—with adequate vacation time. Three weeks is a minimum for people-intensive jobs—then make sure they take it! The church really won't fall down while they're gone.
- 15. Chauffeur the family where there's a need.
- 16. Transportation can sometimes be a problem for a large family. Perhaps a car provided for the use of the pastor and staff during the day would alleviate family car shuffling problems.
- 17. Provide a freezer for the parsonage and stock it with meat once a year.
- 18. Invite others to church.

Nothing says "He's doing a great job" louder then asking your friends and business acquaintances to visit. Then introduce them after the service.

- 19. Provide a parsonage phone answering machine—for times away, days off, and for occasions when it's difficult to answer the phone.
- 20. Ask, ask, and ask again— "How can I help you?"
- 21. Give, give, and give again—tickets to concerts, musicals, the circus (always appreciated and often out of the reach for many pastors); a new suit for the pastor; lessons for the children if you teach, haircuts and perms for the family if a beautician.
- 22. Teach your pastor a hobby—it's a lasting gift.
- 23. Care for the family's health—provide medical services/counsel if you're a doctor or nurse. Be sure to provide adequate medical insurance.
- 24. Make annual physicals mandatory for pastor and spouse, then pay for them.
- 25. A staff membership in a health club is a wise investment for the church and good health care for the pastor.
- 26. Be alert to special medical conditions when preparing meals or expecting participation. Heart patients, diabetics, and severely allergic people deserve special consideration.
- 27. Participation in conferences and seminars for both pastor and spouse are necessary to keep their ministry fresh. Examples include: counseling, evangelism, church growth, etc. Continuing education conferences and seminars are not vacation.
- 28. As a church board, pay your pastor as well as you possibly can. Salary should be flexible and open

to adjustment based on real needs of the pastoral family. On an hourly basis, pastors are often the poorest paid profession.

- 29. Be alert for signs of stress, fatigue, too many meetings, too many programs, and long hours in the office and out. These can lead to burnout for pastor and his family.
- 30. Remember the pastoral family's birthdays and anniversaries, celebrate the anniversary of your pastor's coming to your church and other milestones with cake and homemade ice cream.
- 31. If you have a special talent or area of service, use it for the pastor and staff. If you're a wonderful baker, take some goodies by the church for all of the staff; if you farm or have a garden, bring farm products; offer to do taxes if this is your speciality, or, review insurance or financial planning.
- 32. Allow the pastor's wife the privilege of being just who she is. Don't place expectations on her that reflect former pastors' wives. Love her, learn from her, seek her advice, help her when needed.
- 33. Include them in your activities outside church—golf, dinner, concerts, picnics—but give them the right to decline.
- 34. Allow your pastor's wife to pursue a career if it is her desire and a need of the family. If she does work outside the home, remember her role will be a difficult one to balance church, career, family, and the needs of her mate.
- 35. Buy him something he needs, but wouldn't spend money on himself for.
- **36.** Buy him something totally frivolous.
- 37. Take your place in the life of the church. Find your area of service.
- 38. See that future needs are provided for the family. Help plan for these needs. IRAs, savings and retirement plans should all be reviewed and kept current for the family. No one can know when tragedy might strike the breadwinner of the family.

- 39. Be aware of very special needs the family is saving for. When appropriate, make special contributions to this fund. Be especially sensitive around Christmas time to this need.
- 40. Take your pastor and spouse on vacation with you. It can be the trip of a lifetime.
- 41. Be open to develop a real and close relationship with pastor, spouse, and family. Don't force it or push it. Should these special relationships form, keep your mouth shut! Let the pastor tell others if he wants them to know. Don't expect special treatment or favors from the family because of your relationship.
- 42. Check your spirit constantly to see if you are manipulative in any way in your desires for the church.
- 43. Be real and honest around the pastoral family. Take off your mask.
- 44. Treat PKs in a natural way. They are real and struggling children, just as yours are or were. Include them in activities your children are having.
- 45. Keep expectations of kids in check. Don't expect them to be theological or saintly.
- 46. Just as you know the interests of the pastor and spouse, find out about those of the children. Remember them with gifts or gestures appropriate to their likes.
- 47. As much as possible—protect your pastor's privacy.
- 48. Let your pastor know when you have received a real spiritual insight or breakthrough as a result of his teaching or preaching.
- **49**. Be a consistent Christian. Fulfill at least the minimum requirements:
- a. Attend services and Sunday/ Sabbath School regularly.
- b. Pray for your church, your pastor and his family, and the staff and their families.
- c. Find at least one area of service that your talents, gifts, or desires can be used in.
- d. Be teachable—always open to

learning and new experiences with the Lord.


- e. Forget the seven deadly words, "We've always done it that way here."
- f. If you are not tithing to your church, at least begin to work toward a full tithe in your giving.
- g. Look for opportunities daily to tell people about your church and what you like about it.
- h. Look always for opportunities to tell people about Jesus, who He is and what He can do in lives. Share what He has done in your life.
- 50. Send your pastor or other staff and their spouses to SonScape for an eight-day Spiritual Retreat, where the fatigue and wounds of ministry can be healed in the context of rest, privacy, and creative input.

Remember, your pastor and staff and their spouses consider themselves to be care givers; it will be hard for them to receive care. Be diligent in your loving and caring. Keep on asking, "How can I help you and love you more effectively?' Ask God to lead you. He will make you a caregiver, lover, and true friend of your pastor and staff and their families. God's Word tells us. "And we urge you, brethren, to recognize those who labor among you. and are over you in the Lord and admonish you, and to esteem them very highly in love for their work's sake" (1 Thess. 5:12-13). Sp

## **Tribute to Gary Cox**

#### Denver church choir director retires

The first time I saw Gary, he was about 13 years old and handing out bulletins in the North Loup, Neb., SDB Church. It was Sabbath morning, and our family had stopped there while traveling from Wisconsin to Colorado on vacation. I remember thinking, "What a fine young man!"

Even today, I think of Gary that wav-55 years is still young. And here we are, helping him retire or "retread" after 34 years as choir director of the Denver SDB Church. Since I was organist for at least half of the time that Gary directed the Denver church choir, I've been asked to reminisce about those years during this "Recognition" of Garv.

Gary graduated from North Loup High School in 1956 and gravitated west to Colorado, where he married Myrna Davis on September 1, 1957. They then left for college in Salem, W.Va., for two years. Upon returning to Colorado, Gary attended Colorado University (CU) at Boulder and earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree in 1960. In 1965, he earned a Master of Music degree while teaching in music departments in Boulder public schools.

A big change for Gary came when he earned a Master of Administration degree from CU in 1973. He served in administration in the Boulder County School System until this past June. when he retired to travel.

During all these years in Colorado, Gary directed two church choirs-one at the Den-

ver SDB and the other at several different first-day denominations. The most recent non-SDB church was Boulder First Baptist, which often combined with the Denver choir in performing cantatas and concerts, especially at Christmas and Easter. Gary's connection with a university network provided augmented instrumentations and enabled the choir to perform larger classical sacred works. These performances drew audiences not only from our own congregation, but from the community at large. Under Gary's expert direction, these "volunteer" choirs learned difficult music and performed it beautifully.

When Conference was held in Houghton, N.Y., during the nation's Bicentennial Year of 1976, Gary served as Conference president. and I was Conference organist. Since the Denver choir had recently sung Gaither's "Alleluia," Gary wanted to use it on Friday night as a spiritual experience.

Many "Denverites" attended Conference that year so they could

help with the performance. With the addition of extra singers from the Conference choir, we did "Alleluia" under Gary's direction. What a blessing that performance was!

Gary served as Conference choir director many times, and I was organist on several of those occasions. The last time was in 1980 here in Denver, at Loretto Heights College. We had prepared a special "big" anthem for the Sabbath morning service-"Now Thank We All Our God" by Pachebel. Somehow in the transition between director and printer, it came out in the Sabbath worship bulletin as, "'Now Thank We All Our God' by Taco Bell"! (No, Denver did not serve tacos for Sabbath dinner to our Conference guests!)

On a more serious note, Gary and Myrna, along with their three fine sons (all tenors, like Dad), have been a wonderful asset to the Denver choir and music program. Although Gary is retired, we expect to see a "retread" sitting in one of the choir seats under a newly-hired director.

We realize that Gary will travel a lot with Myrna while she is Conference President this year. Our gifts of a cellular phone (for them to keep in touch) and a beautiful portrait of Gary (painted by the wife of a choir member) will always be a reminder of his many faithful vears of service.

Gary, the church hopes to maintain your high standards of church music. We also hope to follow your ideal of a "flowing and meaningful" worship service. To borrow the motto of the American Guild of Organists, "To God Alone, the Glory." And we add, "Thank You, for His Sake!" Sp

**Editorial** 

What was the Conference theme again?

The point is not our toil, but our obedience. The point is not our achievements, but our submission to God's will. The point is not what we bring about in God's good season, so much as it is faithfully living in His

I pray that we were blessed because of obedience to God's overall will and the season that He has given us. I pray that I was blessed at the Friday night prayer meeting because I was seeking His way to live within that season.

I pray that this season lasts a long time.



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


