The weather, which had been extremely hot during Pre-Con camps, was greatly improved by the time 600-plus Conference attendees took over the campus.

#### Detours on the road to holiness by Jane Lewis

The metaphorical journey to spiritual maturity was led with wit and humor by veteran teacher and healer Victor Burdick in the Thursday morning Bible study.

As examples of Sanctification through Suffering, we considered the trials and suffering of Bible patriarchs such as Job, Joseph, David, and Paul. Modern day heroes such as Mother Teresa, Chuck Colson, Joni Eareckson Tada, and John Conrod were also discussed for our personal comparison. Dr. Burdick asserts that if we want a godly life, we must expect suffering. Following is the heart of the lesson:

Each person mentioned above, in retrospect, would not consider themselves to have suffered much-especially compared to what Jesus suffered for us all. Nor would they admit to have attained to any significant degree of sanctification through their suffering, especially compared to the glory that now belongs to Christ.

However, as *we* observe their lives, we admire the manner in which they have endured suffering for Christ's sake or as part of His plan for their lives. We can clearly see that they have attained to a measure of spiritual growth that would not have

been possible without their suffering. We can see the marks of holiness in their lives.

Each one becomes a model for us—whether the suffering is a result of accident, disease, personal misdeeds, voluntary choices, or Satanic attacks permitted by God-so that we might be encouraged and comforted in our times of suffering. These times of testing and trial are the means by which we may grow spiritually; that is, that we may continue in the process of sanctification.

# **Obligation of holiness is obedience**

We were treated to another lovely Conference worship service as Pastor Steven James developed the topic of "Extreme Obedience."

Pastor James made seven points as he <u>examined</u> the definition of obedience; recognizing that true obedience can only come from a humble heart. He reiterated that obedience is best <u>exemplified</u> by the sacrifice

of Jesus Christ as He gave up His

position to be obedient, even unto death on the cross.

Obedience is <u>expected</u> of us by God. We can point to numerous <u>ex-</u> <u>cuses</u> for our lack of total obedience, but it does not absolve us of our responsibility to meet God's expectation of total obedience.

The family of Jonadab was <u>ex-</u> tolled by God through Jeremiah for their demonstration of obedience over 300 years. Peter <u>exhorted</u> the early Church to greater obedience.

Finally, we were challenged to <u>explore</u> our own life experience with obedience and specifically to look at our Sabbath observance and bring it in line with our obedience to the other commandments.

The *Consumer News* of Cortland, N.Y., published a series of historical articles prepared each month by municipal historians highlighting items of interest from their towns. The May 17, 1999 issue featured the Seventh Day Baptist Church in Scott, N.Y. While it contained some inaccuracies, it was descriptive of the history of not only the Scott SDB Church, but the history of other Seventh Day Baptists of the area.

Scorr—In 1819 a group of likeminded individuals in the young town formed a unique and dynamic religious group that was a vital force for decades before fading away.

The Seventh Day Baptist, or Sabbatarian Church, was an offshoot of the Baptist branch of the Protestant Reformation. Holding the belief that baptism should follow a profession of faith, this group went further in embracing a strict interpretation of scripture, especially the commandment to worship on the seventh day, or Saturday. Asserting this sect behaved more like Jews than Christians, the anti-Semite Puritans persecuted Seventh Day Baptists unmercifully. Many were burned at the stake. [This statement is unsubstantiated by historic fact.]

The Puritans detested the dissenters for their belief in the separation of church and state, as the Puritans equated church membership with citizenship. Those lucky enough to escape fled to the safe haven of Rhode Island, a place Cotton Mather deemed a "cesspool

of religious thought." Families with names such as Burdick, Babcock, Stillman, Maxson, and Hubbard helped found America's first Seventh Day Baptist Church in Newport before emigrating westward to Scott.

The Seventh Day Baptist Church in Scott was run in an efficient and democratic fashion. Built from 1822 to 1824, moneys to fund construction were raised by subscription. An appointed collector went to the home of each member soliciting funds. Those without money subscribed work, and did physical labor.

Leadership roles were chosen impartially, drawing names at random, assigning offices by age and voting. Serving the church was strongly encouraged and apathy promptly addressed. Membership in the church rose from 24 members in 1824 to almost 300 members in 1834. The church had its own school and an abundance of pupils. Extensive revivals in the summertime helped boost membership, with families spending whole days listening to visiting evangelists.

Unfortunately the zeal seemed to turn from loving to legalistic. The harsh disciplinary measures of the church eventually checked the growth of the organization. Rather than reaching out to the community, the church focused upon itself. Exclusion, dismissal, and excommunication were severe methods of keeping the church pure. Regrettably, in 1935 the once thriving church was sold, used for hay storage, and finally demolished in 1965.<sup>1</sup>

While there may be some truth to the autopsy of its demise, it fails to consider the factor of migration which diminished many of the churches in the east and augmented those in the west. Many of the names in the record books identified as "dismissed" were dismissed to join another Seventh Day Baptist Church. Some left for better farmland, but a significant number left for educational advantages offered at such places as DeRuyter Institute, and Alfred University in New York, Milton College in Wisconsin, and Salem College in West Virginia.

On a research tour of New York Seventh Day Baptist Churches, we had trouble finding the location of the old Scott church because many of the inhabitants gave false clues as to its possible location. However, a stop at a cemetery gave no doubt, for the names on the tombstones where familiar. In the membership roll of the church from the book, Membership Records of Seventh Day Baptists of Central New York State 1797 to 1940, the list included 76 Babcocks, 71 Burdicks, 60 Barbers, 39 Lewises, and 38 Clarks, with a liberal scattering of others from Allen to Wells and Wilcox.<sup>2</sup>

Among its most prominent offsprings was George H. Babcock, whose philanthropy through the Memorial Fund endowments is still giving assistance to the work of the denomination. Scott was the early home of Rev. A.H. Lewis, the most

prolific writer for the Sabbath at the turn of the century. Scott claims the proud distinction of being the home of *The Protestant Sentinel*, one of the early predecessors of *The Sabbath Recorder*. While the press work was done in Homer, seven miles away, the editor and founder was Deacon John Maxson, a loyal member and faithful worker in the Scott SDB Church and Sabbath School.

In 1829, Maxson proposed that Conference publish a weekly "devoted to subjects of general interest and the discussion of the distinguishing tenets of the denomination." It was undoubtedly some of the extensive writing of this period that Rachel Oakes Preston shared with the followers of William Miller in New Hampshire that led to the adoption of the seventh day Sabbath by the Seventh-day Adventists.

In Curtis D. Johnson's book, *Islands of Holiness; Rural Religion in Upstate New York*, the Scott Seventh Day Baptist Church is cited as one of three rabidly abolitionist churches in Cortland County which "sought the immediate eradication of slavery and the severing of ties to religious institutions that in any way tolerated the 'peculiar institution' of slavery."<sup>3</sup> *The Sabbath Recorder* of July 12, 1866, lists the names of 11 members of the Scott SDB Church, plus eight from the SDB Society who served actively in the Civil War.

The Scott Seventh Day Baptist Church is dead, but its legacy to the denomination and to the lives of descendants continues.  $S_{\mathbf{R}}$

# FOCUS Executive on Missions visits Poland

In July, I visited Poland, which is one of the countries we have been looking forward to traveling to for several years. Since we hear so little about that country, I wasn't sure what to expect. It was exciting to be able to visit with Polish SDBs, and view their work and ministries.

Poland is a beautiful country. The area around Gorki is an undulating landscape suited for farming and gardening. The roads wind and twist through the countryside, showing off a colorful and richly rugged land that supports families in a grand way. A variety of home styles and family units matched those in the United States.

The Seventh Day Christian Churches in Poland are headquartered in the city of Bielsko-Biala, in the south central region near the border of the Czech Republic. In fact, a visit to the home of Powel Bujok, one of the Czech pastors, is only a short trip over the border. The headquarters building includes a church sanctuary, the Conference office, a kitchen, and another apartment.

Meeting in the office, we discussed the work being done in Poland and the surrounding area; however, they spoke mostly of their work in Poland. They have about 500 mem-



bers in over 30 churches and groups. They also have fellowships that are not members of the Conference. They continue to do evangelism using tracts and books produced in

their printing house. Their printing house, located in Gorki, holds an offset

printer and a Gestetler duplicator. The Gestetler is used to print small quantities of materials, and the offset is used for larger print jobs. The offset printer is used a lot and breaks down periodically. This results in a loss of time and the pos-

sibility that the periodicals will be sent out late. They are currently

evaluating their printing process to determine if they need to replace the offset printer with a copy machine.

The printing consists of many tracts used in their evangelistic outreach program, plus quarterlies, study books, and a magazine. Each item is developed by one or more Conference members and edited by Stanislaw Kosowski or his office staff. It is then handed over to the printer, Slawomir Podziewski. cussed in Poland. These opinions, such as those of president Marek Hoffman, carry a lot of influence, and the members of their Conference look to this wisdom each month.

Upon leaving, we received a warm invitation to return for another visit. Because we could hear the strong meaning behind it, this made the parting even more difficult. They also asked that we share this invitation with others who may be traveling in Poland.

# **Bejjani to lead Council on Ministry**

At a special meeting on June 28. 1999, the Council of Ministry called Rev. Gabriel Bejjani to become the new Director of Pastoral Services and Dean of the School of Ministry. He accepted this call and will begin his employment with COM on October 1, 1999. (General Council, which met just prior to General Conference, voted to confirm the appointment.) Bejjani replaces Rev. Rodney Henry, who became the pastor of the Denver, Colo., SDB Church in late August.

Currently, Rev. Beijani is the senior pastor at the Riverside, Calif., SDB Church. He will continue to live in Riverside and maintain an office in the Riverside church during a three-year trial period to examine the effectiveness of the Dean working away from the SDB Center in Janesville, Wis.

Born in Lebanon on August 10, 1950, Pastor Bejjani came to the United States in 1975 and has been a minister for 25 years. He was ordained in 1979 and accredited in 1986.

"My pastoral call came to me a couple of years after accepting Christ as my personal savior at age 17," Bejjani commented.

"While studying theology in Lebanon, I pastored my first church in the mountains. It was a small congregation of 15 members. Upon getting my B.A. in Theology and Biblical Languages, I pastored a college church in Beirut, and then was appointed the youth leader for all of the Middle East countries. This position took me around the Arab world conducting youth camps and evangelistic meetings." He worked in Muslim evangelism in Libya, Iraq, and Lebanon from 1969-1975.

"My strong desire to evangelize the Muslim population of these countries caused me to form an evangelistic team devoted to Muslim out-

reach," Bejjani said. "However, two years later, the war tore my native country apart. So I decided with my wife and kids to come to the USA and finish my Master's Degree."

He received an M.A. in Sociology from Loma Linda (Calif.) University. He also received a Master of Missiology from Fuller Theological Seminary in Pasadena, Calif.

"My life in Southern California was both easy and hard," he said. "Culturally, I was flexible and adapted easily. However, my calling to the ministry was harder to fulfill. I considered teaching options because, in Lebanon, I had paid my way through college by teaching. But that had proven difficult. So, here in the U.S., I ended up washing dishes at the school's cafeteria to support my family and pay for my schooling."

Gabe exercised his ministry gifts by teaching and occasionally preaching at the Riverside church. Eleven months later, he received a phone call that changed his life.

"The church called me to become their assistant pastor, and they offered to continue my education at a seminary, if I so desired."

After prayerfully considering the call with his wife, he accepted.

Gabe decided to change from Fuller's School of Theology to the School of World Missions because of his background and calling. He wanted practical courses on church growth and world evangelizing. "This proved to be the guidance of the Holy Spirit," he said.

From 1981 to 1984, Gabe directed Middle Eastern Church Ministries and Outreach ministry to the Muslims in Garden Grove, Calif. He has spoken on Muslim Evangelism at the Samuel Zwemer Institute, the U.S. Center of World Missions, and in various churches in California. He has also taught Muslim Evangelism seminars in Jamaica and in Sydney, Australia.

# The intentional Christian family

One of Tuesday afternoon's seminars at Conference, "The Intentional Christian Family," was a minicondensation of Dr. Dale Thorngate's Marriage and Family course at Salem-Teikyo University.

Sociological developments have impacted, for better or worse, the very nature of the family as we have left the family farm, had fewer children, and led longer lives.

Very often our young adults have had to leave their extended families to find employment. In these cases, churches have had a tremendous opportunity and responsibility to become the extended family. (It was pointed out in discussion that the Bible's use of the word "family" nearly always refers to the extended family.)

Increased longevity has given additional responsibility to "adult children" caring for aging parents along with their own offspring. The marriage vow, "'til death do us part" may mean a 50-year commitment rather than the 20 years afforded to our ancestors. This phenomenon is

- Clear, sensitive communication consisting of talking and listening as "God gave us each one mouth and two ears."
- Intimacy which shares hopes, dreams, and feelings as well as expressions of passion.
- Intentional commitment to fully participate in this relationship. · Fidelity to keep intimacy within the family boundaries.
- Trust that each family member will be accountable for living within the boundaries.
- · Risk of loss of partner or that a family member will make a mistake.
- · Forgiveness even when offenses are remembered as lessons
- learned to prevent further injury. • Reconciliation after an offense
- has been forgiven. Love as an act of the will.
- · Respect for oneself, the partner,
- and the relationship itself. Compromise in appreciating one
- another's point of view.
- Nurturance providing for understanding, growth, and maturity.
- A religious foundation to provide for moral principles and a world view.

Our seminar leader concluded by stating that every individual needs a spiritual base to provide a personal sense of security and purpose in the larger community. If our faith is strong, our family will be strong; if our family is strong, our faith will influence the community in which we live. Sp
