But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for resident and Vice-President of the United states, Representatives in Congress, the executive or judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens o the United States, or in any way abridged, ex-cept for participation in rebellion or other crime, the lasis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the num-ber of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one


