Madame de Genlis.
Coteremporary with Madame de Staël and Madame Roland, lived an early light of French literature, namely, Madame de Genlis, who, with less intellect than the one, and less noble integrity of character than the other, probably wrote more than either, making up in quantity what she lacked in quality.

Her stay in England was only of six weeks duration, as the decree of the French National Assembly against the emigrants caused the Duke of Orleans (newly christened citizen Philippe Egalité) to recall her to Paris immediately.

Philippe, Duke of Orleans, was charged by the Duke's daughter, was sent by him to travel for a while in England. There her literary fame had already preceded her, and she met with a respectful and welcome reception from many distinguished personages.

Philippe of Orleans played for high stakes, and lost. When hard, cold men, shuddered and grew pale in the hushed Assembly, as they heard his voice, firm and metallic, ring out in its vote of death to the King, it did not know that the coolness of the professed gamester, who had staked his all upon this last throw, which possessed him.

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Confucius was a carpenter. Mohammed, called the prophet, was a driver of asses. Mahomet Ali was a barber. The Emperor of Morocco was a pawnbroker. The King of Sweden, was a surgeon in the Garrison of Martinique when the English took that island. Mademoiselle Bernadotte was a washerwoman of Paris. Napoleon was a descendant of an obscure family of Corsica, was major when he married Josephine, the daughter of a wine merchant of Martinique. Franklin was a printer. President Boyer was a shoemaker. President John Tyler was a captain of militia. Oliver Cromwell was formerly a brewer. The step-father of Isabella, Queen of Spain, husband of Queen Christina, and brother-in-law of the King of Naples, was once a bar-keeper of a coffee-room. General Bugeo was a vestry clerk. King Charles of Hayti, was a slave. St. Kitts Bolivar was a druggist. General Pina was a cow-keeper. Vasco de Gama was a sailor. Astor, the richest man in the New World, before he became proprietor of the Astor House, used to sell apples through the streets of New York. Joseph Bonaparte, for his arrival at New York, was crowned a King, and Joseph of the crown of the King of the South Sea Islands, took with him from that country, the King of Spain. Louis Philippe was a teacher of the French tongue in Switzerland, Boston, and Havana. Catherine, the Empress of Russia, was a camp grissette. Cincinnati was ploughing his vineyard when the dictatorship of Rome was offered to him. A governor of the island of Madeira was a tailor; and a Minister of France in Portugal was a dealer in bottles of Madeira wine. There are at present in Portugal and Spain, several dukes, marquises, counts, viscounts, and barons, who formerly were cooks, tailors, barbers, cobblers, sweepers, and milliners. These few but remarkable facts of ancient and modern history, are enough for proving that men and women from the lowest class of society have attained power, eminence, and even thrones, crowns, and altars.

BOBBY APPEARANCE OF JESUS.—It is remarkable that we have so few statements as to the physical appearance of the leading personages of the New Testament. Who can say how any of them looked, except that Zacharias was a man of small stature? Paul may have been inferior in looks to Barnabas, but it is only our inference. It is wonderful, and when thoroughly considered very instructive, that we have not one word, direct or indirect, concerning the personal appearance of our Lord when He was on earth. This could not have been the result of oversight or accident. One purpose of this omission was, perhaps, that thus our attention might be more firmly fixed upon Jesus in His glorified state, as described in the Apocalypse: "Four men, who loved Christ with a love stronger than death, wrote His life, but left no hint of His bodily complexion, features, or any period that could help the mind to a personal image. Others wrote long epistles, of which He was the Alpha and Omega; but His form was as much kept secret as the body of Moses, hidden by the Almighty in an undiscovered grave. The Christian toms and relics of the first centuries show no attempt to make an image of Christ. There is a sense of the Divine rested upon the church to permit any attempt to print the human as it appeared in Him."

DEATH AT THE BREAKFAST TABLE.

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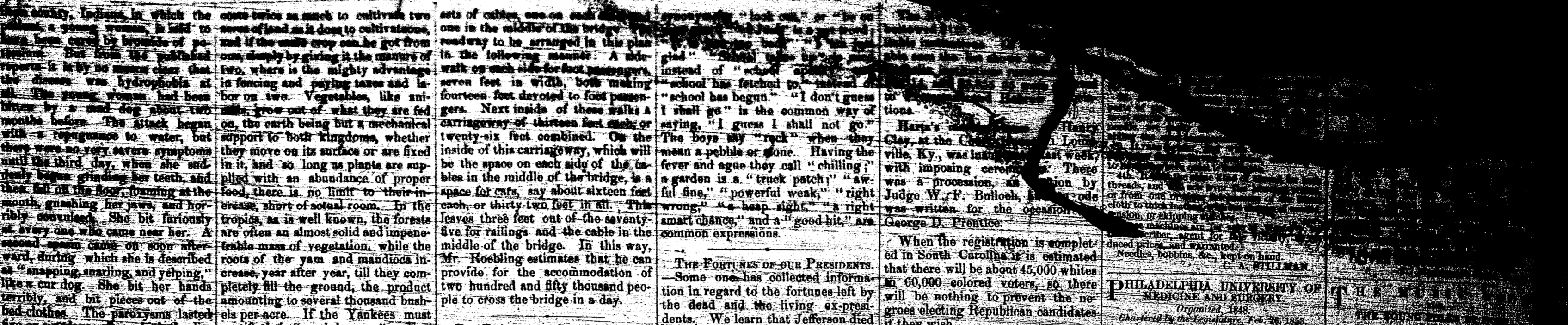
