SIMPLICITY.

Some critics have affirmed, that there is discoverable in all the fine arts a gradual progress from simplicity to complex forms and profuse ornaments-a real degeneracy, under the flattering cognomen of progress. It is worthy of note, also, that in such progress they bear a striking resemblance to most other departments of human effort. Thus, appetite indulged beyond the simple demands of nature, seeks satisfaction ir complicated and deleterious mixtures unnatural stimulants, and dishes of richest savor. Dress and personal appearance, controlled by prevailing fashion, put on profuse decorations. even at the sacrifice of beauty, health, and honor. Social intercourse, stripped of its original candor, is buried in artificial refinements and conventionalities. Music abounds in harmonious strains and difficult movements, at the expense of sentiment. Literature, formerly simple, terse figures and ornamental phrases; and, "Poets, like painters, thus unskilled to trace The naked nature and the living grace, With gold and jewels cover every part, And hide with ornaments their want of art."

It would be a much pleasanter record, if the same were not true in religious circles. But public worship, often, forsaking apostolic simplicity. is conducted under a formal display of ritual service, in which the spirit is lost in ceremony. The primitive church was exceedingly simple in its faith and practice. In time, changes of customs and circumstances, incidental to the progress of civilization, led to variations of method and discipline. 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
