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## Awakened by music

What will we be singing years from now?

If I hadn't seen the short video myself I might not have believed it. A recent TIME magazine article by Aylin Zafar explains:

"To watch Henry—an elderly man who has spent over ten years in a nursing home, barely able to answer yes or no questions—come alive when listening to music from his past is a reminder of the powerful, inspiring, and affecting power of music. "A new documentary, *Alive Inside*, follows the 'awakening' that occurs when people suffering from memory loss and Alzheimer's are given music they have a strong emotional connection to—often, music they grew up with. In the clip, Henry is barely responsive before one of his caretakers puts headphones on him and starts up one of his favorite tunes. Almost instantly, we see Henry swaying from side to

side and singing, his eyes wide open."

When I watched that video clip, I had a hard time believing it was the same man. It's a fascinating and almost miraculous transformation.

The article then quotes neurologist Oliver Sacks, author of *Musicophilia*. Dr. Sacks is involved with the documentary. "The philosopher Kant once called music the 'quickening art.' And Henry is being quickened, he's being brought to life."

After they take the headphones off, Henry is still excited and able to recall memories. Dr. Sacks explains:


"Music imprints itself on the brain deeper than any other human experience. Music evokes emotion and emotion can bring with it memory... Music brings back the feeling of life when nothing else can."

How often has a hymn or praise song "transported" you back to the church of your childhood, or a special time when the Lord's Spirit filled you to overflowing? (And we know that *HE* can bring back the feeling of life when nothing else can.)

When the current Sabbath Recorder Committee suggested holding a hymn contest, I nearly dismissed the idea with "we've already done that." Yes, we did; but that was 20 years ago! A whole new generation of worshipers and musicians has a chance to contribute to our anthology.



## SCSC and Stained Glass

The Seventh Day Baptist Women's Board is once again overseeing the Summer Christian Service Corps (SCSC), which is in its 49<sup>th</sup> year. "Stained Glass," an SDB musical ministry, is running in conjunction with SCSC in its second year of oversight by the Women's Board. Both groups are opportunities for SDB young adults to grow in leadership and serve churches around the country.

After application and selection, SCSC and Stained Glass members participate in significant training and mentoring, completing modules and attending a week of on-site training to help them grow in their faith and leadership. This year, the training is at Camp Wakonda in Milton, Wis., from June 13-21. This prepares them not just for the summer projects, but also for lifetime service in their home churches.

SCSCers have been prayerfully placed into teams that will be sent to a project at a local church. A church member serves as project director (PD) to coordinate the work of the team. Stained Glass has already met a number of times to write, practice, and record their songs and will be touring this year in the East and Southeast, providing musical encouragement and evangelism to local SDB churches.

### **Relationally Engineered** *Part 3: Household chores and the Society model*

It was John Donne who penned the words, "No man is an island." This asserted that humans are interconnected, and that all mankind bears a portion of the loss of one individual.

In last month's column, we explored how SDBs have connected and related to one another through the General Conference and other regional Associations. But Seventh Day Baptists have not been insulated from the cultural trends that affect all people. Just as larger factors moti-

vated SDBs to work together through Associations, SDBs were influenced by cultural developments and trends which gave rise to the Society model.

The Society model suggests that interested individuals band together to get work done, independent of their relationship to their local congregation. The impulses that drove people to form Societies likely came from the stresses and strains of rapid geographic expansion on Associations.

As American believers became more aware of the larger world, the field for fruitful Kingdom work expanded—first to missions, then to the ministries that support missions: education, publication, and others. Because of their primarily relational nature, regional associations like our General Conference were not always equipped to efficiently conduct the work that springs from shared convictions. In some cases, this inability came from a lack of mandate or common agreement. In other cases, it may have been a question of prioritizing the work or a theological disagreement. In any event, it is probably not a coincidence that the creation of the first Baptist Societies follows the formation of Associations.

After several congregations considered a proposal from Henry Clarke (pastor of the Brookfield, N.Y., SDB Church) to associate, the Seventh Day Baptist General Conference was formed in 1802. As a means of comparison, the Triennial Convention—formed from the Philadelphia Association and other regional associations of "first day" Baptists—began in 1814. Both of these groups were formed to facilitate collective mission work.

But both first-day Baptists and SDBs also created local and national mission societies soon after formalizing their Associations. The Baptists' foreign mission society was founded in 1814, and their home mission society in 1832. SDBs had a variety of missions groups between 1818 and 1844, when our current Missionary Society was founded.

This same pattern is reflected in publication and education ministries as well. SDBs developed our minis-

> try structures and philosophies at the same time similar structural models and philosophies were being used by other Baptists.

If the Associational principle gave SDBs a way to formally express their relational convictions, then Societies gave us a way to make sure that all the family's household chores were completed. Members of the family were able to select which parts of the work they wanted to

support, and priorities inside a particular kind of work were determined by the people who cared about that work. It is crucial to understand that though the work was being conducted by the Societies, the Societies were not distinct from the larger family; what would household chores be if there was no household?

There is one more critical point here: the Society model itself embodies a set of cultural and organizational values employed to handle a specific set of challenges. The formation of each of our General Conference's Societies reflects the reality that there is no such thing as a cultureless organizational model.

As the times have changed, so have our Societies, to varying degrees. Those changes reflect shifting cultural values, use of emerging technologies, and changing financial realities. We err when we believe that our Societies are sacred, that they have always been as they are now, or that they all operate the same. Our Societies exist for the same reason they always have: to make sure the work of our family is completed totally and efficiently. **S** 





## The cost of Conference

While our Conference President has asked "Are You Ready" there has been a lot of work put in to ensure "We Are Ready" for an uplifting, energizing and productive week. The Host Committee has been meeting monthly to make all the arrangements that go into hosting a Conference. (If you have ever served on a Host Committee you know the amount of work required.)

In January, I began working with the Host Committee to develop the overall budget so we could set the fees. Once that is done Ken Burdick, Linda Lawton, and Kevin Butler go into action putting together the registration program, registration form and on-line registration to have it ready by early April (even earlier this year). It is truly a herculean effort.

As we work on fees the focus is to first ensure it is affordable, while at the same time collecting enough revenue to cover all the costs. This year was particularly challenging. After a few last-minute changes the fees were set and they look a lot like last year's. Here is how it all breaks down:

#### Rooms

Rooms are less than last year but the biggest difference is that there is no sleeping on the floor as in the past. (Colleges have to answer to fire marshals and insurance companies.) Recognizing that this is a familyoriented conference, WV Wesleyan gave us a flat fee for children 4-12 regardless of room type.

#### Meals

Meal costs are slightly lower. This year we are only offering meal plans. No individual meals can be purchased from the Host Committee; it's either all meals or the lunch/ dinner option. We have set our meal prices lower than the walk-up rate you would pay at the door.

#### **Registration Fee**

The registration fee is where we charge for things that are not in the room and meal contract. It typically includes the facility use fees, transportation, printing, and evening receptions. And this year is no exception except for...

#### **Transportation**

The Host Committee will provide transportation from <u>Charleston, WV</u>, a 220-mile round trip. It is estimated to cost \$5,440 to provide for vans and busses to get everyone around for the two weeks. Considering the small number of people that utilize this service we decided to make it a separate charge this year. Had this stayed in the registration fee it would have added another \$10 to everyone's registration.

#### Receptions

Receptions continue to be a costly endeavor but the time for fellowship and relaxing is a great way to end a day. The past few years we've been working to find sponsors for the receptions. However, until sponsors sign up earlier I have to include this in the fees. There are still evenings available for sponsorship so if your church, Association or group is interested contact the Host Committee.

#### What if...

There is one last contingency. We are estimating that 500 excited SDBs show up. If they do we will have no problem covering costs. But what if only 450 attend? These fees still allow us to stay in the black as far as income and expenses are concerned. Reserve funds to cover a shortfall do not exist at the present so we can't afford to lose money.

Are you Ready? The 200<sup>th</sup> General Conference in Buckhannon, WV will be ready! See you there! **S**

We are offering an early (on-line) registration discount. Register on-line by June 30 and fees are: Adult Full week- \$91 vs. \$105 (\$14 savings); Child Full wk-\$45.50 vs. \$52.50 (\$7 savings); Adult per day-\$13 vs. \$15; Child per day- \$6.50 vs. \$7.50. \*\*ON-LINE REGISTRATION ENDS JUNE 30 (You may pay now or at the college). •On-campus Registration: A) Come to Virginia Thomas Law Center for Performing Arts (College Avenue) on Sunday, July 29 from 12 noon to late evening. B) Mon.-Fri. from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and after the evening service; come to lounge in Fleming Hall (south side of Wesley Chapel). If you are coming just for Sabbath, August 4, please pre-register.

#### •About the Form:

(1) Please list *all names* as you want them to appear on the official name tags, last name first. Ages must be given for those under 18, as well as last school grade completed as of June, 2012. First-time Conference attendees, please identify yourself. There is no charge for children 0-3 years. However, ALL NAMES must be listed to ensure that everyone is covered by insurance. (2) & (3) Full Week or Per Day **Registration**: Everyone attending Conference (ages 4 and up), either full- or part-time, is required to pay the registration fee. It covers the use of college facilities, materials produced, and insurance on each individual at Conference activities. Housing: Five multilevel dormitories (some air-conditioned). Elevators are in 3 of the dorms. Each room has two beds and uses a community bathroom except for

two dorms which share a bathroom between two rooms. All 4 years old and up must register for a bed (no sleeping on the floor). Small appliances (coffee pot with automatic shut-off, 4.0 cubic foot or smaller refrigerator, microwave and box fans, but no open burner or heater coil appliances) are allowed in the dorm rooms. Linens are supplied at an extra cost (choose room with or without linens). Linens will consist of two towels, two washcloths, a pillow and set of sheets with a pillow case. You may register for a room without linens and bring your own. # What's on your plate?

Do you ever really look at your plate once you have dished up your food? What do you see? Does your meal include all of the food groups?

All of us need to take a closer look at our diet. One source of help is the USDA website www. dietaryguidelines.gov. This plan tells you how much of each food group you need to eat daily. It helps determine the number of calories needed based on age, gender and activity level.

The five major food groups are <u>Grains, Vegetables, Fruits, Protein</u> foods and <u>Dairy</u> products. Any food made from wheat, rye, rice, oats, cornmeal, barley, or another cereal grain is a **Grain** product. A quarter of your plate should be filled with grains—at least half of them whole grains.

The first ingredient listed for a grain product should be "whole," such as whole wheat. Whole grains include oats, popcorn, brown rice, wild rice and buckwheat. Examples of an ounce of grain product are one slice of bread, half an English muffin, a cup of flaked cereal, or half a cup of cooked rice or pasta.

**Vegetables** often get a bum rap, and that's a shame because they come in a wide variety of colors and flavors. All vegetables are needed to be sure you get all the vitamins and minerals each supply. Dark green veggies include broccoli and spinach. Red and orange include acorn squash, carrots, tomatoes and sweet potatoes. Starchy vegetables are foods like corn, green peas and white potatoes.

Most vegetable portions should be one-half cup. Examples include 6 baby carrots, 1/2 large baked sweet potato, 1/2 small baked potato or 1/2-cup green beans. Fruits and/or vegetables should cover half of your plate.



**Fruits** also offer a variety of choices and colors: oranges, grape-fruit, berries of all kinds, apricots, cherries, peaches, mangoes and pineapple to name a few. Again a variety must be eaten to take full advantage of the nutrition offered. The standard portion is 1/2 cup. This equals half an 8-inch banana, half an

orange, 16 grapes, or 4 strawberries. To ensure that you eat the number of fruits you need daily, just remember that fruits along with a vegetable should fill half your plate.


The last quarter of your plate should be filled with **Protein** foods. Try choosing lean or low-fat foods. Eat seafood twice a week instead of meat. Examples of one-ounce servings include 12 almonds, 1 T peanut butter, 1 egg, and 1/2-cup split pea soup. Grilled or baked fish, poultry or meat should be limited to a 3-ounce serving (the size of a deck of cards).

Most adults do not get enough **Dairy** products. For good heart health always pick from low-fat or fat-free choices. One cup of milk is the same as 8 oz. of yogurt, 1½ oz. hard cheese, 1 cup soy beverage, 2 cups cottage cheese, or 1 cup pudding made with milk. Dairy products provide the calcium needed to protect bones and is needed at all ages.

So does this mean you have to forfeit your Sabbath morning donut? Maybe. If you meet the goals in each food group and choose foods that are low in fat and without added sugar you might still have calories left over to use as you like.

Remember that healthy eating requires a plan, one you can get from the website listed above. Watching what's on your plate will pay off in dividends of weight loss and overall better health. Why not try it? **S**<sub>R</sub>

# Be careful what you dance for

Mankind has always tried to control the weather, with little success.

In biblical times, man realized that God alone—as the Maker, Sustainer, and Overseer of the Universe—has power over the elements. The prophet Jeremiah wrote, "Do any of the worthless idols of the nations bring rain? Do the skies themselves send down showers? No, it is you, O LORD our God" (Jeremiah 14:22, NIV).

As mere mortals, we don't have the innate power to control the weather, but we can offer up prayers regarding it. In Zechariah 10:1 (TLB), the prophet wrote, "Ask the Lord for rain in the springtime, and he will answer with lightning and showers. Every field will become a lush pasture."

Man's age-old struggle to control the weather is fascinating.

In ancient Rome, officials kept one of two sacred stones called the "lapis manalis" in a temple of Mars outside the city. (The stone's name is derived from the verb *manare*, which means "to flow.") Whenever Rome suffered from drought, citizens dragged the stone into the city.

In a ceremony called the *aquae-licium* ("calling the waters"), the people made offerings to Jupiter, the Roman god of sky and thunder. They then petitioned for rain while pouring water over the stone.

Another tradition had unscrupu-

lous Scandinavian "witches" selling the wind in bags so sailors could release the turbulent air when their ships became adrift in calm waters.

In the European kingdom of Navarre—located on either side of the Pyrenees Mountains—people prayed to St. Peter for rain. If it didn't rain, they would drag statues of St. Peter from their churches and toss them into a river.

Native Americans wearing special headdresses and clothing still perform rain dances. The dances are usually done during spring planting or in the summer months before harvest. They include both men and women, indicating the importance of rain to the entire community. The dance steps are quite intricate and usually involve a zigzag pattern.

In more modern times, pilots have "seeded" clouds with a chemical [usually silver iodine] to form rain clouds, disperse fog, suppress hail, or produce snow. While the benefits are obvious, the procedure is expensive. Other drawbacks include possible adverse effects on plants and animals from the chemicals, and possible flooding.

Earlier this year, I learned that my two Colorado grandchildren tried to control the weather; apparently with some success.

On February 2nd, Keegan and Amber Lippincott—ages 10 and 11—decided they didn't want to go to school the next day. So on Thursday night, like scores of other chil-



dren living in the Denver area, they performed their traditional snow dance.

According to my son, Jay, this modern-day ritual has a specific set of rules:

<u>First off</u>, you have to take two ice cubes out of the freezer and flush them down the toilet.

<u>Secondly</u>, you have to dress in your pajamas or the ceremony loses its power.

<u>Thirdly</u>, once rules one and two are followed, you're required to dance. This dance, done with or without music, can be as simple as jumping up and down on a bed. It can also be quite complex, involving repetitive dance steps with or without a partner. Either way, you're required to "dance your head off."

Later that evening it started to snow, and school officials quickly canceled Friday classes because of blizzard warnings. When Jay informed Amber school was canceled, she looked at him with an expression that said, "Duh. Of course it is, Dad."

When the storm finally abated, people had to deal with 26 inches of snow. Which prompts me to exclaim, "Thank goodness my grandkids didn't flush *four* ice cubes down the toilet!" **S**<sub>R</sub>

Here are some words from Oswald Chambers' devotional, *My Utmost for His Highest*, concerning this passage. I think that they may be eternally appropriate to the condition of mankind:

Many of us suffer from the unbalanced tendency to "be ready" only "out of season." The season does not refer to time; it refers to us. This verse says, "Preach the Word! Be ready in season and out of season." In other words, we should "be ready" whether we feel like it or not. If we do only what we feel inclined to do, some of us would never do anything. There are some people who are totally unemployable in the spiritual realm. They are spiritually feeble and weak, and they refuse to do anything unless they are supernaturally inspired. The proof that our relationship is right with God is that we do our best whether we feel inspired or not.

One of the worst traps a Christian

worker can fall into is to become obsessed with his own exceptional moments of inspiration. When the Spirit of God gives you a time of inspiration and insight, you tend to say, "Now that I've experienced this moment, I will always be like this for God." No, you will not, and God will make sure of that. Those times are entirely the gift of God. You cannot give them to yourself when you choose. If you say you will only be at your best for God, as during those exceptional times, you actually become an intolerable burden on Him. You will never do anything unless God keeps you consciously aware of His inspiration to you at all times. If you make a god out of your best moments, you will find that God will fade out of your life, never to return until you are obedient in the work He has placed closest to you, and until you have learned not to be obsessed with those exceptional moments He has given you.



# Music calms the savage beast SDB



I hope to bring you an awareness of the power that lies behind music and to be more tolerant of the music preferences of others. All of the music in our churches should be used as a way to express what is in our hearts to the Lord. That is the essence of praise!

In all our music, we should communicate to God with words of <u>con-</u> <u>tent</u>—words that have theological substance. The song should be <u>coherent</u> in the way it is expressed and memorable to our minds. And it should be <u>compatible</u>, with the words and the music conveying well-matched symmetry.

Many of our old hymns and today's songs have words that are not in harmony with the Bible. I have heard some praise songs that are like syrupy "pop" love songs. I have sung hymns that have tunes from an old English pub or sung to a Hawaiian melody. Neither of these examples are what I would call worshipful.



Is the content of our songs correct with God's Word? If we want it to be memorable and become engraved in our minds, is it coherent that is, logical and consistent with the Bible? And again, our songs must be compatible between the words and the music. If they are not, then they lose their ability to help us communicate from our hearts to God's eyes and ears.

If we sing, "Our God is an awesome God," and we say it like we describe a TV show—"That show rocked, it was totally awesome!" then we aren't thinking our God is awesome, but rather like the television show.

Our purpose in gathering as believers is to celebrate the Holiness of God. In other words, we can have unity in our diversity. We all know that worship is both a private and public matter.

Through the centuries, the Church has gone through a lot of transitions. It has moved from temples to strip mall store fronts. Church music has moved from Gregorian chants, to psalms, to classical masterpieces, to '70s rock medleys, to praise and rap songs. Instruments have evolved from voice-only to organs, then pianos, then guitars and drums, and now just about anything can be found in a church on any given Sabbath.

These transitions alone should tell us that through time, there has been a lot of variety when it comes to worship. This has been reflected in the culture and personality of the people of that time. And this is still true today as ever!

There are certain styles of worship (particularly when we talk about music) that we like best. The tendency of course is to like ours the best, and in turn, toss out the rest. We absolutely must remember that when we gather for worship, it is not for ourselves. We are not to be focused on how *we* want things to be done. Our corporate worship should not be about customer service as though we are the customers and therefore we are right.

Together, we must affirm that God alone matters. In the midst of our community, we need to have this perspective: <u>God alone is worthy of</u> <u>our praise... and our songs... and</u> <u>our instruments</u>! **S**<sub>R</sub>

# God made time for us

Time is an incredible, unfathomable element of the Creation. It spans from less than the inconceivable nanosecond to an incomprehensible eternity. It is so amazing, yet is such an integral component to our lives that we cannot imagine an existence without it. God, in His foreknowledge, knew we needed the sun and moon to mark off the hours and seasons so we could order our lives (Psalm 104:19).

When we say that God made time for us, we not only mean that He created the element of time in the universe, but also

What does this have to do with missions? Understanding that God is on a mission to build relationships with people, the Sabbath is yet another way He facilitates that relationship. It reinforces the message of His commitment to bless our lives to His glory. It also resonates as an example of how we are to show our own commitment to fulfilling both the Great Commission and the Great Commandment.

The Great Commission is to go and make disciples of all nations (Matthew 28:19). If I am not willing to designate *time* to the fulfillment of that commission, can I really say I am serious about it? Likewise, will

I am going to have to budget my time just as I do my finances. my neighbor believe I love him as myself—according to the Great Commandment—if I hoard my time for my own interests and give little or none of it to him? (See Matthew 22:39.)

We are called to incarnate the good news of Christ in relationships. Until giving my time becomes a natural

extension of my walk with Jesus, I am going to have to budget it just as I do my finances (or any other resource that God puts under my stewardship) for the advancement of His Kingdom. If I do not do as God did and allocate regular times with them, people will not know

I love them and will not by extension know that God loves them through my witness.

What will this look like? I may have to sip a soda in a pub or bowling alley and sit on the same stool each week so it becomes apparent that I value talking with someone that I would not see at church or work. Or take on a part-time job waiting tables a couple nights a week so I can spend time with the unreached kitchen staff at a local truck stop.

I may have to designate annual vacation time to volunteer at a community camping program, where I can let some campers know that I care about them and God does, too. I may have to designate a time in my life, a season or years, that I will **go** and make disciples, building meaningful relationships. This would reflect the commitment my Lord Jesus did in spending 33 years among a people, speaking their language and practicing their customs, while sharing the love of the Father.

This evening I am going to sit down with some graph paper and chart out my week by the hour and see exactly where the time—that God has given me—is being spent. I pray you will join me in making time for God, as He did for us.

## Time to "Get our game on"

The Day of the Lord draws closer every passing moment. Are we ready for that day? Are we living flesh, God's mighty army ready for battle or are we dry dead bones, bleaching in the desert sun?

Here in America, our lives are plush. Yes, we have our troubles at school, our troubles with the car, etc. But for the most part, we do not have insoluble problems, difficulties beyond our own ability to overcome.

Because of this, we believe we can sustain ourselves without God, and though we claim to be Christians and claim to be walking with Him, we often are going in a totally opposite direction, myself included.

A seemingly perpetual cycle exists in our relationships with God, starting with realization of our guilt and confession. Then we walk consistently with God for a while, building a relationship with Him. As between a husband and wife, a boyfriend and girlfriend, if time is not put into the relationship, it decays and disintegrates.

In our relationship with God, we become distracted by other things, spending less time with Him. School, friends, video games, social media, even a task from the Lord can distract us from maintaining that relationship. This third part of the cycle perpetuates for a while, eroding the progress made in the second part before returning to the beginning and starting all over.

Many of us Americans seem stuck in part three. We are too relaxed and too entertained, too busy to care about our Savior. Getting to know Him constitutes the very smallest action we should undertake to repay our insurmountable debt. He owns everything, we only pay Him back with what He already owns.

Yet Jesus canceled the debt that we could not pay, preferring us, ourselves, to an infinite reimbursement for all the time, effort,

and suffering put into us. And then we ignore that gift, preferring to wallow in our search for easy pleasure. When will our complacency end? When will we finally put down the controller, release the mouse, hang up the phone, close the books and just spend

solid time in prayer or reading a Bible? Whatever dominates your life defines you. We who claim to be Christians should live lives dominated by Christ.

Young people need to form a relationship and make it last while we are still young, so that it may grow and mature, allowing us to become the leaders of the next generation. Our parents and our grandparents will not be around forever. One day those small bits of Godly knowledge and wisdom we now receive from our elders will be gone. Start finding it yourself now, while you can bounce those bits of knowledge and wisdom off of your elders for confirmation. Get to know Yahweh. There is nothing to lose and more than this world to gain.

Like it or not, deny it or not, a war occurs every moment of every day the forces of God vs. the forces of Satan. Our poor relationship with our Creator, our lack of knowledge and wisdom about Him, allows the enemy easy access and manipulation. Once our lifelines of our elders disappear, where will we be?

"So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists,



the pastors and the teachers, to equip his people for the works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ. Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching." (Ephesians 4:11-14) Those church leaders are currently our elders.

If we do not "get our game on" now and continually work on our relationship with the Father, when it becomes our turn to step into those roles, we will not be ready, weakening the Church by our absence. I, for one, do not want to be among the unprepared.  $S_{R}$
