The timber of 205 acres of heavy timbered land was used in building it. The Genesee River at Portage enters grand rocky defile, presenting for some distance a succession of magnificent and varied scenes. The up per Genesee Falls, just below the bridge, are 68 feet, making 302 feet from the top of the bridge to the bottom of the falls. The Middle Falls, half a mile below, are 100 feet. When the plants are three inches high thin out to three or four inches. Prepare tranches into which they are to is transplanted. Make the tranch-w twelve or fifteen inches deep; a foot wide, and about five feet spart, laying the earth taken out between the trenches, and so that it will not be washed back into the trenches by heavy rains. At the bottom of the reaches throw in some old, well rotted compost manure. If you use coarse and stringy and hollow, and they will not keep so long or so well. Dig this manure into the soil and mix it well up with it. Take up the plants carefully early in July, say them out tanderly in the bottom of vears.
