> LYNCH LAW .- On the night of Oct. 14th, an old and respectable citizen named Masses, living nine miles north-east from Otterville, Mo., was dragged from his bed and murdered. On the following day, Mrs. Mapes, her brother, named McIntosh, Thos. Good, and a boy named Bennet, were arrested on suspicion. and placed in charge of a constable and a guard of ten men to be borne to Boonville. While en route to that place the guard was overpowered by a party of men, and McIntosh and Good were hanged. Mrs. Mapes and the boy were taken to jail.

It will soon be time for those who intend to build ice houses for the coming winter, to be engaged in preparing them, and every farmer should have one. The following suggestions are taken from an article on this subject contributed to the Springfield Homestead by Mr. Hyde :

The first ice house we built, some twenty years since, was placed under ground, ten feet deep, and laid up log house fashion, with chestnut sap lings, hewn eight inches square. It was furrowed out, lined and filled between the lining and the logs with fine charcoal. The roof was also lined and filled between the lining and shingle with straw, making an excellent rendezvous for the bumble bees. Notwithstanding all the fixings, this house kept ice only tolera-

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
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
