GOOD BREAD.

In a lecture on the "Philosophy of the Oven," Prof. E. N. Horsford thus describes the method of making good bread: Select good, plump, fully ripened, hard grained wheat. Have it freshly ground, and not too finely sifted. Prepare the yeast as follows: Boil thoroughly with the skins on in one quart of water, enough potatoes to fill a large bowl. Wash and scrub the potatoes, and mash them with them one pint of flour, and stir the whole to an emulsion with the water in which the potatoes were boiled.
