The plaintiff's testator was disabled from his usual employment, and compensation was claimed for thirteen weeks at the rate of \$10 per week.

AN ANTI-PAPAL CONGRESS at Naples numbers two hundred delegates from Italy and twenty from other countries. Garibaldi, Victor Hugo, and other leading radicals, are present, but have sent letters of excuse and sympathy. Thus at Rome and at Naples the masses are drawn up in array, and stand as if before a face, ready and eager for the impending conflict.

THE CHINESE TRAGEDY.—A dispatch from London, dated Dec. 10th, says that Mr. Burlingame, the Chief of the Chinese Embassy, has received information that the treaty made by him with the United States has been ratified by the Chinese Government. Mr. McLeary Brown, the Secretary of the Chinese Embassy, is on his way to Washington from Peking, via California.

HYACINTH ON CHARITY.—"Pere Hyacinthe" spoke before the French Benevolent Society in New York, on Thursday evening of last week, his subject being "Charity." A large and fashionable audience was in attendance, and the effort was regarded as a very successful one.

THE Spanish Gunboats have been released, the representative of Peru having withdrawn his complaint and claim.

SUMMARY OF NEWS. A New York dispatch of Dec 12th says that a vigilance committee has been organized in this city, strong in numbers, and entitled "Law and Order Regulators." The object is said to be the executing of summary justice on the roughs who escape punishment through political influence, and also that certain legal authorities, including certain judges, are included in the proposed action.

COLOR OF THE TURACO.—The taro, or plantain eater of the Cape of Good Hope, is noted for the beauty of its plumage, and especially for the rich red upon its wings. This red coloring matter has been analyzed, and found to contain nearly 6 per cent of copper, which cannot be detected by the ordinary tests, nor removed from the red compound without destroying it.

THE Paris Figaro publishes the following item: "In one of the cemeteries in New York may be seen a tomb stone with this inscription: 'Y. H. S., who killed himself with a Colt's revolver of the same pattern, the best instrument for this purpose.' It is said that the firm engaged in the manufacture of these weapons pay a large sum annually to the widow for this epitaph."

CHARLES NOLL, aged 7 years, was suffocated while at the rolling mill at Stanton, Penn., on Thursday, Dec. 9th. His brother William, aged 11, was also overcome with gas, and his body burned to a crisp.

THE stone man of Cardiff, whose history is so lately developed, was undoubtedly one of the keenest hangers of the day, has arrived in New York, and taken a place among his fellow sensations in that modern Vanity Fair.

ALASKA.—Gen. Thomas has made a report on Alaska, in which he takes down some of the high notions lately put before the people. As to settling the country, Gen. Thomas, looking at it with the business eye of a soldier, thinks that to be entirely out of the question—for the present, at least.

There is a petition a mile and a half long, signed by Philadelphians, in favor of the recognition of Cuba, in the possession of Senator Cameron. It is to be presented to Congress.

Two bar-tenders at the Adams House, Boston, were sentenced, the other day, for selling liquor on a pay \$50 fine, and the other to be confined for three months in the House of Correction.

THE recent strike of the Paris clerks has proved a good thing for the charming demiselles of that gay capital, who are rapidly taking the places of the strikers.

THE following is a statement of the value of imports and exports of the United States for the year ending June 30th, 1869, at the ports named: New Haven, \$702,956; New London, \$125,387; Fairfield, \$19,507; Stonington, \$1,211.

THE Washington Intelligencer has been reduced in size and has been changed under new proprietor, Alex. Delmar. The introductory, after speaking of the improvements, says, "The first thing to be done is to make the paper pay."
