The rule should be invariably to go at once into a warm room, and keep on all the clothing for at least five or ten minutes, until the forehead is perfectly dry. In all weathers, if

you have to walk and ride on any occasion, do the riding first.

AMUSEMENTS IN DENMARK.

Dr. Prime, of the New York Ob. server, gives this picture of life in Copenhagen, and finds in it a practical and profitable lesson for Americans to apply, whose work and recreations are kept separate, and who put such an intensity into both as to make them mischievous :
