3d. Iron galleys, which could be contracted by the aid of a screw. These were also called manacles. They served to compress the wrists, and to suspend the prisoner in the air from two fixed points. The prisoner was placed on three pieces of wood piled one on the other, when his hands had been made fast, when he successively withdrew from under his feet.

4th. A fourth kind of torture was a cask, in which the prisoner was confined, and was so constructed, that the prisoner could neither stand, walk, sit nor lie in it at full length. He was compelled to draw himself up in a crouching posture, and so remain during several days. There were many instances of torture applied on very slight occasions. The Lord Chief Justice of the King's Bench, Sir Thomas Coventry, was imprisoned in the Tower, and was tortured in this manner.

WHAT I KNOW OF FARMING. BY HORACE GREELY. I have already set forth in my belief the irrigating system as the most practicable, and it is destined to be generally adopted, and to prove signally beneficial. I do not mean that every acre of the States this side of the Missouri will ever be thus supplied with water, but it will sweep the land, and of nearly every tract of land in the West, and of nearly every farm, should and will be. I propose herein to speak with direct reference to that large portion of our country which cannot be cultivated to any purpose without irrigation.

At first, members of the Colony arriving at its location hesitated to take farm allotments and build upon them, from distrust of the quality of the soil. They were first settled upon a tract of land on the north side of the stream to four or five miles, and in progress by sections, and is to be completed this Winter. Its length will be 30 miles, and it will irrigate, when the necessary water is conveyed by a canal constructed, not less than 40,000 acres.
