REPORT ON PUBLISHING.

At the meeting of the Tract Society in Geneva, a Special Committee was appointed to consider the question of establishing a publishing house under the direction of the Society. Their report was before the Executive Board of the Tract Society at its recent meeting, and the Board voted to have it published in the SABBATH RECORDER, as follows:

We would recommend the purchase of the Sabbath Recorder Subscription List, which can be had for \$500.00.

The Society should not start with one cent less than the sum named above, and not at all until every dollar is paid in, or at least subscribed by parties who are abundantly responsible, and will advance the amount of subscription when called for.

We would suggest, that it will probably be necessary, in order to get the money pledged, to decide first, where the publishing house shall be located; secondly, who shall have charge of the editorial columns; and thirdly, who shall have charge of the business department.

As regards the management of the house, it should have at its head a first-rate financier, and he should also, if possible, understand the mechanical department, so that he may be able to see when it is properly conducted.

In regard to the best means of raising the money, we do not know of any better way than to make some of the Executive Board members, or of the denomination for this purpose, and taking subscriptions for \$100 each, and upwards, from those who are abundantly able to give that sum.

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REPORTS OF LEAVING AGENTS. The following abstracts are made from recent reports of laborers by Elds N. Warden and S. D. Davis, who visited Middle Tennessee in the service of the Am. Sab. Tract Society. The Executive Board has instructed the Corresponding Secretary to publish from time to time such extracts from the reports of agents as may be of interest to the churches.

Bro. Warden reached Shelbyville on the 23d of September, expecting to find Bro. Davis there to join him in the work; but he did not arrive until the week following. Writing from Union City, Tenn., Oct. 19th, 1870, Bro. Warden says:

"We found Dr. Gordon in feeble health, having worn himself out by an extensive ride, day and night, for twenty-one years. He stands very high in public esteem, both as a Christian man and as a physician.

"We were until we thought the meeting ought to close before asking the privilege of preaching on the Sabbath question; quite a number having expressed a desire to hear on the subject, and among them some of the officers of the church.

"On Sabbath day I had a fair congregation, and on Sunday had six or seven hundred hearers, and a many from New Hope, and even one of the Deacons, in spite of all efforts to prevent it, were present to us to preach at Thompson's Creek, six miles distant, the next Sabbath and Sunday, where they were to have a quarterly meeting among the Separate Baptists, with the assurance that we should have all the time.

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and earnest desire to hear on the subject of the Sabbath. The admission was almost universal, that they could see no way to evade the point, and they were ready to do so. We heard of two families who commended keeping the Sabbath during our stay there, and some individuals besides. One of them was a deacon in the New Hope Church, with his family. But he was not ready yet to break his old connection. There are many more who are waiting to be fully satisfied. On the whole, we did not feel quite satisfied that the time had come to organize a church. It is our opinion, however, that if a judicious person or persons could go there in February, they would be ripe for an organization. They generally say that our arguments must be "overthrown by Scripture or they are of no use."

"On our way home, we reached Shelbyville about 5 o'clock P. M., and as we were about to start on our way, we were told that we were there for an earnest request was sent in for me to preach on the Sabbath question that evening. Notice was circulated as far as practicable. I spoke over two hours, to the satisfaction of the congregation.

"I spoke over two hours, to the satisfaction of the congregation. I was told that if we ever came back we should have a full house to preach to as much as we pleased, and all seemed to regret that a general notice could not have been given. I think this work should be followed up.

"I found the people much more excitable than we had been used to—impressive, and very hospitable. The country is rough and heavily timbered. The soil is productive, averaging 20 to 30 bushels of corn, 10 of wheat, and 40 of oats, and it might be rendered much more productive by a more thorough system of cultivation. The price of land has nearly doubled since the war, ranging from \$20 to \$75 per acre.
