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THUNDER STORM AT WESTERY.

We find, in the Narragansett Weekly, of July 31st, the following account of the work of lightning during a storm at Westery, R.I., on the 27th:

INFORMATION WANTED.

DOUBTFUL JUSTICE.

A curious case has lately occurred in Massachusetts. One Fairbanks, in 1861, was sentenced to the State Prison for life for the crime of arson. In 1871 he was pardoned on condition that he should serve out his sentence if ever again convicted of crime.

The books of the Post Office Department, which since the first of June the largest amount of business ever done since the organization of the Department, in the manufacture and shipment of stamps, stamped envelopes, wrappers, &c., took place on the 27th of July.

Another robbery.—The Colfax and Grass Valley stage was robbed, near Grass Valley, on the 27th of July, by four men, who blew open Wells, Fargo & Co.'s treasury box, which they retreated in good order without molesting the passengers.

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STORY NEAR NEW YORK.

A rain storm on the 27th of July did considerable damage to crops on Staten Island, and flooded a number of houses in the low lands. The storm was not without benefit, however, as it effectually quenched the fresh which had been devastating the fields and forests of Long Island.

A party of wealthy Englishmen and Canadians, including a son of Mr. Christy, member of the Dominion Parliament, just made a location in Marion county, Kan., and arranged to purchase a tract of land on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad lands, together with intermediate sections owned by private parties.

A recent dispatch from Newburgh, N. Y., informs us that the first case under the civil damages liquor law, was tried on the 27th of July.

The President seems to be getting the best proportionate share of religious growth in England. In eighty-four of the largest towns, it is found that they have increased at the rate of 150 per cent, while the highest rate in any other church is 98 per cent.

The lithographers of Havana have struck work. They demand the payment of their wages in gold or in equivalent in currency, and all the railroads of Cuba, from this month forward, will exact passenger's fare and freight tolls in gold or its equivalent.

The Supreme Court of Louisiana, sitting at Monroe, has decided that all the acts of the officers holding commissions issued by Gov. Warrenton after the November election, upon returns made by either of his returning boards, are absolutely null and void.

The Chicago, Alton & St. Louis Railroad Company propose borrowing \$8,000,000 for purchasing steel rails, putting down double track, and the purchase of additional rolling stock.

FALL PLOWING.

The following sensible article is from the Canada Farmer: "In Canada, plowing in the fall of the year is a matter of small importance to the farmer, and he who can accomplish a large acreage finds himself forehanded in our short spring months."

"Of course, in the discussion of such a wide question as that of deep plowing, consideration must always be had to the various combinations and states in which the various elements exist.
