CONGRESS. FRIDAY, JAN. 24. In the Senate, Mr. Anthony was chosen President pro tem, in the absence of the Vice President. In the House, Mr. Hoar, from the Committee on Elections, made a report in the South Carolina election case, that neither DeLoach, the sitting member, nor Bowen, the contestant, were entitled to a seat, partly on the ground that the frauds and irregularities in the election were so great that it was impossible to determine who had a majority of the votes lawfully cast; partly on the ground that Bowen had tampered with and bribed DeLoach's canvasser, and partly on the ground that Bowen is a member of the South Carolina Legislature, which is incompatible with the position of a member of Congress. The report was adopted. A number of bills were passed.

LOSS OF THE SCHOONER GEORGE STREEL.—Reports from Havana, of Jan. 24th, announce the loss of the schooner George Steele, from Savannah for Kingston, during a gale on the 13th of January, sixty miles from Baracoa. All on board were saved. On the 15th, a party of one hundred soldiers and sailors came to the place where the shipwrecked vessel was, and advised them to leave. As it was necessary, everything was abandoned, and a march of twenty-seven miles through the woods to a place where a Spanish garrison was to be found, was undertaken by the party. Notwithstanding the many hardships attending such a journey, the wife of the captain of the George Steele with her child withstood them. The whole party reached the gunboat and were taken to Baracoa, where they took passage in a coaster for Havana.

STATES COURT who attempted to serve a writ of habeas corpus upon him. It is also stated that further interference in the affairs of the Mormon officials will be met with more effectual resistance. LUTHER TUCKER, the senior editor of the Albany Cultivator and Country Gentleman, died at Albany on the 28th of January, in the 71st year of his age. Mr. Tucker has been long known as an able Agricultural Editor, and his loss to that branch of literature will not be easily supplied. His funeral, which occurred on the 29th, was largely attended.

THREE PERSONS BURNED TO DEATH.—A fire at Renfrew, Canada, Jan. 31, destroyed the building occupied by the Bank of British North America and J. W. Tierney as a drug store; also, the two adjoining buildings, James MacAdam, J. Tierney and Julia McIntyre were burned to death. Mrs. Tierney and child were seriously burned. THE YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION OF PHILADELPHIA, celebrated the eighteenth anniversary of that organization in the Academy of Music, on the evening of Jan. 28th. Hon. Schuyler Colfax and Hon. Henry Wilson were present and made addresses.

THE JURY for the trial of William M. Tweed of New York, failed to agree on a verdict, all but one finally voting for his acquittal. The counsel on both sides express surprise at the result. The case is to be brought up for a new trial immediately. THERE IS SAID to be an interesting revival in the Baptist Church in Chemung, N. Y. Rev. J. W. Spoor, Pastor, in which some have been converted, and backsliders are returning. There is a prospect of a glorious work of divine grace.

EXPLOSION.—An explosion of a gas main in the repair shop of the Manchester, N. H. Paint Works, occurred Jan. 30th, seriously injuring five persons, and damaging considerable of the building, machinery, etc. THE ACT to abolish the franking privilege has received the President's signature and is now the law of the land. For the information of our readers we publish the law in another column. THE STEVENS CASTLE, at Castle Point, in the outskirts of Hoboken city, was partly consumed by fire on the 30th of January. Loss about \$10,000.

SUMMARY OF NEWS. The Kansas Legislature met in joint session, Jan. 29th, to vote for United States Senator, when Senator York charged Senator Pomeroy with having attempted to bribe him to vote for him, having paid him seven thousand dollars in cash with the promise of an additional thousand on Thursday. He produced the money and handed it over to the President of the joint session. The Legislature immediately proceeded to ballot, when John J. Ingalls was elected by a vote of 115 to 18 for various other persons. After the adjournment of the Legislature, Senator Pomeroy was arrested on the charge of bribery, and gave bail in \$5,000 for his appearance on Friday.
