husbels per acre, and more, as it sometimes does? We have examples where the thing has been thoroughly tested, and the test has established the practice. The corn crop should be made one of the important crops of the farm, particularly in connection with the dairy. It should be a regular crop in rotation. Although more advantageous in rotation on the whole, and for the farm, it may yet be grown to advantage on other land. First-class crops are raised on hills, and then on drift soil; but there was a good coat of soil, and manure applied in the hill. If, however, the soil is sandy, there is no chance for success. Still, a rich land soil may be trusted for corn in any season. Dairy men should make it a rule to raise corn, both for the fodder it affords and the corn, as well as the benefit the land gets from the culture. There is no corn crop for that purpose, and if the land requires manure, and has not had it, as soon as the snow will allow, it may be applied on level land and on hill sides, if there is not a coat of ice on the surface. Ground to wash it off. This is better than to apply manure just before ploughing, as the strength will be carried into the soil by the spring rains, which is a better distribution of manure than can be effected in any other way.—Cor.
