On motion of L. C. Rogers, the report was approved, as far as it goes, with instructions to the Treasurer to complete the report according to the instructions of the Association...

On motion of J. E. N. Backus, the regular order of business was waived to take up miscellaneous business. Moved by J. E. N. Backus, that \$55 be appropriated for the printing of the Minutes for the present session of the Association...

On motion of V. Hall, after prayer by J. Clarke, the Association adjourned till 8 o'clock First-day morning. FIRST-DAY—MORNING SESSION. Opened with prayer by H. E. Babcock.

On motion, the Association dispensed with regular devotional exercises, and proceeded at once to transact business. Minutes read and approved. Roll of delegates called.

On motion of N. W. Gardner, the Moderator and Clerks were authorized to draw orders on the Treasurer for the expenses of the Association. The report of the Committee on Finance was presented, and on motion of L. C. Rogers, was recommended with the following instructions: "To report all items of indebtedness of the Association, and the names of churches delinquent, with the amounts due from them."

The report of the committee to whom was referred the inquiry from the South-Western Yearly Meeting, was on motion of L. C. Rogers, adopted as follows: Your Committee to whom was referred the resolution of inquiry from the South-Western Yearly Meeting, beg leave to report that the money which reference is made to, appears to have been paid by V. Hall, as their delegate to this Association, and was not.

On motion of L. C. Rogers, the minutes of the Sabbath School Institute held in connection with this Association, were ordered to be printed in connection with the minutes of the Association. The ninth resolution was read, and on motion of L. C. Rogers, was amended by adding the following words: "and that monthly collections for these objects be taken, that our prayers and alms may go together."

The Moderator appointed Sisters Lucy A. Backus, Ann Eliza Coon, and Susan Loofboro as the committee mentioned in the resolution. On motion of L. C. Rogers, the names of Olive B. Gardner and Euphemia Whitford were added to the Committee on Women's Missionary Society.

On motion of J. E. N. Backus, the name of J. E. N. Backus was added to the Sabbath School Executive Board. The third resolution was read, and on motion of J. H. Thompson, J. Bailey, H. B. Lewis, and L. C. Rogers, was adopted.

HOME NEWS

Sabbath School Institute at Leonardville. The Central Association, at its recent session, instructed the Executive Sabbath School Board of that body to hold within its bounds during the year, at least three Institutes. The first of these came off at Leonardville, occupying two days, July 7th and 8th, and one evening. There was only time for a short notice, yet the attendance was good, and the exercises were highly interesting and profitable.

RAILROAD COLLISIONS

Trains West. Both through expresses, came in collision on the single track a mile east of Canaseraga, Allegany Co., N. Y., at nine o'clock A. M., July 18th, while going at the rate of fifteen to twenty miles an hour. Both engines were destroyed, and the baggage and smoking cars of the westward bound train were entirely demolished.
