





been disposed to think that only and now they have begun truly to live." ESCAPE OF MARSHAL BAZAINE. A Paris dispatch of August 11th says: There is great excitement in

this city consequent on the receipt of the intelligence that Marshal Bazaine has escaped from the island of Saint Marguerite sometime during Sunday night.

A London dispatch of the same date gives the following interesting particulars of his escape: The apartments occupied by the Marshal It opened upon a terrace which was built, upon a lofty and precipitous e cliff overhanging the sea. A sentry was posted on the terrace with orders to watch the prisoner's every movement. Sunday evening the Marshal walked upon the terrace with Col. Villette, his aid-de-camp. At ten o'clock he retired as usual, apparently to sleep, but before day-break he had effected his escape. He must have crossed the terrace in the dead of night, and eluding the sentinel, gained the edge of the precipice, thence by means of a knotted rope he descended to the sea. He evidently slipped during the descent and tore his hands, as the rope was found stained with blood in several places. . Under the cliff in a hired boat were Bazaine's wife and cousin. They received him as he reached the water, and Madame Bazaine taking the oars herself, rowed directly to the steamer which had been lying off the island since the previous evening. They reached the vessel in safety, were taken on board and the steamer then put to sea. It is thought that they have landed at Genos, as the steamer proceeded in that direction. The first news of the affair came to Grosse, the nearest place on the coast, and the magistrates immediately sent officers in every direction to seach for the fugitive. There was great commotion in Marsailles, when the facts became known, and an investigation was opened. Col. Villette, who was walking with the marshal on the evening of his es-cape, was discovered there and im-prisoned. The Commandant of the Fort of St. Marguerite was placed



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
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
