



THE CENTRAL ASSOCIATION. The Seventh-day Baptist Central Association convened for its Fortieth Anniversary with the Church of Adams Centre, N. Y., on Fifth-day, June 10th, 1875, at 104 o'clock A. M.

The Association was called to nest prayer. order by J. M. Todd, Moderator of last session, and the congregation joined in singing, "Come Holy Spirit," &c. After appropriate re-Western and North-Western Assomarks, the Moderator suggested that we have a season of special prayer for the revival of God's work during the session. 
