

day is the Sabbath of the Bible is proved thus: "And on the seventh day God ended his work which he had made; and he rested on the seventh day from all his work which he had made. And God blessed the seventh day, and sanctified it; be cause that in it he had rested from all his work which God created and made." Here we find the seventh day blessed and sanctified at the beginning, and it is manifest that this

blessing and sanctification will remain upon it until he who bestowed them shall remove them Nor can any one in reason claim their removal other than in as open and distinct a manner as was their bestowment. But it should be further noted that this blessing and sanctification was bestowed upon the last of a cycle of days, divinely arranged for man's benefit, and hence, while the cycle remains its terminal period must be this same sacred day. Further proof, Ex. 16: 25-30: "And Moses said, eat that to-day, for to-day is a Sabbath unto the Lord: to day ve shall not find it in the field. Six days shall ye gather it; but on the seventh day, which is the Sabbath. in it there shall be none. And it came to pass, that there went out some of the people on the seventh day for to gather, and they found none. And the Lord said unto Mcses, how long refuse ye to keep my commandments and my laws? See, for that the Lord hath given you the Sabbath, therefore he giveth you on the sixth day the bread of two days; abide ye every man in his place, let no man go out of his place on the seventh day. So the people rested on the seventh day." Again Ex. 20: 8-11, "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. 
