



Davis from the action of the Lost Creek Church in suspending. him from fellowship, respectfully report that they have given the subject careful atten-tion, and have listened patiently to the ements of parties in interest, and to the reading of documents bearing upon the subject. It seems that in July, 1875, Bro. Samuel

Davis; a member of the Lost Creek hurch, wrote to Bro. Charles A. Burdick, member of the Salem Church, a letter which he told him of certain points of fference with him, which he proposed to bring to the notice of the Lost Creek. Church; that this letter was not brought before the church, but was made the subject of consideration by a council composed of the dracons of the Host Creek and Salem Churches; which buncil expressed its opinion in writing pon the various points presented, and adjourned under the impression, at least, on the part of some of the members, that the difficulty was wholly and forever settled. In June, 1876, Bro. Davis applied to the Lost Creek Church for a letter of diamission, with a view of joining the Gaiamission, with a view of joining the Salem Church, of which he had become the pastor. At that time there was noth-ing on the records of the Lost Creek Church in any way affecting the moral, religious, or ministerial standing of Bro. Davis. When his request for a letter of dismission was presented at a recular dismission was presented at a regular business meeting of the church, the granting of the letter was objected to, on be ground of the existence of the difficul desired letter until Bro. Davis should withdraw the paper sont by him to Bro. Burdick, which had been the subject of onsideration and action by the council of descons. The result has been a corre-spondence of considerable length, the adoption by the church of numerous pa-

adoption by the church of numerous pa-pers on the subject, and finally the passage of a resolution suspending Bro. Davis from the fellowship of the church. After carefully considering the facts in the case, as here rehearsed, your commit-tee have reached the following conclu-


