



1. The government will procee to the separation of Church an State, not interfering in the least with questions regarding religio and worship ...

2. The people who are intereste will provide, under the protectio of the authorities, for their own r ligious conditions, freely choosin those ministers of worship who they shall esteem best.

3. The possessions of the episcop funds will pass into the hands of the provincial deputation, which wi nominate an apposite commission composed of persons of all classe to watch over their preservation an transferment to the persons recor mized, according to regulation which will be established.

The necessity for the continued

prosperity of the Frieberg mines, which have been worked for about s-ven centuries, may be gathered from the fact that at the present time there are more than 6,000 laborers, with their families, amounting altogether to some 20,000 persons, who derive sustenance from the mines and metallurgical works connected with them. It may reasonably be expected that the Rothschonberger tunnel will give fresh impetus to the Frieberg mining, and considerably augment the output of ore, which has of late years somewhat fallen off, owing to the immense quantities of water which continued to flood the mines, and prevented the veins of ore being followed and worked below a certain depth.

THE EASTERN WAR.

The reports of the last week indicate active service, but without any decisive result. The following are the principal dispatches:

BERLIN, Oct. 5.-The Russians officially acknowledge a loss of fiftytwo thousand men to September 27th.

London, Oct. 5.-Particulars of he battle before-Kars make it evident the Russians assaulted the Turkish positions along the whole line, and were repulsed with heavy loss. The successes gained on Tuesday in the capture of the great Yazni Hill, did not compensate for the failure at other points. The positions carried have since been abandoned.

VIENNA, Oct. 5.-The Montenegrins have abandoned hostilities in Herzegovina, because the territory they now bold on that side correponds with the line of demarkation fixed by the International Commission and accepted by the preliminary conference at Constantinople. It is not likely that the Montenegrins will be more in the final settlement which must be made by Europe. Prince Nicholas, therefore, will attempt the conquest on the other side, where he will not interfere with the interests of any power, and where he may cooperate with Servia, if the latter renews hostilities.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 7.-Moukhtar Pasha telegraphs Friday: Today, the bulk of the Russian forces fell back to the foot of the Karatool, leaving only six battalions entrenched at Kaback. They have thus abandoned their positions parallel with our lines. There is no


