Great damage was done by tornadoes and floods over a large extent of country, on Thursday and Friday of last week, the following particulars of which we clip from the Elmira Advertiser: On Wednesday, Iowa, May 24th.—A tornado (Wis.) special announced that a terrible tornado struck that town yesterday afternoon.

COMMUNISM. A communication was held at the Germania Assembly Rooms in New York on the evening of May 20th, at which reporters were excluded, but not until they had had time to see the animus of the organization as expressed on various banners, among which the following are noted by a Herald reporter: "Hanging on the walls were a number of communistic banners, with mottoes in white letters on red backgrounds. The one nearest the platform read, 'Government by taxation and revolution from the Cradle to the Grave.' Next to it was the inscription, 'Nationalization of Land, Labor, Education and Insurance.'"

A Diamond City (Mont) dispatch announces that on the morning of May 20th, a small band of unknown Indians raided two ranches in Smith River Valley, driving off a number of horses. Soldiers on duty at the ranches, and some citizens, had a fight with the Indians. Two Indians are reported killed, and the others were driven into the mountains. The infantry started on the 23d for their Summer quarters at Fort Benton.
