IN MY TWENTY-SECOND YEAR I CHANCED TO HEAR THAT A SATURDAY MAN WAS EXPECTED TO PREACH ON A CERTAIN EVENING AT THE HOUSE OF BENJAMIN BARNEY, SOME FOUR MILES DISTANT.

I supposed that the said Saturday man must be a Jew and as I had never seen any of that people we read so much about in the Bible, and as I had a strong desire to see a Jew, I walked four miles to the meeting more to see the man than anything else, and when I reached the place it was my first concern to get my eye upon the man.

and what surprised me most was that he sang a Christian hymn. I now began to think that he was a converted Jew. When through singing he knelt down and offered prayer—as he had appeared to sing in the spirit, so he prayed with soul-moving and heart-melting power, and by this time I was convinced that whether Jew or Gentile, he was an able minister of the New Testament, full of faith and the Holy Ghost, and though he said not a word about the Sabbath, Saturday would frequently come into my thoughts, and I supposed that he honestly believed that there was some Scripture for keeping that day and that he ought to observe and keep Saturday for the Sabbath instead of Sunday, and I was decided at once to search the New

been no inducement to me to be set back where I was one short hour before.

I expected that my six hired hands would leave me at once, and I made it my first business to call them together on the evening of that memorable day, and talked the matter over with them, giving a brief account of my experience and trials on the subject of the Sabbath and the result, and as I should do no more work myself nor allow any work to be done for me on the Sabbath (the seventh day of the week) which we had always called Saturday, and as I supposed it would be their choice to leave me, and of course I could not object.

One of these young men by this time was all broken down, and weeping; said: "I will not leave you, I will stand by you and keep the same until five of the number pledged themselves to stand by me and keep the Sabbath with me. O, how unexpected this was to me. It really melted me all down. O, how I was encouraged and strengthened in the very outset."

They said to me, we have long known that you were in trouble and have talked the matter over among ourselves and wondered what could be the cause; the neighbors have noticed it and could not account for it, but now they understand it. I do not now remember that any one of these young men ever turned back to Sunday-keeping, and my neighbors, instead of pouring contempt upon me, or treating me with scorn, appeared rather to sympathize with me, and inside of six weeks as near as I can now remember two whole families in which there were a number of young people and full one-half of another family also turned to keep the Sabbath, and there are at the time of this writing several ministers in our denomination who are the offspring of one of these families.

The Presbyterian church of which I was a member, (the church at this time was Congregational) appointed two of the brethren to visit and reclaim me to Sunday-keeping. But they did not appear in my presence. They had searched the Scriptures to furnish themselves with arguments to convince me of my error, but could not find what they needed for such purpose and therefore asked to be released.

The church then appointed our pastor, the Rev. Mr. Crandall, who visited me and spent about half a day and tried to convince me by inferences and arguments which were in the main about the same that the Rev. Mr. Rice, of Wolcott, Wayne Co., N. Y., set forth in his printed sermon of recent date which I have read. And when our pastor was through he asked me if I had any objections to his arguments, if so he requested me to state them and to feel that I had perfect freedom to do so. I then said to him that I had one very serious objection which would cover the whole ground of all his arguments, viz: That I could not see any Scripture foundation on which his inferences and arguments could rest. Our pastor then very kindly and respectfully requested me to state my reasons for leaving Sunday to keep the seventh day which, with God's help I was prepared to do and felt myself happy to have such a privilege. The pastor then said to me in reply that he was convinced that I was honestly, conscientiously and it appears to him Scripturally established in keeping the seventh day according to the fourth commandment, and he said, I can not without doing violence to my own conscience advise you to turn back to Sunday-keeping, and then added that if our church would, turn and keep the seventh day he would, and he said moreover that he believed that all Christians would keep the Sabbath of the fourth commandment in the coming Millennium.

Our pastor made a faithful report to the church of the character and result of his labors in my case. Then the question, what shall we do with this case? A certain brother arose and offered this resolution as near as I can remember, viz: "Resolved, that we fellowship Brother Campbell and allow him to answer his own conscience in keeping the Sabbath, assuring him of our brotherly love and confidence, requesting him to meet with us as often as convenient and especially on communion seasons." This resolution was adopted without a dissenting voice; accordingly I remained a member of the church for nearly two years as a Sabbatarian, Presbyterian or Congregationalist, for I loved the church which was deeply incased in my heart of hearts."

TYPOGRAPHICAL ERRORS.—The number of type used in an ordinary country newspaper is about 600,000; that is the actual number of bits of metal arranged for each paper in preparing a newspaper of that size for the press. Few people think of the printing trade as one of the most exact and particular handicrafts; but it is. In making type, variations that might be allowed in the finest machinery would render type useless. The most elaborate and carefully fitted piece of work ever made in other very particular skilled labor does not compare for minuteness of detail and accurate fitting with that which the printer does every day. The man who does the first is looked upon as the marvel of skill, but if one hundred of his pieces are put in, wrong side up or down, or turned around, it is not noticed in the general effect; if a printer in fitting ten times as many pieces together in a single day, puts one in the wrong way, everybody sees it, and is amazed at the "stupid carelessness of those printers."

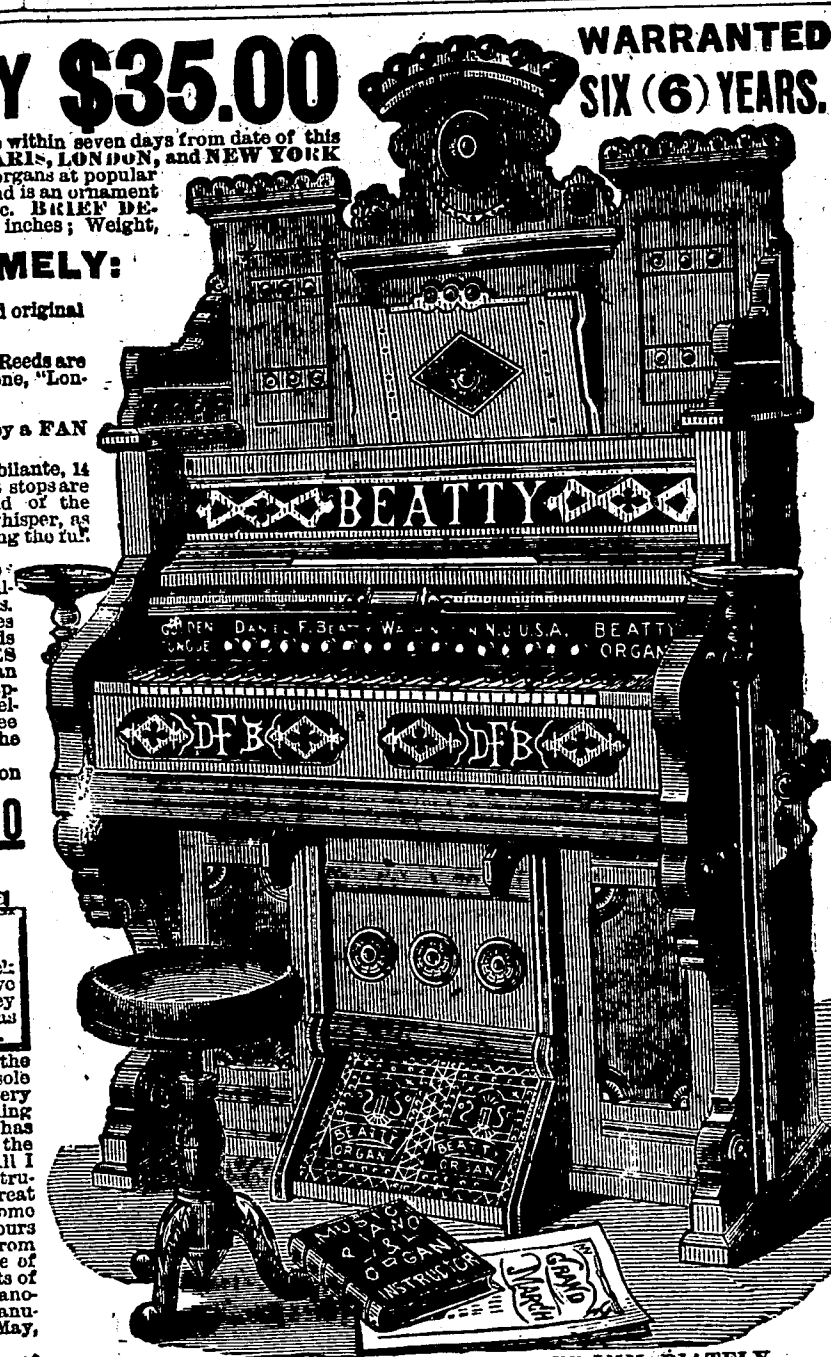
An electric railway will be one of the interesting features of the Louisville Exposition. It is to be a half mile in length, running the whole length of the park in which the main building is situated.
